



CHAPTER xxi

An Act to make further provision with respect to rates and charges leviable by the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board to increase the borrowing powers of the Board and for other purposes. [12th July 1950.]

WHEREAS by the Mersey Docks and Harbour, Act 1857 ^{20 & 21 Vict.} ~~HEREAS by the~~ ^{c. clxii.}
(being an Act for consolidating the docks at Liverpool and Birkenhead into one estate and for vesting the control and management of them in one public trust and for other purposes) the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board (hereinafter called "the Board") were incorporated for the purposes therein mentioned and by that Act and subsequent Acts relating to the Board various powers have from time to time been conferred on the Board:

And whereas it is expedient that the dock tonnage rates harbour rates and graving dock rates on vessels and dock rates on goods leviable by the Board in pursuance of the Mersey Dock Acts Consolidation Act 1858 and subsequent Acts should be increased and that further or new provision as in this Act contained ^{21 & 22 Vict.} ~~should be~~ ^{c. xcii.}

And whereas by the said Act of 1857 and subsequent Acts the Board have been authorised to raise money on the security of the rates leviable by them by borrowing on bond and by the grant of annuities and by the issue of stock and temporarily by the issue of bills and promissory notes and it is expedient that the powers of the Board of raising money be increased for the purposes and to the extent by this Act provided:

And whereas under the provisions of the Mersey Docks (Ferry Accommodation) Act 1860 the Mersey Docks (Liverpool River Approaches) Act 1871 the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board Act 1889 the Mersey Dock (Various Powers) Act 1893 and the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board Act 1920 and other Acts the Board have constructed various works for improving extending and altering the landing stages at Liverpool and the Board are required to appropriate portions of the said landing stages and works connected therewith for the exclusive use as well as for the convenient working and mooring of ferry steamers:

And whereas with the cesser in recent years of the operation of ferry goods steamers the extent to which the said landing stages are required to be appropriated as aforesaid is more than is necessary to accommodate ferry steamers and it is expedient that the powers and obligations of the Board with reference to such appropriation be amended and that further provision be made as to the appropriation of the said landing stages as in this Act contained:

And whereas by subsection (1) of section 7 of the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board Act 1912 the Board are empowered to remove wrecks or other obstructions within the port of Liverpool but by subsection (2) of that section it was enacted that the provisions of subsection (1) were not to extend to or within certain specified works or areas including that part of the river Mersey or the estuary thereof which lies between Bromborough Pool and the entrance lock of the Manchester Ship Canal at Eastham being the part of the said river within which the Manchester Ship Canal Company were then empowered to remove wrecks or other obstructions in pursuance of section 20 of the Manchester Ship Canal (Tidal Openings &c.) Act 1890:

And whereas by the Manchester Ship Canal Act 1924 and the Manchester Ship Canal Act 1949 the area within which the said Company were authorised to exercise the powers of section 20 of the said Act of 1890 was extended and by the last-mentioned Act it was provided that the Board should not be empowered or obliged to remove or light or buoy any wreck or obstruction within the area as so extended:

And whereas it is expedient that section 7 of the said Act of 1912 be amended accordingly as by this Act provided:

And whereas it is expedient that further powers be conferred on the Board and that the Acts relating to the Board be amended in certain respects as by this Act provided:

And whereas the Board both as the dock and harbour authority for the port of Liverpool and as owners of land subject to the rate levied by the Wallasey Embankment Commissioners for the maintenance of the Wallasey or Leasowes embankment are large contributors to the expenditure of the commissioners and appoint three members of the commission:

And whereas it is expedient that for the purposes of the improvement and proper maintenance of the embankment the borrowing powers of the commissioners be increased as by this Act provided:

And whereas it is expedient that the other provisions of this Act be enacted:

And whereas the objects of this Act cannot be attained without the authority of Parliament.

