- 4. For paragraph (2) of the Proviso to Regulation 7 there shall be substituted the following paragraph:—
 - "(2) in the case of any other scholar the sum payable by the Ministry in respect of travelling expenses shall be such amount as it may approve, subject to the condition that the amount as approved together with the maintenance allowance payable under Regulation 5 shall not exceed the maximum amount of maintenance allowance which he would receive under that Regulation if the Ministry were satisfied that is was necessary for him to take up temporary residence in the neighbourhood of the College."
- These Regulations shall come into operation on 1st September 1949.

Regulations for the Admission of Students to Training Colleges in 1950

REGULATIONS, DATED DECEMBER 12TH, 1949, MADE BY THE MINISTRY OF EDUCATION, NORTHERN IRELAND, UNDER THE EDUCATION ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1947.

1949. No. 204

The Ministry of Education (hereinafter referred to as "the Ministry") in pursuance of the powers vested in it by Section 59 of the Education Act (Northern Ireland), 1947, (hereinafter referred to as "the Act") and of all other powers enabling it in that behalf, hereby makes the following Regulations:-

1.—(1) These Regulations may be cited as the "Training Colleges (Admission of Students) Regulations No. 2 (Northern Ireland), 1949 ".

- (2) These Regulations shall come into operation on the date hereof, and shall supersede previous Regulations for the admission of students to training colleges.
- 2.—(1) In these Regulations unless the context otherwise requires, the following expressions have the meanings hereby assigned to them, that is to say:—
 - "approved" means approved by the Ministry for the purposes to which the context relates;
 - "recognised" means recognised by the Ministry for the purposes of payment of grant;
 - "Training Colleges" means Stranmillis Training College and St. Mary's Training College, Belfast.
- (2) Other expressions to which meanings have been assigned by the Act shall, for the purposes of these Regulations, have the same respective meanings.
- 3. The Ministry may admit to training in 1950 two categories of candidates under these Regulations, viz:—
 - (i) Ordinary Entry; (ii) Special Entry.

The number of candidates to be admitted to each training college in each of these categories shall be determined by the Ministry after consultation with the Principal of the training college concerned.

- 4.—(a) Ordinary Entry. Subject to the provisions of Regulation 5 of these Regulations, candidates in this category who pass the examination and tests set forth in Part A of the Appendix to these Regulations shall be admitted to training in order of merit in respect of the training college to which admission is sought.
- (b) Special Entry. The Ministry may admit to each training college a limited number of candidates in this category who pass the tests set forth in Part B of the Appendix to these Regulations, and who either
 - (i) are graduates of an approved university, or
 - (ii) have reached a satisfactory standard of education and in the opinion of the Ministry are otherwise suitable for admission to training.

A candidate may apply for admission to training either in the Ordinary Entry or in the Special Entry category but not in both.

5. Deferred Admissions. Subject to such conditions as the Ministry may prescribe, a limited number of candidates in the Ordinary Entry category who are pupils of recognised grammar schools and who were born after 1st January, 1933, and not later than 1st January, 1934, may be selected for admission to training in 1951.

- 6. Undertaking to Teach. Candidates shall be required, as a condition of admission to training, to sign an undertaking that on completion of the course of training they will without undue delay seek employment as teachers in recognised schools in Northern Ireland and will serve as teachers in such schools for a period of at least two years.
- 7. In addition to the candidates admitted to training under Regulation 3 of these Regulations, the Ministry may also admit to training —

(a) a strictly limited number of members of religious communities:

Provided that -

(i) they fulfil the conditions applicable to candidates in the Ordinary Entry category as set forth in Part A of the Appendix to these Regulations, or,

(ii) in the case of those seeking admission to a one-year course of training, they are graduates of an approved university and pass the tests in general suitability and medical fitness;

(iii) the whole cost of their training is defrayed by the Religious Order or Community.

- (b) a strictly limited number of nuns who have passed the Ministry's Grammar School Senior Certificate Examination and have been serving as unqualified teachers in Convent Schools in Northern Ireland from a date not later than 1st January, 1950: Provided that—
 - (i) they pass the tests in general suitability and medical fitness as set forth in the Appendix to these Regulations, and

(ii) the whole cost of their training is defrayed by the Religious Order or Community.

(c) persons who by reason of their war service have received awards under an approved scheme to enable them to be trained as teachers: Provided that they satisfy the Ministry's requirements as to educational standard, general suitability and medical fitness.

General Conditions

- 8. Age Limits. To be eligible for admission to training in 1950, candidates (other than persons admitted under paragraph (c) of Regulation 7 hereof and senior pupil teachers in their final year of service) must have been born not earlier than 1st January, 1926, and not later than 1st January, 1933: Provided that the Ministry may, at its discretion, allow an extension of the maximum age by the equivalent of any period not exceeding four years spent by a candidate either
 - (i) in approved teaching service in schools in the United Kingdom, or
 - (ii) in full-time attendance at an approved university, or .

(iii) in H.M. Forces or the Merchant Navy.

SUBMISSION OF APPLICATIONS. Forms of application may be obtained from the Ministry and must, except in the case of persons admitted under paragraph (c) of Regulation 7 hereof, be returned so as to reach the Ministry, duly completed, not later than 1st May, 1950: Provided, however, that -

> (i) the latest date for the receipt of applications from university graduates shall be 17th July, 1950, and

> (ii) applications received from non-graduate candidates after 1st May but not later than 1st July may be accepted at the discretion of the Ministry, on payment of a fee of 10s. 0d. in respect of each application.

Nothing in this Regulation shall be regarded as extending the latest dates of application for admission to the Ministry's Grammar School Senior Certificate Examination.

- 10. References. When applying for admission to training candidates must furnish the names and addresses of two persons to whom. reference may be made by the Ministry as to the suitability of the candidate for admission to training. In the case of candidates in the Ordinary Entry category one of these persons must be the Principal of the school last attended by the candidate.
- The Interpretation Act, 1921 (Northern Ireland), shall apply for the purpose of the interpretation of these Regulations as it applies for the purpose of the interpretation of an Act of the Parliament of Northern Ireland.

APPENDIX

ORDINARY ENTRY CANDIDATES.

- (1) To be eligible for admission to training a candidate in the Ordinary Entry category must -
 - (a) pass the Ministry's Grammar School Senior Certificate Examination in 1950, without compensation in English,

(b) pass the test in general suitability, and(c) pass the test in medical fitness.

- (2) Subject to the conditions prescribed in (1) above, the order of merit in respect of each training college will be determined for men and women separately by the addition of the marks obtained in the Senior Certificate Examination in —

(a) English; and

- (b) any other five subjects or the examination (except subsidiary language subjects) not more than four of which may be Mathematical subjects.
- B. SPECIAL ENTRY CANDIDATES.

To be eligible for admission to training a candidate in the Special Entry category must pass the tests in general suitability and medical fitness in addition to satisfying the conditions laid down in Regulation 4 (b) of these Regulations.
