The Chartered Associations (Scout Association)

Protection Order 1967

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 13th day of November 1967

Present,

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Upon application of the Scout Association (being an association incorporated by Royal Charter and not being an association representative of any profession or business), made after notice thereof had been given in such manner and accompanied by such particulars as had been directed by the Secretary of State, Her Majesty, in pursuance of the powers conferred on Her by section 1 of the Chartered Associations (Protection of Names and Uniforms) Act 1926(a), is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

1.—(1) The name “The Scout Association” and the following names or designations used by the Scout Association for members thereof or for members of organisations constituted by the association in pursuance of their charter and supplemental charters, that is to say, “Cub Scout”; “Venture Scout”; “Air Scout”; “Sea Scout”; “Deep-Sea Scout”; “Assistant Cub Scout Leader”; “Assistant Scout Leader”; “Assistant Venture Scout Leader”; “Cub Scout Instructor”; “Cub Scout Leader”; “Scout Leader”; “Venture Scout Leader”; “Group Scout Leader”; “Assistant District Commissioner (Scouts)”; “Assistant County Commissioner (Scouts)”; “Regional Scout Commissioner”; and “Scouter” are hereby protected under the Chartered Associations (Protection of Names and Uniforms) Act 1926.

(2) The following badges to be worn with uniform used by the said association :—

- (a) a badge made of embroidered or woven cloth, man-made fibre, metal or synthetic substances and showing a Fleur de Lys with a star superimposed on or cut out of each of the two side petals ;
- (b) a decoration hung as an order round the neck by means of a green ribbon with one narrow yellow vertical stripe and consisting of a small representation in metal of a wolf,

are hereby protected under the said Act.

(3) The following badge to be worn without uniform used by the said association, that is to say, a badge made of metal or synthetic substances and showing a Fleur de Lys with a star superimposed on or cut out of each of the two side petals, is hereby protected under the said Act.

2. The Chartered Associations (Boy Scouts Association) Protection Order 1927(a) and the Chartered Associations (Boy Scouts Association) Protection Order 1962(b) are hereby revoked.

3. This Order may be cited as the Chartered Associations (Scout Association) Protection Order 1967 and shall come into operation on 1st December 1967.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This Note is not part of the Order.)

Under the Chartered Associations (Protection of Names and Uniforms) Act 1926 an Order in Council may be made on the application of an association incorporated by Royal Charter (not being an association representative of any profession or business) protecting any name, designation, uniform or badge used by that association and specified in the Order, and thereupon it is, subject to the provisions of the Act, an offence to use, without the authority of that association, any such name, designation, uniform or badge. Under this Order the names listed in the Order and the badges described in the Order, all used by the Scout Association, are so protected.

The Order replaces the corresponding Orders which gave similar protection in respect of the Boy Scouts Association, as the Scout Association was formerly called.