May it therefore please Your Majesty that it may be enacted and be it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal and Commons in this present Parliament assembled and by the authority of the same as follows:—

PART I

PRELIMINARY

1. This Act may be cited as the Mersey Docks and Harbour Short title. Board Act 1950.

2. This Act is divided into Parts as follows:—

3.—(1) In this Act unless there be something in the subject or context repugnant to such construction the several words and expressions to which meanings are assigned by section 3 (Interpretation of terms in this Act) of the Mersey Dock Acts Consolidation Act 1858 other than words and expressions of which the meanings have been repealed by subsequent Acts shall have the same respective meanings And—

(2) The provisions of subsection (2) of section 3 (Meaning of
“ the port of Liverpool ” “ vessel ” “ steam vessel ” &c.) of the
Act of 1936 shall extend to and apply for the purposes of this
Act as if those provisions were enacted in this Act.

Meaning of
“ conservancy
purposes ”.

4. For the purposes of the Act of 1936 the Act of 1945 and
this Act the expression “ conservancy purposes ” shall mean the
purposes of carrying out works or exercising the powers vested in
the Board in connection with the protecting improving main-
taining or preserving of the port of Liverpool and the sea channels
leading thereto or with the aiding of the navigation thereof.

PART II

RATES AND CHARGES

Dock tonnage
rates.

5. A vessel other than a seaplane entering into leaving or
making use of the docks shall be liable to pay to the Board
according to the tonnage burthen thereof the dock tonnage rate
specified in the First Schedule to this Act appropriate to the
voyage or description of the vessel and the said rate shall be paid
to the Board by the owner or master of the vessel.

Harbour rates.

6. A vessel other than a seaplane coming into or going out of
the port of Liverpool and not entering into leaving or making use
of the docks shall be liable to pay to the Board according to the
tonnage burthen thereof the harbour rate specified in the First
Schedule to this Act appropriate to the voyage or description of
the vessel and the said rate shall be paid to the Board by the
owner or master of the vessel.

Additional
tonnage rates.

7.—(1) A vessel other than a seaplane remaining in the docks
shall be liable to pay to the Board according to the tonnage
burthen thereof the additional tonnage rate specified in the
Second Schedule to this Act and the said rate shall be paid to the
Board by the owner or master of the vessel.

(2) If a vessel which in the opinion of the Board is neglected laid up or unemployed shall remain in the docks after the expiration of the term (not being less than fourteen days) of any notice to the owner to remove the vessel therefrom which shall have been left on board the vessel the additional tonnage rate which the vessel shall be liable to pay to the Board in respect of the period during which the vessel shall remain in the docks after the expiration of the said term shall be of such amount as the Board may from time to time determine but not exceeding four times the additional tonnage rate payable to the Board in respect of that period under the provisions of subsection (1) of this section. Provided that a notice as aforesaid shall not be given to the owner of a vessel liable to pay any dock tonnage rate until after the vessel has been in the docks for two months computed from the time of first entering the docks but exclusive of any period during which the vessel shall have used a graving dock.

(3) Nothing in subsection (2) of this section shall prejudice or take away any of the powers of the Board under section 4 (Removal and sale of vessels in docks) of the Act of 1900 or any other power of the Board under the existing Acts or otherwise with reference to the removal of vessels in or from the docks.

8.—(1) A vessel other than a seaplane engaging going into or using a graving dock shall be liable to pay to the Board according to the tonnage burthen thereof and the period (if any) during which the vessel shall remain in the graving dock the graving dock rates specified in the Third Schedule to this Act and the said rates shall be paid to the Board by the owner or master of the vessel. Graving dock rates.

(2) The Board may whenever they shall think fit require a reasonable sum (having regard to the probable amount of the graving dock rates which will become payable in respect of the vessel) to be paid by the owner or master thereof by way of deposit before the vessel is permitted to engage go into or to use any graving dock.

(3) If a vessel which has gone into or made use of a graving dock shall remain therein after the expiration of the term for which she engaged the same or after the expiration of any extended term for which she may have been allowed to use the same the graving dock rate which the vessel shall be liable to pay to the Board in respect of the period during which the vessel shall remain in the graving dock after the expiration of the said term or extended term shall be of such amount as the Board may from time to time determine but not exceeding four times the graving dock rate recoverable by the Board in respect of that period under the provisions of subsection (1) of this section.

