**The Fruit Juices and Fruit Nectars (Amendment) Regulations
(Northern Ireland) 1995**

Made 21st March 1995

Coming into operation 1st May 1995

The Department of Health and Social Services in exercise of the powers conferred on it by Articles 15(1)(a), (c) and (e) and 16(1) of the Food Safety (Northern Ireland) Order 1991(a) and of all other powers enabling it in that behalf and after consultation in accordance with Article 47(3) of the said Order with such organisations as appear to it to be representative of interests likely to be substantially affected by these Regulations, hereby makes the following Regulations:

Citation, commencement and interpretation

1.—(1) These Regulations may be cited as the Fruit Juices and Fruit Nectars (Amendment) Regulations (Northern Ireland) 1995 and shall come into operation on 1st May 1995.

(2) In these Regulations “the principal Regulations” means the Fruit Juices and Fruit Nectars Regulations (Northern Ireland) 1977(b).

Amendment of the principal Regulations

2. In the definition of “fruit nectar” in regulation 2(1) of the principal Regulations after sub-paragraph (d), there shall be inserted—

“(e) where the naturally high sugar content of apricots, any fruit specified at item 2 or 3 of column 1 of Schedule 1 or any admixture thereof so warrants, they may be used to manufacture the product without the addition of sugar or honey;”.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This note is not part of the Regulations.)

These Regulations amend the Fruit Juices and Fruit Nectars Regulations (Northern Ireland) 1977 (“the principal Regulations”) to implement Commission Directive 93/45/EEC concerning the manufacture of nectars without the addition of sugars or honey (O.J. No. L159, 1.7.93, p. 133).

Regulation 2 amends the definition of “fruit nectar” in regulation 2(1) of the principal Regulations. The effect of this amendment is to allow fruit nectar to be manufactured using apricots, other specified fruit or any admixture thereof without the addition of sugar or honey where the naturally high sugar content of such fruit so warrants.
