THE DANGEROUS DRUGS (CONSOLIDATION) (AMENDMENT) REGULATIONS (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1931, DATED 21ST MAY, 1931, MADE BY THE MINISTER OF HOME AFFAIRS FOR NORTHERN IRELAND UNDER SECTION 7 OF THE DANGEROUS DRUGS ACT, 1920 (10 & 11 Geo. 5, c. 46) FOR CONTROLLING, THE MANUFACTURE, SALE, POSSESSION AND DISTRIBUTION OF DANGEROUS DRUGS TO WHICH PART III OF THAT ACT APPLIES.

## 1931. No. 60.

I, the Right Honourable Sir Richard Dawson Bates, Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland, in pursuance of the powers vested in me by section seven of the Dangerous Drugs Act, 1920, and of all other powers me thereunto enabling, do hereby order and direct that the Regulations entitled "The Dangerous Drugs (Consolidation) Regulations, 1928," which were made by the Secretary of State on the fourteenth day of December, 1928, as applied to Northern Ireland by the Dangerous Drugs Regulations (Northern Ireland), 1929, shall be amended as follows:—

Article 5 (1) of the Dangerous Drugs (Consolidation) Regulations, 1928, shall read—

- "5.—(1) Persons who are members of the following classes, that is to say:—
  - (a) duly qualified medical practitioners;
  - (b) registered dentists;
  - (c) registered veterinary surgeons;
  - (d) pharmacists who are employed or engaged in dispensing medicines at a public hospital or other public institution;
  - (e) persons who are in charge of a laboratory used for purposes of research or instruction and attached to an institution approved for the purpose of this Regulation by the Secretary of State;
  - (f) persons duly appointed by a local authority as analysts for the purposes of the Sale of Food and Drugs Acts, 1875 to 1907:

are hereby authorised, so far as may be necessary for the practice or exercise of their respective professions or employments, in their capacity as members of their respective classes, to be in possession of and to supply drugs or preparations:

Provided that a dentist shall not be authorised to supply drugs or preparations otherwise than by the personal administration thereof by him to persons receiving treatment from him:

General authority for certain classes of persons to possess and supply drugs. And provided that no person shall be deemed to be an authorised person within the meaning of this article who, having been similarly authorised in Great Britain or the Irish Free State, has had such authorisation withdrawn."

These Regulations may be cited as "The Dangerous Drugs (Consolidation) (No. 2) (Amendment) Regulations (Northern Ireland), 1931."

## Colorado Beetle.

THE COLORADO BEETLE (NORTHERN IRELAND) ORDER, 1931, DATED 16TH MAY, 1931.

THE COLORADO BEETLE (NORTHERN IBELAND) No. 2 ORDER OF 1931, DATED 7TH DAY OF NOVEMBER, 1931.

The Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in it under the Destructive Insects and Pests Acts, 1877 and 1907, and of every other power enabling it in this behalf, orders and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

1. Prohibition of Importation of Potatoes grown in European France.

For the prevention of the introduction of the Colorado Beetle, the landing in Northern Ireland of any potatoes grown in European France is hereby prohibited.

2. Restriction on Importation of Living Plants.

The landing in Northern Ireland of any living plants shipped from any port in European France is hereby prohibited unless the landing thereof is authorised by a licence granted by the Ministry or by an Inspector, or other authorised officer, or unless each consignment is accompanied by the certificate or copy certificates as the case may be specified below:—

(a) In the case of living plants grown in European France and included in the First Schedule to this Order, two copy certificates in the form specified in the Third. Schedule to the Destructive Insects and Pests (Northern Ireland), Order of 1922, issued by an Officer of the French