(4) Nothing in subsection (3) of this section shall prejudice or take away any powers of the Board under section 279 (Removal of vessels from graving docks) of the Act of 1858 or any other power of the Board under the existing Acts or otherwise with reference to a vessel going into or using a graving dock.

Dock rates
on goods.

9. Any goods imported otherwise than in a seaplane into the port of Liverpool and brought into the docks or landed at or deposited upon or carried over any quay pier landing stage or land belonging to or for the time being held by the Board or exported otherwise than in a seaplane from the said port which may at any time previously have been brought into the docks or landed at or deposited upon or carried over any quay pier landing stage or land belonging to or for the time being held by the Board shall be liable to the rate specified in the Fourth Schedule to this Act appropriate to the goods and the said rate shall be paid to the Board by the owner of the goods but goods brought from any part or place situate within the limits of the river Mersey or any inland canal or navigable river communicating therewith shall not unless subsequently exported out of the port of Liverpool be liable to the said rate.

Revision of
rates.

10.—(1) If it is represented by application in writing to the Minister—

- (a) by any chamber of commerce or shipping or any representative body of traders or shipowners ; or
- (b) by any person who in the opinion of the Minister has a substantial interest in the trade of the port of Liverpool and is a proper person to make an application ; or
- (c) by the Board ;

that under the circumstances then existing the authorised rates should be revised in whole or in part the Minister if he thinks fit may make an order revising all or any of the authorised rates referred to in the application and may fix the date as from which such order shall take effect and thenceforth such order shall remain in force until the same expires or is revoked or modified by a further order of the Minister made in pursuance of this subsection.

(2) An application made to the Minister under subsection (1) of this section shall be accompanied by such information and particulars as the Minister may consider relevant certified in such manner as he may require.

(3) Where upon an application under subsection (1) of this section an order has been made or the Minister has decided not to make an order no further application for a revision of any of the authorised rates to which the application related shall be made within twelve months from the date of such order or decision as the case may be.

(4) Before making an order under subsection (1) of this section the Minister shall consult with such bodies or persons as aforesaid as appear to him to be appropriate and with the Board if they are not the applicants.

(5) For the purpose of ascertaining such bodies or persons as aforesaid the Minister may require public notice of the application to be given.

(6) Where an objection to an application is made by the Board or by any such body or person as aforesaid and is not withdrawn the Minister unless it appears to him that the objection is of a trivial nature shall cause an inquiry to be held in reference to the application.

(7) Subsections (2) to (5) of section 290 of the Local Government Act 1933 shall apply to any inquiry which the Minister may cause to be held under subsection (6) of this section as if it were an inquiry held in pursuance of subsection (1) of the said section 290 and the Board were a local authority. 23 & 24 Geo. 5.

(8) Subject to the proviso to this subsection the Minister shall not by an order under subsection (1) of this section make any such revision of the authorised rates as in his opinion would so far as can be estimated be likely to result in the annual revenue of any of the separate accounts kept by the Board pursuant to section 54 (Division of receipts and expenditure of Board into separate accounts) of the Act of 1857 as amended by this Act being insufficient or more than sufficient to enable the Board with efficient management of their undertaking to make adequate provision for paying all proper expenses of and connected with the working management and maintenance of that part of the undertaking to which the account relates including interest on loan capital (regard being had by him to any capital which the Board may reasonably be expected to expend) making good depreciation providing for any contributions which the Board may reasonably and properly carry to any reserve fund contingency fund or sinking fund and meeting all other costs charges and expenses if any properly chargeable to the revenue of that account:

Provided that in any case where the Minister is satisfied that there are special circumstances affecting the undertaking taking into account its financial condition during such period preceding the date on which an application is made under subsection (1) of this section as the Minister considers to be appropriate the Minister may revise the authorised rates in such manner as he thinks just and reasonable with due allowance for those special circumstances notwithstanding that the revision is likely to result in the revenue of the Board being insufficient to enable the Board to make adequate provision for all the matters referred to in the foregoing provisions of this subsection.

