

**CHAPTER xxviii.**

An Act to confirm a Provisional Order under the Private Legislation Procedure (Scotland) Act 1899 relating to Loch Leven Water Power. A.D. 1908.
[18th June 1908.]

WHEREAS His Majesty's Secretary for Scotland has after inquiry held before Commissioners made the Provisional Order set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed under the provisions of the Private Legislation Procedure (Scotland) Act 1899 and it is requisite that the said Order should be confirmed by Parliament: 62 & 63 Vict.
c. 47.

Be it therefore enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal and Commons in this present Parliament assembled and by the authority of the same as follows:—

1. The Provisional Order contained in the schedule hereunto annexed shall be and the same is hereby confirmed. Confirmation

2. This Act may be cited as the Loch Leven Water Power Order Confirmation Act 1908. Short title.

LOCH LEVEN WATER POWER.

Provisional Order to extend the time limited by the Loch Leven Water Power (Amendment) Act 1904 for the construction of Work No. 5 authorised by the Loch Leven Water Power Act 1901 to authorise the levying of rates at Kinlochleven Pier for the maintenance and regulation of the said pier and for other purposes.

WHEREAS by the Loch Leven Water Power Act 1901 (in this Order called "the Act of 1901") the Loch Leven Water and Electric Power Company (in this Order called "the Company") were incorporated and authorised to construct and maintain the waterworks electrical generating stations and other works described in the Act of 1901 for the supply of water water power electrical power and electrical energy within the area of supply defined in the said Act:

And whereas by the Loch Leven Water Power (Amendment) Act 1904 (in this Order called "the Act of 1904") the time limited for the construction of Work No. 5 authorised by the Act of 1901 was extended and such time will expire on the fifteenth day of August one thousand nine hundred and eight and it is expedient that the period so limited should be further extended as by this Order provided:

And whereas the Company have constructed at Kinlochleven in the parish of Lismore and Appin and county of Argyll a pier and works connected therewith which are now used by the Company for the purposes of and incident to the construction of the works authorised by the Act of 1901 and the Act of 1904:

And whereas it would be of local and public advantage if upon the completion of the construction of the works authorised by the aforesaid Acts of 1901 and 1904 by the Company the said pier and works connected therewith could be used by the public subject to the payment of the rates set forth in the schedule to this Order:

And whereas the purposes aforesaid cannot be effected without an Order of the Secretary for Scotland confirmed by Parliament

under the provisions of the Private Legislation Procedure (Scotland) Act 1899: A.D. 1908.

Now therefore in pursuance of the powers contained in the last mentioned Act the Secretary for Scotland orders as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited for all purposes as the Loch Leven Water Power Order 1908 and shall come into operation at the date of the passing of the Act confirming the same. Short title.

2. The Harbours Docks and Piers Clauses Act 1847 (except sections 18 19 84 and 85 and except where varied by or inconsistent with this Order) is hereby incorporated with and forms part of this Order. Partial incorporation of general Act.

3. The period limited by section 8 (Extension of time for purchase of lands and completion of authorised works) of the Act of 1904 for the completion of Work No. 5 authorised by the Act of 1901 is hereby extended for a further period of one year that is to say until the fifteenth day of August one thousand nine hundred and nine and that date shall for all purposes be deemed to be the date originally limited for the completion of the said work and section 8 aforesaid shall be read and construed accordingly and if the same be not then completed then upon the expiration of that period the powers granted to the Company for making and completing the same or otherwise in relation thereto shall cease except as to so much thereof as is then completed: Extension of time for completion of authorised work.

Provided that no application to Parliament shall be made for any further extension of time affecting the estate or interests of Sir John Maxwell Stirling Maxwell of Pollok Baronet without his consent first had and obtained in writing.

4. Section 22 (5) of the Act of 1901 as continued by section 19 (2) of the Act of 1904 shall be read and construed as if for all purposes of or relating to the said section 22 and the said section 19 the fifteenth day of August one thousand nine hundred and nine had been set forth in subsection (5) of the said section 22 as the date of completion of the construction of Work No. 5 therein mentioned. Amendment of Section 22 (5) of Act of 1901.

5. The provisions of section 18 of the Act of 1904 shall remain of full force and effect notwithstanding anything contained in this Order. Saving provisions of s. 18 of Act of 1904.

6. The Company may maintain and with the previous consent in writing of the Board of Trade lengthen extend and improve the existing pier and works connected therewith (herein-after referred Maintenance of pier.

A.D. 1908. — to as "the pier") known as Kinlochleven Pier situate at the head of Loch Leven in the parish of Lismore and Appin and county of Argyll.

Public user of pier.

7. For the purposes of sections 25 and 26 of the Harbours Docks and Piers Clauses Act 1847 incorporated with this Order the pier and works in connexion therewith shall be deemed not to be completed and fit for the reception of vessels until the completion by the Company of the works authorised by the Acts of 1901 and 1904 respectively and such sections shall be read and construed and become operative accordingly.

Limits.

