The Little Loch Broom Scallops Several Fishery Order 2002

Whereas an application for an Order under section 1 of the Sea Fisheries (Shellfish) Act 1967⁽¹⁾ has been made to the Scottish Ministers⁽²⁾, by Grant Campbell;

And whereas the Scottish Ministers have prepared a draft Order and have served a copy of it on the applicant in accordance with paragraph 1 of Schedule 1 to that Act;

And whereas the applicant has caused printed copies of the draft Order to be published and circulated and has given notice of the application all in accordance with paragraph 2 of that Schedule;

And whereas no objections have been received by the Scottish Ministers with respect to the draft order under paragraph 3 of that Schedule;

Now therefore, the Scottish Ministers in exercise of the powers conferred by sections 1 and 7(4)(a)(iii) of, as read with Schedule 1 to, that Act and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf and with the consent of the Crown Estate Commissioners hereby make the following Order:

Citation and commencement

1. This Order may be cited as the Little Loch Broom Scallops Several Fishery Order 2002 and shall come into force on 7th May 2002.

Interpretation

2. In this Order—

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- (1) 1967 c. 83; section 1 was amended by the Sea Fisheries Act 1968 (c. 77), section 15(2) (and is to be read with section 15(3) to (6) of that Act), the Fisheries Limits Act 1976 (c. 86), section 9, Schedule 2, paragraph 15 and the Sea Fisheries (Shellfish) (Amendment) Act 1997 (c. 3), section 1; Schedule 1 was amended by the Sea Fisheries Act 1968, section 15(7). Scallops and queens were specified for the purpose of section 1 by the Shellfish (Specification of Molluscs) Regulations 1987 (S.I.1987/218).
- (2) The reference to the “appropriate Minister” in section 22(1) of the Sea Fisheries (Shellfish) Act 1967 is to be read as a reference to the Scottish Ministers by virtue of the Scotland Act 1998 (Consequential Modifications) (No. 2) Order 1999 (S.I. 1999/1820), article 4 and Schedule 2, paragraph 42(10).

“the applicant” means Grant Campbell, Number 3, Fasnagianach, Loch Broom, Ross-shire IV23 2RU;

“creel” means a basket, small cage, pot, receptacle or container with one or more openings or entrances which may be baited and is placed on the seabed for the purpose of catching shellfish;

“the grantee” means the applicant or such other person as is for the time being entitled to the right of several fishery conferred by this Order;

Right of several fishery

3. Subject to the following provisions of this Order, there is hereby conferred on the applicant for a period of 15 years beginning on the date on which this Order comes into force, the right of several fishery for scallops with respect to the whole of the area of the fishery.

Restriction on harvesting and deposits

4. The right of several fishery granted by article 3 is subject to the following restrictions:—
- (a) that the harvesting of scallops shall be carried out manually by divers;
 - (b) that the grantee shall not without the written consent of the Scottish Ministers (which consent may be given in electronic form) deposit within the boundaries of the fishery any juvenile scallops taken from outwith the fishery and shall comply with any condition subject to which the Scottish Ministers give such consent.

Permitted Fishing Implements

5. For the purposes of section 7(4)(a)(iii) of the Sea Fisheries (Shellfish) Act 1967(3), a creel is specified as an implement of fishing the use of which is permitted within the fishery.

Assignment

6. The grantee shall not without the prior written consent of the Scottish Ministers (which consent may be given in electronic form) assign or in any other way transfer the right of several fishery to any other person.

Marking of limits of fishery

7. The grantee shall cause to be clearly marked the limits of the fishery on the bed and on the surface of the sea and shall maintain the marks in position and in good repair.

Rights of the Crown

8. Nothing in this Order shall affect prejudicially any estate, right, power, privilege, authority or exemption of the Crown and in particular and without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing nothing herein contained shall authorise the applicant to take, use, enter upon or in any manner interfere with any land, or interest in land, any rights of whatever description (including any portion of the shore or bed of the sea, or of any river channel, creek, bay or estuary) belonging to Her Majesty in right of Her Crown and under the management of the Crown Estate Commissioners.

SCHEDULE

Article 2

DESCRIPTION OF THE FISHERY

That part of the bed of the sea at Little Loch Broom, Approaches to Ullapool, extending to 7.007 hectares or thereby and bounded as follows:— on or towards the north west by a straight line extending in a north-easterly direction for a distance of 157.450 metres or thereby from a point at 57°53.860'North latitude and 5°22.830'West longitude, to a point at 57°53.930'North latitude and 5°22.740'West longitude, and then on or towards the north-east by a straight line extending in a south-easterly direction for a distance of 498.100 metres or thereby to a point at 57°53.760'North latitude and 5°22.350'West longitude and then to the east by a straight line extending in southerly direction for a distance of 121.830 metres or thereby to a point at 57°53.700'North latitude and 5°22.400'West longitude, and then on or towards the south-west by a line following the line of mean low water springs to the point of beginning.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This note is not part of the Order)

This Order confers on Grant Campbell (“the applicant”) for a period of 15 years the right of several fishery for scallops in part of Little Loch Broom (article 3). The part of Little Loch Broom to which the Order applies is described in the Schedule. The location of the area to which the Order applies is also shown on an indicative map, a copy of which is held by the Scottish Executive Environment and Rural Affairs Department, Pentland House, 47 Robb’s Loan, Edinburgh EH14 1TW and by the applicant at Number 3, Fasnagianach, Loch Broom, Ross-shire IV23 2RU. A representation of the indicative map is appended to this note for illustrative purposes.