(9) The Minister shall not by an order under subsection (1) of this section make any revision of the harbour rates specified in the First Schedule to this Act unless the harbour rates to be paid in respect of the several and respective classes of voyages specified in that schedule as so revised bear to each other the same proportion as that which the harbour rates specified in that schedule bear to each other at the passing of this Act.

(10) The authorised rates as revised by an order under subsection (1) of this section shall not in any case be less than the maximum rates which the Board were authorised to levy demand and recover under or by virtue of the existing Acts.

(11) The power of the Minister to make an order under subsection (1) of this section shall be exercisable by statutory instrument.

(12) In this section the expression "authorised rates" means the rates authorised by this Act for the time being payable to the Board.

Applying

11. The provisions of Part XI (With respect to rates and duties) and Part XII (With respect to graving docks) of the Act of 1858 shall so far as applicable apply with the necessary modifications to the rates authorised by this Act.

12. Section 267 (Exemption of vessels in Her Majesty's service etc. from rates) of the Act of 1858 as applied to the rates authorised by this Act shall have effect as if for the words from "or any packet boat" to "any such packet boat or packet" there were substituted the words "or any vessel employed by or under the authority of the Postmaster-General for the conveyance of postal packets as defined by the Post Office Act 1908 not being a vessel also conveying passengers or goods for hire or reward or any mail bag as defined by the said Act conveyed by any such vessel".

Power to
lower and raise
rates.

13. The Board may if they think fit from time to time lower and again from time to time advance all or any of the rates authorised by or under this Act but so that the same shall never respectively exceed the respective amounts so authorised. Provided that—

(a) the harbour rates to be paid in respect of the several and respective classes of voyages specified in Part I of the First Schedule to this Act shall at all times bear to each other the same proportion as that which the harbour rates specified in that schedule bear to each other at the passing of this Act; and

(b) the harbour rates when so lowered or advanced shall not with the other revenue of the Board required to be credited to the conservancy revenue account by

- (i) the expenses incurred in connection with lighthouses buoys lightships beacons seamarks landmarks telegraphs and lifeboats ;
- (ii) the expenses incurred in connection with the offices of the marine surveyor and of the water bailiff ;
- (iii) the expenses incurred in connection with the raising destroying or removing of sunken vessels and other impediments to navigation ;
- (iv) the expenses incurred in improving the port of Liverpool or the navigation of the river Mersey ;
- (v) interest on moneys borrowed for conservancy purposes which is required to be debited to the conservancy revenue account by section 11 (Interest chargeable against conservancy revenue account) of the Act of 1936 ;
- (vi) the sums apportioned by the Board to the conservancy revenue account under section 19 (Apportionment of payments into sinking fund between different accounts) of the Act of 1936 ; and
- (vii) such other expenses or provisions as may be incurred or made for conservancy purposes :

Provided that nothing in this section shall be construed as—

- (a) requiring the Board to credit the conservancy revenue account with money borrowed for conservancy purposes or to charge to that account expenditure incurred for purposes to which capital is properly applicable ; or
- (b) preventing the Board with the consent of the conservancy commissioners from applying any portion of their general receipts in improving the port of Liverpool or the navigation of the river Mersey under section 55 (Power to Board to vary amount of rates) of the Act of 1857 as amended by this Act.

Form of registers.

19. It shall not be lawful to exercise the powers of borrowing conferred upon the Board by this Act (other than the power of borrowing to pay the costs charges and expenses referred to in section 33 (Costs of Act) of this Act) otherwise than in compliance with the provisions of any order for the time being in force made under section 1 of the Borrowing (Control and Guarantees) Act 1946.

20.—(1) Any register minute book or book of account required by the existing Acts to be kept by the Board or any officer of the Board or by the bank as defined in section 22

section 18 (Conservancy revenue account) of this Act be higher than is necessary for the purposes of the expenditure properly debited to that account under that section.