8.—(1) The limits within which the Company shall in respect of the pier have authority and within which the powers of the pier-master may be exercised shall comprise the pier and the area delineated and coloured pink on the plan signed in duplicate by Lord Kintore the chairman of the commissioners to whom this Order was referred one copy whereof shall within one month after the date of the passing of the Act confirming this Order be deposited in the office of the Secretary for Scotland and the other copy in the office at Oban of the principal sheriff clerk of the county of Argyll which limits are in this Order termed "the limits of this Order."

(2) The limits within which the power to levy rates may be exercised shall comprise the pier.

Power to levy rates.

9. The Company may subject and according to the provisions of this Order demand recover and receive for the use of the pier in respect of the vessels persons and things described in the schedule hereto any sums not exceeding the rates specified in that schedule.

Power to lease rates.

10. The Company may from time to time lease the rates authorised by this Order for any period not exceeding seven years and for such rent and consideration and on such terms and conditions as they think fit and the lessee shall have and may exercise during the continuance of his lease the same powers of levying and recovering the said rates as the Company have or might exercise under the Harbours Docks and Piers Clauses Act 1847 and this Order and shall be subject to all the same provisions as to accounts and otherwise to which the Company are made subject by this Order.

Rates for warehouses.

11. The Company may (so far as the rates specified in the schedule to this Order do not extend) demand and recover such

rates or other consideration as they think reasonable for the use of any warehouses sheds buildings yards weighing machines mooring posts cranes buoys works and conveniences belonging to or provided by the Company or in respect of any services rendered by them. A.D. 1908.

12. The Company may take such rates as they think proper for the supply and removal of ballast for the accommodation of vessels. Rates for ballast.

13.—(1) The Company may grant to any persons pass tickets for landing or embarking at the pier at such rates on such terms and for such periods not exceeding one year as may be agreed on but so that no preference be given to any person. Pass tickets for use of pier.

(2) A pass ticket shall not be transferable and shall not be used by any person except the person to or for whom it is granted or by any person after the period limited for its use.

(3) If any person act in any way in contravention of this section or use or attempt to use any false or counterfeit ticket he shall for each offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty shillings.

14. The Company may from time to time confer vary or extinguish exemptions from and enter into compositions with any person with respect to the payment of the rates authorised by this Order but so that no undue preference be in any case given to any person and in particular to the Company or any tenant of the Company over any other person using the pier under the like circumstances and that anything done under this section shall not prejudice the other provisions of this Order. Power to confer exemptions and compound rates.

15. As part of the first account to be lodged with the sheriff clerk in accordance with section 50 of the Harbours Docks and Piers Clauses Act 1847 incorporated in this Order the Company shall lodge with the sheriff clerk a full and detailed statement showing the expenditure made by the Company in the construction of the pier at any time up to the date of closing the said account. Statement to be lodged with sheriff clerk.

16. If at any time and from time to time the clear annual income derived from the pier on the average of the then three last preceding years after payment of all annual expenses and outgoings shall exceed interest at the rate of ten per centum per annum on the entire sum from time to time appearing to the Board of Trade may reduce rates.

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Board of Trade to have been expended by the Company in constructing the pier or in extending or improving the same the Board of Trade may if in their discretion they think fit reduce the rates leviable under this Order or any of them to such amounts as will be sufficient to provide the aforesaid interest at the rate of ten per centum per annum with power to the Board of Trade at any time and from time to time to raise the rates again to any sums not exceeding the sums respectively specified in the schedule to this Order.

Master of fishing vessel to report take of fish.

17.—(1) The master or owner of every vessel with a take or cargo of fish shall on the arrival of the vessel within the limits of this Order forthwith furnish to the collector of rates a true and accurate statement of his take or cargo of fish and the name of every person obtaining delivery thereof.

(2) If the master or owner of a vessel fails to comply with this section he shall be liable for each offence to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

Pier-master may prevent sailing of vessels.

18. The pier-master may prevent the removal or sailing from within the limits of this Order of any vessel in respect of which or of the goods imported or exported therein any rates are payable until evidence has been produced to him of the payment of those rates to the collector and in the case of a vessel with a take or cargo of fish until the master or owner of the vessel has given in the account of his take or cargo of fish required by this Order.

Company may supply and charge for water.

19. If and so long as the Company shall make and maintain such provisions and appliances as may be necessary for furnishing to vessels resorting to the pier a supply of pure and wholesome water they shall be entitled to make and recover such reasonable charges as they may think fit not exceeding the rates specified for that purpose in the schedule to this Order for pure and wholesome water supplied by them.

Extension of 10 and 11 Vict. c. 27 (sections 28 and 99) as to exemption of Government officers &c.

20. Sections 28 and 99 of the Harbours Docks and Piers Clauses Act 1847 as incorporated with this Order shall apply to and for the benefit of any Government department in the same manner as they apply to and for the benefit of the Government departments specially named in those sections.

Power to make bye-laws.

21.—(1) The Company may without prejudice to the power to make bye-laws under section 83 of the Harbours Docks and Piers Clauses Act 1847 make bye-laws for the regulation and

control of vessels and boats within the limits of this Order and also for the regulation and control of the fishermen and others frequenting or resorting to or employed at the pier or within the limits of this Order.

