

EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM

THE SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS UP-RATING ORDER (NORTHERN IRELAND) 2010

S.R. 2010 No. 118

1. Introduction

- 1.1 This Explanatory Memorandum has been prepared by the Department for Social Development to accompany the Statutory Rule (details above) which is laid before the Northern Ireland Assembly.
- 1.2 The Statutory Rule is made under sections 132, 132A and 165(1), (4) and (5) of the Social Security Administration (Northern Ireland) Act 1992 and is subject to the confirmatory procedure.

2. Purpose

- 2.1 This Order, one of a series of statutory rules relating to the annual up-rating, provides for the rates of social security benefits, pensions and allowances from April 2010.
- 2.2 Article 1 provides for the title and commencement of the Order.
- 2.3 Article 2 defines certain terms and provides for the application of the Interpretation Act (Northern Ireland) 1954.
- 2.4 Article 3 provides for changes in the rates of certain benefits, and increases of benefit, specified in Schedule 4 to the Social Security Contributions and Benefits (Northern Ireland) Act 1992 (“the Contributions and Benefits Act”).
- 2.5 Article 4 increases the rates and amounts of certain pensions and allowances under the Contributions and Benefits Act, however, additional pensions, pension increase or lump sum where entitlement to retirement pension is deferred, inheritable lump sum and shared additional pensions and increments of shared additional pensions remain unchanged.
- 2.6 Article 5 specifies the sums payable as part of a Category A or Category B retirement pension under sections 11(1) and 13(2) and (3) of the Pension Schemes (Northern Ireland) Act which remain unchanged.
- 2.7 Article 6 specifies the dates from which the sums specified for rates or amounts of benefit under the Contributions and Benefits Act or the Pension Schemes Act are changed.
- 2.8 Article 7 increases the rate of certain workmen’s compensation in respect of employment before 5th July 1948.
- 2.9 Article 8 specifies earnings limits for child dependency increases.

- 2.10 Article 9 specifies the rate of statutory sick pay which remains unchanged.
- 2.11 Article 10 increases the rate of statutory maternity pay.
- 2.12 Article 11 increases the rate of statutory paternity pay and statutory adoption pay.
- 2.13 Article 12 specifies the rate of graduated retirement benefit which remains unchanged.
- 2.14 Article 13 increases the rates of disability living allowance.
- 2.15 Article 14 increases the rates of age addition except those referred to in paragraph (2) of that Article for claimants entitled to long-term incapacity benefit which are reduced.
- 2.16 Article 15 specifies the rates of transitional invalidity allowance with no changes in the rates for pensioners whilst for claimants entitled to long-term incapacity benefit the rates are reduced for higher and middle rate cases and increased for lower rate cases.
- 2.17 Article 16 sets out the sums relevant to the applicable amount for the purposes of income support. Article 16(3) and Schedule 2 set out the personal allowances. Article 16(4) and (5) and Schedule 3 set out the premiums. Article 16(6) specifies the income bands for non-dependent deductions which are not changing. Article 16(7) and Schedule 4 set out other miscellaneous amounts.
- 2.18 Article 17 provides for the percentage increase of sums payable by way of special transitional additions to income support.
- 2.19 Article 18 increases the sum by which any income support of a person involved in a trade dispute is reduced.
- 2.20 Article 19 sets out the sums relevant to the applicable amount for the purposes of housing benefit. Article 19(3) specifies the income bands for non-dependant deductions which are not changing. Article 19(5) and Schedule 5 set out the personal allowances and Article 19(6) and (7) and Schedule 6 set out the premiums.
- 2.21 Article 20 sets out the sums relevant to the applicable amount for the purposes of housing benefit for certain persons over the qualifying age for state pension credit. Article 20(3) specifies the income bands for non-dependant deductions which are not changing. Article 20(5) and Schedule 7 set out the personal allowances and Article 20(6) and (7) and Schedule 8 set out the premiums.
- 2.22 Article 21 increases the age-related amounts of contribution-based jobseeker's allowance.

- 2.23 Article 22 sets out the sums relevant to the applicable amount for the purposes of income-based jobseeker's allowance. Article 22(3) and Schedule 9 set out the personal allowances. Article 22(4) and (5) and Schedule 10 set out the premiums. Article 22(6) and Schedule 11 set out the amounts of premiums relevant to joint-claim couples. Article 22(7) specifies the income bands for non-dependant deductions which are not changing. Article 22(8) and Schedule 12 set out other miscellaneous amounts.
- 2.24 Article 23 increases the sum by which any income-based jobseeker's allowance of a person involved in a trade dispute is reduced.
- 2.25 Article 24 and Schedule 13 specify sums relevant to state pension credit. Article 24(4) specifies the income bands for non-dependant deductions which are not changing.
- 2.26 Article 25 sets out the sums relevant to the applicable amount for the purposes of employment and support allowance. Article 25(2) and Schedule 14 set out the prescribed amounts. Article 25(3) and Schedule 15 set out the premiums. Article 25(5) specifies the income bands for non-dependant deductions which are not changing. Article 25(6) and Schedule 16 set out other miscellaneous amounts.
- 2.27 Article 26 revokes the Social Security Benefits Up-rating Order (Northern Ireland) 2009.

3. Background

- 3.1 The Secretary of State for Work and Pensions is required under sections 150 and 150A of the Social Security Administration Act 1992 to review annually the level of benefits in relation to the general level of prices obtaining in Great Britain and where the general level is greater at the end of the period under review, an order is laid before Parliament altering the rates of benefits to which those sections apply. The Secretary of State has determined that benefits have maintained their value in relation to prices as measured by the Retail Prices Index (all items) over the period October 2008 to September 2009 but decided, in relation to certain benefits, to bring forward by a year a proportion of the increase expected in April 2011. The Social Security Benefits Up-rating Order 2010 was made on 15th March 2010.
- 3.2 The Social Security Benefits Up-rating Order (Northern Ireland) 2010 makes corresponding provision for Northern Ireland.

4. Consultation

- 4.1 Consultation regarding this Order is not required as it forms part of the annual up-rating package.

5. Equality Impact

5.1 In accordance with its duty under section 75 of the Northern Ireland Act 1998, the Department has conducted a screening exercise and concluded that as this Order only alters the rates of benefits and does not change the conditions for the receipt of benefits it does not have significant implications for equality of opportunity. In light of this, the Department considers that an equality impact assessment is not necessary.

6. Regulatory Impact

6.1 The Order does not require a Regulatory Impact Assessment as it does not impose any costs on business, charities or voluntary bodies.

7. Financial Implications

7.1 The impact on the public sector is to add to programme expenditure but no additional administration costs will be incurred. The total cost of the 2010 up-rating is expected to increase the Department's annual managed expenditure by approximately £46.3m.

8. Section 24 of the Northern Ireland act 1998

8.1 The Department has considered section 24 of the Northern Ireland Act 1998 and is satisfied the Rule—

- (a) is not incompatible with any of the Convention rights,
- (b) is not incompatible with Community law,
- (c) does not discriminate against a person or class of person on the ground of religious belief or political opinion, and
- (d) does not modify an enactment in breach of section 7 of the Northern Ireland Act 1998.

9. EU Implications

9.1 Not applicable.

10. Parity or Replicatory Measure

10.1 The corresponding Great Britain instrument is the Social Security Benefits Up-rating Order 2010 (S.I. 2010/793). Parity of timing and substance is an integral part of the maintenance of single systems of social security, pensions and child support provided for in section 87 of the Northern Ireland Act 1998.