14. In addition to any remedy given by the existing Acts the Recovery of Board may recover any rates payable to them as a debt in any rates. court of competent jurisdiction.

PART III

FINANCIAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE

15. The Board may from time to time borrow at interest on the security of the rates for the time being belonging to them any further sum or sums not exceeding in the whole— Further borrowing powers for works and

(i) for the purposes of the works authorised by the Act of 1945 an additional three million five hundred thousand pounds.

(ii) for the general purposes of their undertaking an additional six million five hundred thousand pounds.

16. The Board may from time to time for conservancy purposes borrow at interest on the security of the rates for the time being belonging to them in addition to the sums which they are authorised to borrow for those purposes by the Act of 1912 (as amended by the Act of 1920) the Act of 1928 and the Act of 1945 any further sum or sums not exceeding in the whole two million pounds. Further borrowing powers for conservancy purposes.

17. All moneys borrowed by the Board under the authority of this Act shall be applied by them for the purposes to which capital is properly applicable and not otherwise. Application of moneys.

18.—(1) The Board shall credit the account known as the “conservancy revenue account” with— Conservancy revenue account.

(i) any sum receivable by way of the harbour rate payable in respect of a vessel;

(ii) such proportion of any sum receivable by way of the dock tonnage rate payable in respect of a vessel as is equal to the sum which would for the time being have been payable by way of harbour rate in respect of that vessel for the same voyage or description of voyage if the vessel had not entered into left or made use of the docks; and

(iii) such other sums as may be receivable for conservancy purposes.

(2) The Board shall charge the said conservancy revenue account with—

(Power to make arrangements with bankers etc. for management etc.) of the Act of 1899 may notwithstanding anything in those Acts be kept either by making entries in bound books or by recording the matters in question in any other manner.

(2) Where any such register minute book or book of account is not kept by making entries in a bound book but by some other means adequate precautions shall be taken for guarding against falsification and for facilitating its discovery.

PART IV

MISCELLANEOUS

21.—(1) The Board shall appropriate for the convenient working and mooring of ferry vessels the river frontage of the western side of the floating landing stage to the extent of 696 feet at the south end thereof and may from time to time so appropriate such other portion of the floating landing stage as the Board deem expedient. As to landing stages.

(2) The portion of the floating landing stage for the time being appropriated pursuant to subsection (1) of this section (hereafter to be known as "~~the George's landing stage~~") shall for the purposes of the provisions of section 69 (Landing stages to be maintained) of the Act of 1858 be deemed to be the landing stage at George's pier and for the purpose of the provisions of subsection (2) of section 9 (Provision for the protection of the tolls) section 10 (Certain works under this Act to be in substitution of other works authorised by Act of 1860) section 11 (Power to erect toll-gates on new floating landing stage) and section 12 (Accommodation of railway boats at landing stage at Liverpool) of the Act of 1871 shall be substituted for the ferry landing stage as authorised by that Act and by section 19 (Power to alter ferry landing stage) of the Act of 1889 to be constructed or appropriated to the use of ferry steamboats.

(3) The portion of the floating landing stage not appropriated pursuant to subsection (1) of this section (hereafter to be known as "~~the Prince's landing stage~~") shall for the purpose of the provisions of section 28 (Landing stage in front of Prince's dock to be completed) of the Act of 1857 section 69 (Landing stages to be maintained) of the Act of 1858 and section 23 (Tolls rates and charges for use of landing stages etc.) of the Act of 1920 be deemed to be the landing stage in front of or at the Prince's pier.

(4) For the purposes of this section "floating landing stage" means all the existing landing stages at Liverpool heretofore known as the landing stage for ferry or river steamboats not drawing more than six feet of water at George's pier the George's landing stage the landing stage for sea-going steamers in front

of the Prince's dock the landing stage for sea-going vessels at the Prince's pier the Prince's landing stage and the ferry landing stage.