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(2) The byelaws may provide for imposing a penalty not exceeding forty shillings for the breach or non-observance of any of the byelaws.

(3) No byelaw shall come into operation until it has received the allowance and confirmation of the Board of Trade and that allowance and confirmation shall be sufficient for all purposes.

22. The Company shall at all times keep at convenient places on the pier and in obedience to any requirements which may from time to time be made by the Board of Trade life-buoys and life-lines in good order and fit and ready for use.

23.—(1) The Company shall exhibit at the outer extremity of the pier or in such other places as may be required for all or any part of the time from sunset to sunrise and according to the requirements of the traffic and the season of the year such lights (if any) and shall take such other steps for the prevention of danger to navigation as shall from time to time be directed by the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses and shall apply to those commissioners for such directions.

(2) The Company shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds for every day during which they omit so to apply or refuse or neglect to observe any such direction.

24.—(1) In case of injury to or destruction or decay of the pier or any part thereof the Company shall lay down such buoys exhibit such lights or take such other means for preventing (as far as may be) danger to navigation as shall from time to time be directed by the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses and shall apply to those commissioners for directions as to the means to be taken.

(2) The Company shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds for every day during which they omit so to apply or refuse or neglect to observe any such direction.

25. All penalties under this Order shall be recovered and applied as penalties are recoverable and applicable under the Harbours Docks and Piers Clauses Act 1847 and for all the purposes of that Act this Order shall be deemed the special Act.

26. Nothing in this Order affects prejudicially any estate right power privilege or exemption of the Crown and in particular nothing herein contained authorises the Company to take use or in any manner interfere with any portion of the shore or bed of the sea or of any river channel creek bay or estuary or any land hereditaments subjects or rights of whatsoever description belonging to His Majesty in right of His Crown and under the management of the Commissioners of Woods or of the Board of Trade respectively without the consent in writing of the Commissioners of Woods or the Board of Trade as the case may be on behalf of His Majesty first had and obtained for that purpose (which consent the said commissioners and board are hereby respectively authorised to give).

27. The Company shall not under the powers of this Order construct on the shore of the sea or of any creek bay arm of the sea or navigable river communicating therewith where and so far up the same as the tide flows and reflows any work without the previous consent of the Board of Trade to be signified in writing under the hand of one of the secretaries or assistant secretaries of the Board of Trade and then only according to such plan and under such restrictions and regulations as the Board of Trade may approve of such approval being signified as last aforesaid and where any such work may have been constructed the Company shall not at any time alter or extend the same without obtaining previously to making any such alteration or extension the like consents or approvals. If any such work be commenced or completed contrary to the provisions of this section the Board of Trade may abate and remove the same and restore the site thereof to its former condition at the costs and charges of the Company and the amount of such costs and charges shall be a debt due from the Company to the Crown and shall be recoverable as a Crown debt or summarily.

28. Nothing contained in this Order shall prejudice alter or affect the rights and privileges of the Right Honourable Donald Alexander Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal of Glencoe (hereinafter called "Lord Strathcona") under a disposition granted by James Robert Macalpine Downie with the consent of and by the British Aluminium Company Limited in favour of Lord Strathcona dated second eighth and twelfth December one thousand nine hundred and five with respect to the pier all which rights and privileges shall and are hereby declared to apply thereto as the

same may be extended and improved under the authority of this Order in the same way and to the same effect and subject to the same conditions and restrictions in all respects as the said rights and privileges apply to the existing pier and the same shall continue of full force and effect:

Provided that notwithstanding anything in this Order or the Acts incorporated therewith or applicable thereto the enjoyment of such rights and privileges by Lord Strathcona and his successors and his and their tenants and servants shall not entitle any other corporation or person to the same or equal rights and privileges.

29. All costs charges and expenses of and preliminary to and incidental to the preparing for obtaining and confirming of this Order or otherwise in relation thereto shall be borne and paid by the Company. Costs of Order.

(A) A vessel other than a fishing vessel shall not be charged rates for more than one call on the same day and if the vessels of the owner or owners of any steam or other vessels engaged on the same service in a regular trade with the pier shall collectively make in any one year from January to December inclusive fifty or more calls at the pier three-fourths of the rates for the time being levied shall be chargeable on each of such steam or other vessels in respect of such year. If in any year the net income of the pier is sufficient to provide interest at the rate of ten per centum the tonnage rates for such vessels for that year shall be reduced to one half. The Company shall in either case repay any sums which may have been paid in excess:

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(B) In the case of any vessel other than a fishing vessel calling at Kinlochleven while calling in one trip at several piers or ports not less than five the tonnage rates on each call shall be calculated as if the ship were of the tonnage actually occupied by cargo shipped or unshipped at Kinlochleven whichever shall be the greater and for the purposes of this calculation every fifteen passengers with their authorised luggage embarked or disembarked as the case may be shall be computed as equal to one ton of goods any number less than fifteen being treated as fifteen:

(C) Any vessel other than a fishing vessel charged tonnage dues for call on the outward journey is not to be liable in addition to tonnage dues in respect of a call on the inward journey on the same trip.