The Order requires the harvesting of scallops under the right of several fishery to be carried out manually by divers and restricts the deposit of juvenile scallops taken from outside the fishery within the boundaries of the fishery (article 4).

The Order specifies creels as implements of fishing the use of which is permitted within the fishery (article 5).

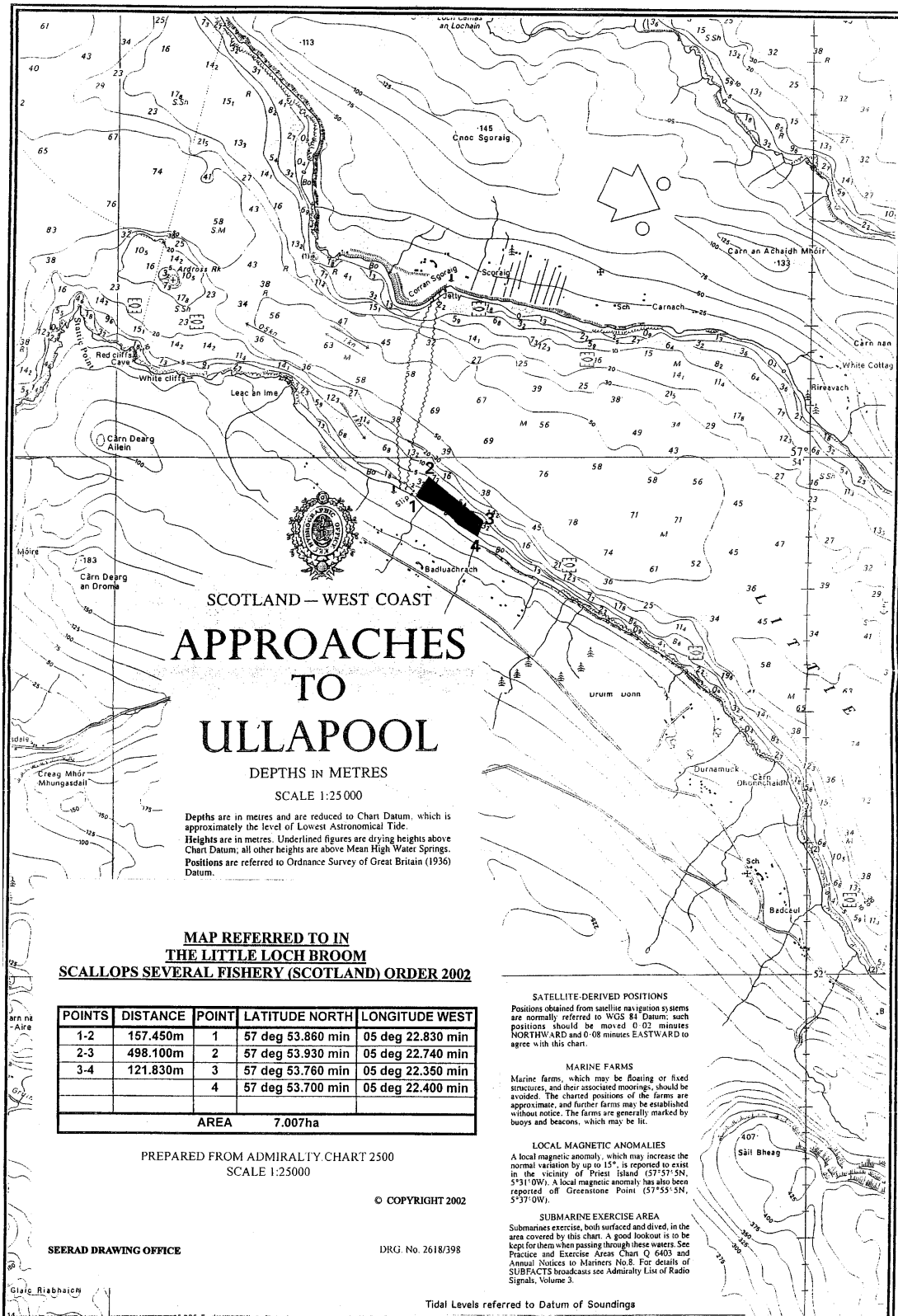
The Order prohibits the assignation or other transfer of the right of several fishery without the prior written consent of Scottish Ministers (article 6).

The Order requires the limits of the area to be clearly marked and maintained (article 7).

The Order provides that its effect will not prejudicially affect the rights of the Crown (article 8).

By virtue of section 2 of the Sea Fisheries (Shellfish) Act 1967 this Order confers on the applicant the exclusive right to deposit, propagate, fish for and take scallops within the area.

SATELLITE-DERIVED POSITIONS
 Positions obtained from satellite navigation systems are normally referred to WGS 84 Datum: such positions should be moved 0.02 minutes NORTHWARD and 0.08 minutes EASTWARD to agree with this chart.

MARINE FARMS
 Marine farms, which may be floating or fixed structures, and their associated moorings, should be avoided. The charted positions of the farms are approximate, and further farms may be established without notice. The farms are generally marked by buoys and beacons, which may be lit.

LOCAL MAGNETIC ANOMALIES
 A local magnetic anomaly, which may increase the normal variation by up to 15°, is reported to exist in the vicinity of Priest Island (57°57'5N, 5°31'0W). A local magnetic anomaly has also been reported off Greenstone Point (57°55'5N, 5°37'0W).

 Submarines exercise, both surfaced and dived, in the area covered by this chart. A good lookout is to be kept for them when passing through these waters.