(5) Nothing in this section shall prejudice diminish alter or affect any existing rights powers or privileges vested in the mayor aldermen and burgesses of the county borough of Birkenhead or in the mayor aldermen and burgesses of the county borough of Wallasey in relation to their respective ferry undertakings or in the respective owners or lessees thereof.

22. The following provisions shall have effect in lieu of subsection (2) of section 7 (Power to remove wrecks or other obstructions) of the Act of 1912:—

“(2) The provisions of subsection (1) of this section shall not extend to or within—

(a) any canal dock or works the property of the Manchester Ship Canal Company ; or

(b) any part of the river Weaver ; or

(c) that part of the river Mersey or the estuary thereof in the borough of Bebington in the county of Chester which is bounded on the east by an imaginary straight line (commencing at high water mark ~~south eastward of Eastham locks~~) drawn through a point distant 200 yards on a true bearing of 62° from the centre of the mitre post of the storm gates of the 80 feet lock at Eastham locks and another point distant 1,400 yards on a true bearing of 52° from the easternmost chimney of Price's candle works in the said borough and terminating 300 yards beyond the latter point on the north by an imaginary straight line drawn from the termination of the last-mentioned line to the point at which the said bearing of 52° intersects high-water mark and on the west by high-water mark ; or

((d) any part of the upper Mersey as defined in the Upper Mersey Navigation Act 1876 made and maintained by the said company under the provisions of the Manchester Ship Canal Act 1885 to or from the low-water channels in any part of the said upper Mersey from or to the works numbered respectively in section 28 of the last-mentioned Act number 1G(A) number 1G(C) and number 1H(A) ”.

23. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 14 (Substitution of observatory at Bidston for old observatory at Liverpool) of the Act of 1867 the Board may with the consent in writing of the Minister which consent may be signified under the hand of the acting conservator of the river Mersey cease to maintain the observatory on Bidston Hill and its instruments and appurtenances.

27. Section 78 (Residences may be provided for harbour-masters etc.) of the Act of 1858 shall be read and have effect and be deemed always to have had effect as if in that section as originally enacted the words "purchase by agreement" had been inserted before the words "take on lease".

Power to
dispose of land.

28. The Board may dispose of any land (or any estate or interest therein) for the time being vested in them and which may not be required by them or which consistently with the objects and purposes of the Acts relating to the Board already passed or to be passed may be used and enjoyed by the purchasers lessees and tenants thereof in such manner (whether by way of sale exchange lease the creation of any easement right or privilege or otherwise) for such period upon such conditions and for such consideration as they may think fit:

Provided that the Board shall not sell any land to which the provisions of sections 127 to 131 (inclusive) of the Lands Clauses Consolidation Act 1845 apply otherwise than in accordance with those provisions so far as applicable.

29.—(1) Any constable or any responsible officer of the Board may require any person on or seeking access to the Mersey Dock Estate or land belonging to or for the time being held by the Board within the ring ownership boundary of their estate or any vessel using the docks to state truly his name and address and the nature and place of his business thereon or his purpose thereon or in seeking access thereto and may require any such person to produce for inspection by such constable or officer any pass or other authority which may have been issued to him by or on behalf of the Board and any person who fails to comply with any such requirement shall be guilty of an offence against this subsection and be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

(2) All offences against subsection (1) of this section may be prosecuted under the Summary Jurisdiction Acts Provided that section 326 (Penalties to be summarily recovered before justices) of the Act of 1858 (so far as that section relates to the service of summonses) and section 345 (The jurisdiction of borough justices extended over the Liverpool docks of the Board) of that Act shall apply to any proceedings under the said subsection.

(3) Any constable or any responsible officer of the Board may remove from the Mersey Dock Estate or land belonging to or for the time being held by the Board within the ring ownership boundary of their estate or from any vessel using the docks any disorderly person or any person having no right or lawful purpose thereon and may prevent any such person from having access thereto.

24.—(1) Section 221 (Power to make byelaws for the purposes herein stated) of the Act of 1858 shall be read and have effect as if the words “by the public” in the first paragraph thereof were omitted.

