

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This note is not part of the Regulations, but is intended to indicate their general purport.)

These Regulations amend various provisions of regulations made under the National Insurance Acts (Northern Ireland) 1946 to 1962 in order to bring them into conformity with the provisions of the Act of 1963 introducing higher rates of ungraduated contributions and a higher upper limit of weekly pay taken into account in fixing graduated contributions. They also contain tables of equivalent pension benefits, to be used in determining whether a person is assured of such benefits at the end of a period of non-participating employment.

The remaining provisions are of a minor character.

ORDER, DATED 5TH APRIL, 1963, MADE BY THE MINISTRY OF LABOUR AND NATIONAL INSURANCE UNDER THE WAGES COUNCILS ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1945.

The Ministry of Labour and National Insurance, in exercise of the powers conferred on it by Section 10 of the Wages Councils Act (Northern Ireland), 1945(a), hereby makes the following Order to give effect to wages regulation proposals received from the Baking Wages Council (Northern Ireland):—

Citation

1. This Order may be cited as the Baking Wages Regulation (Amendment) Order (Northern Ireland), 1963.

Commencement

2. The wages regulation proposals set out in the Schedule shall come into operation on the specified date.

Interpretation

3. In this Order the expression "the specified date" means the 18th day of April, 1963, provided that where, as respects any worker who is paid wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, that date does not correspond with the beginning of the period for which the wages are paid, the expression "the specified date" means, as respects that worker, the beginning of the next such period following that date.

SCHEDULE

**Statutory Minimum Remuneration for certain Male Workers employed in the
County of the City of Belfast and in Districts situate within a
Radius of 15 Statute Miles therefrom**

The Baking Wages Regulation (No. 6) Order (Northern Ireland), 1961(a) (Order N.I.Bk. (273)), as amended by the Baking Wages Regulation (Amendment) (No. 1) Order (Northern Ireland), 1962(b) (Order N.I.Bk. (304)), shall have effect as if in the Schedule thereto the following sub-paragraph were substituted for sub-paragraph (b) of paragraph 15—

“Paragraph 15.

- (b) is employed in an establishment in which the number of apprentice bakers is limited in proportion to the number of journeymen regularly employed as follows—

Number of journeymen regularly employed	Maximum number of apprentices employed
(i) <i>Not less than 3 and not more than 7</i>	<i>One</i>
(ii) <i>More than 7</i>	<i>One additional apprentice for each complete group of seven journeymen in excess of the first group of seven</i>

Provided that—

- (i) notwithstanding the provisions of (ii) above, an extra apprentice may be employed in an establishment in which the number of journeymen regularly employed is at least *3 in excess of 7 or a multiple of 7*,
 (ii) the provisions of this sub-paragraph do not apply in the case of apprentices who commenced their employment with the employer *before 18th April, 1963.*”

This Order, which comes into operation on 18th April, 1963, amends the definition of “apprentice baker” contained in the Schedule to the Baking Wages Regulation (No. 6) Order (Northern Ireland), 1961 (Order N.I.Bk. (273))
