

EXECUTIVE NOTE

THE NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE (GENERAL DENTAL SERVICES) (SCOTLAND) AMENDMENT REGULATIONS 2010 (SSI 2010/33)

The above instrument is made in exercise of the powers conferred by sections 25(1) and (2), 105(7) and 108(1) of the National Health Service (Scotland) Act 1978. The instrument is subject to negative procedure.

Policy Objective

Under the National Health Service (General Dental Services) (Scotland) Regulations 1996 (“the 1996 Regulations”) a dentist can accept an adult into a continuing care arrangement or a child into a capitation arrangement. During the period of the continuing care or capitation arrangement the dentist is required to provide the patient with the care and treatment necessary to secure and maintain their oral health. This arrangement is extended for a further period each time the patient receives care and treatment from the dentist. However, if a patient does not attend the dentist at least once during the registration period the arrangement will not be extended and will lapse, which will result in the patient no longer being registered with the dentist. The dentist will no longer be responsible for the patient’s care and treatment.

One of the commitments in the *Action Plan for Improving Oral Health and Modernising NHS Dental Services in Scotland*, which was published in March 2005, was to make registration with a dentist under NHS arrangements a continuing and not time limited system, with defined responsibilities for both dentists and patients. Extension of the registration period from 16 to 36 months with effect from 1 April 2006 was the first step in the move towards a continuing registration period. As a second step the duration of a continuing care and capitation arrangement for patients registered with a dentist on or after 1 April 2009 was extended to 48 months. As a final step the 1996 Regulations will be amended by the above instrument so that all patients under a continuing care and capitation arrangement with a dentist on 1 April 2010 and any arrangements entered into for new patients on or after that date will be made non-time limited.

Regulation 2 of the instrument removes all references in the 1996 Regulations to continuing care and capitation arrangements lapsing to provide for non-time limited registration.

Consultation

The British Dental Association Scotland and the Scottish Dental Practice Committee have been consulted on this issue.

Financial Effects

There will be a financial impact as a result of the introduction of non-time limited registration, given that dentists will continue to receive capitation and continuing care payments for patients who would previously have lapsed. The financial impact will be reduced for those patients who have not attended the dentist for 3 years, with the continuing care and capitation payments for such patients reducing to 20% of the full payment due. This cost is estimated at £1.2m in the first year rising to £2.4m in each subsequent year, which would be met from the General Dental Services budget.

Consolidation

Work is currently underway to consolidate the National Health Service (General Dental Services) (Scotland) Regulations 1996 and the consolidated regulations will be laid in due course.
