1. Policy title and aims

The EU has adopted Directive 2014/52/EU which amends Directive 2011/92/EU covering the assessment of the effects of certain public and private projects on the environment (known as the Environmental Impact Assessment or EIA Directive). The amending Directive forms part of the European legislature and, as such, DfE is responsible for considering the proper transposition of its content into legislation. This will cover the EIA process for its Offshore Electricity Development consenting regime i.e. the Offshore Electricity Development (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations (Northern Ireland) 2008 ("2008 Regulations") in order to ensure that it is aligned with other European and UK regions and to avoid potential infraction proceedings in the future. In considering the implications of the revised Directive, DfE has identified overlap with other EIA legislation related to the marine licensing regime i.e. the Marine Works (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2007 (as amended) ("2007 Regulations"). As such DfE sought legal opinion upon which it is planning to revoke the 2008 Regulations in favour of the 2007 Regulations.