(2) The power conferred on the Board by the third subparagraph of the said section 221 to make byelaws for regulating the mooring and anchoring of vessels in the river Mersey and for prescribing the limits within which and the particular places at which vessels may be moored anchored or coaled shall include a power to make byelaws prescribing the limits within which and the particular places at which vessels or any class or classes of vessels shall not be moored anchored or coaled or otherwise bunkered.

25.—(1) The Board may from time to time for the purpose of facilitating or expediting the loading and discharging of the cargoes of vessels set apart or appropriate any one or more of the docks or of the berths therein for the reception of vessels the cargoes whereof shall be loaded discharged received and handled by persons employed by the Board.

(2) Notwithstanding the provisions of section 35 (One set of porters to receive etc. the cargo of each vessel) of the Act of 1858 and section 17 (Penalty on persons acting as master stevedores or master lumpers without having given bond) of the Act of 1861 the Board may ship stow unstow unship receive weigh load off and do any other act whatever in connection with any cargo of any vessel lying in such of the docks or at such of the berths as may be set apart or appropriated pursuant to subsection (1) of this section or in connection with any cargo for the time being deposited on any of the quays or in any of the sheds adjacent to any of such docks or berths and may make reasonable charges for the work so done.

(3) Notwithstanding the provisions of section 43 (Owner of the entire cargo may employ any master porter that he may think proper) of the Act of 1858 and section 18 (Owner or master of a vessel may employ the crew to discharge cargo) of the Act of 1861 a person who is not employed by the Board shall not without the consent of the Board do or employ any other person to do any act whatever in connection with any such cargo as is referred to in subsection (2) of this section.

26. Section 172 (Board may erect warehouses on quays) of the Act of 1858 shall be read and have effect and be deemed always to have had effect as if in that section as originally enacted the words “or upon any land belonging to or for the time being held by them” had been inserted before the words “such and so many warehouses”.

(4) Any constable or any officer of His Majesty's customs or any responsible officer of the Board may detain and search on or within the Mersey Dock Estate or land belonging to or for the time being held by the Board within the ring ownership boundary of their estate any person or any vehicle vessel or other property upon whom or in or about which there is reasonable cause for believing that there may be found any uncustomed or prohibited goods or anything stolen or unlawfully obtained from the said estate or land or from any vessel using the docks.

(5) In this section the expression "ring ownership boundary" means the boundary within which is included all lands belonging to or for the time being held by the Board and not separated from a dock by land in other ownership or by a road repairable by the inhabitants at large.

30. Nothing in section 29 (Powers of interrogation removal and search) of this Act shall be deemed to defeat affect or prejudice— For protection of corporations of Bootle and Liverpool.

(a) the right of the public to use the river embankment as a parade or walk for recreation as granted by section 23 of the local Act 11 Victoria c. x and extended by section 13 (For protection of corporation of Bootle) of the Act of 1906; or

(b) the right of the public to use the river embankment known as Albert Parade in the city of Liverpool as a parade or walk for recreation.

31. —(1) Section 19 (Power to borrow) of the Wallasey Embankment Act 1894 as amended by section 4 (Enlarge-ment and alteration of borrowing powers) of the Wallasey Embankment Act 1923 and by section 55 (Amendment of Wallasey Embankment Acts) of the Act of 1945 shall be read and have effect as if in the proviso to paragraph (C) of the said section 19 as amended the words "one hundred thousand" were substituted for the words "fifty thousand". Amendment of Wallasey Embankment Acts. 57 & 58 Vict. c. ci. 13 Geo. 5. c. iii.

(2) It shall not be lawful to exercise the powers of borrowing conferred under subsection (1) of this section otherwise than in compliance with the provisions of any order for the time being in force made under section 1 of the Borrowing (Control and Guarantees) Act 1946.

32. The existing Acts specified in the Fifth Schedule to this Act are hereby repealed to the extent specified in that schedule. Repeals.

33. The Board out of any moneys for the time being in their hands shall pay and discharge all the costs charges and expenses of and incident to the applying for obtaining and passing of this Act. Costs of Act.
