# The Anti-Dumping Duty (No. 2) Order 1971

The Secretary of State, in exercise of the powers conferred upon him by sections 1 and 2 of the Customs Duties (Dumping and Subsidies) Act 1969(a), hereby makes the following Order:—

- 1. This Order may be cited as the Anti-Dumping Duty (No. 2) Order 1971 and shall come into operation on 27th February 1971.
- 2. There shall be charged on the import into the United Kingdom of any goods of the description set out in the Schedule hereto (being goods classified in the Customs Tariff 1959(b) under the heading mentioned in the first column of that Schedule) a duty of customs at the rate mentioned in the third column.
- 3. Section 2 of the Customs Duties (Dumping and Subsidies) Act 1969 (which allows relief to be given where goods are shown not to have been dumped or where the margin of dumping is less than the amount of the duty) shall apply to the duty imposed by this Order.
