**Citation and commencement**

1. This Order may be cited as the Food (Animal Products from Belgium) (Emergency Control) (Scotland) Revocation Order 2000 and shall come into force on 21st June 2000.

**Revocation**

2. The Food (Animal Products from Belgium) (Emergency Control) (Scotland) Order 2000<sup>(2)</sup> is hereby revoked.

No. L97, 19.4.2000, p.16).
