#### Costs

### 52 Award of costs where information or complaint is not proceeded with.

- (3) Where—
  - (a) .....<sup>F2</sup>
  - (b) a complaint is made to a justice of the peace [<sup>F3</sup>acting in any local justice area]<sup>F3</sup> but the complaint is not proceeded with,

a magistrates' court  $[^{F4}acting in that area]^{F4}$  may make such order as to costs to be paid . . .  $^{F5}$ , by the complainant to the defendant as it thinks just and reasonable.

# <sup>F6</sup>(3A).....

(4) An order under subsection (3) above shall specify the amount of the costs ordered to be paid.

 $(5) \dots$ <sup>F5</sup> for the purpose of enforcement an order under subsection (3) above made in relation to a complaint which is not proceeded with shall be treated as if it were an order made under [<sup>F7</sup>section 64 of the Magistrates' Courts Act 1980] (power to award, and enforcement of, costs in civil proceedings).
