**The Import Duties (Temporary Exemptions)
(No. 4) Order 1972**

<i>Made - - - -</i>	<i>19th May 1972</i>
<i>Laid before the House of Commons</i>	<i>25th May 1972</i>
<i>Coming into Operation</i>	<i>1st June 1972</i>

The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by virtue of the powers conferred on them by sections 3(6) and 13 of the Import Duties Act 1958(a), and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, on the recommendation of the Secretary of State, hereby make the following Order:—

1.—(1) This Order may be cited as the Import Duties (Temporary Exemptions) (No. 4) Order 1972.

(2) The Interpretation Act 1889(b) shall apply for the interpretation of this Order as it applies for the interpretation of an Act of Parliament.

(3) This Order shall come into operation on 1st June 1972.

2.—(1) Until the beginning of 1st January 1973 or, in the case of goods in relation to which an earlier day is specified in the Schedule to this Order, until the beginning of that day, any import duty which is for the time being chargeable on goods of a heading of the Customs Tariff 1959 specified in that Schedule shall not be chargeable in respect of goods of any description there specified in relation to that heading.

(2) Any entry in column 2 in the Schedule to this Order shall be taken to comprise all goods which would be classified under an entry in the same terms constituting a subheading (other than the final subheading) in the relevant heading in the Customs Tariff 1959.

(3) For the purposes of classification under the Customs Tariff 1959, in so far as that depends on the rate of duty, any goods to which paragraph (1) above applies shall be treated as chargeable with the same duty as if this Order had not been made.

SCHEDULE

GOODS TEMPORARILY EXEMPT FROM IMPORT DUTY

29.16	2-(3-Benzoylphenyl)propionic acid Prostaglandin E ₁
29.22	2,6-Dichloro-4-nitroaniline

39.01	Polycondensation products of 2,4,6-triisopropylphenylcarbodi-imide containing not less than 5 per cent. of carbodi-imide groups estimated as CN ₂ (and in the forms covered by Note 3(b) of Chapter 39)
56.02	“Synthetic hair” being continuous filament tow of co-polymerised vinyl chloride and acrylonitrile, dyed and having a total weight of more than 60 grammes per metre (60,000 tex/540,000 denier), the individual filaments having an irregular cross-section, a specific gravity of less than 1.32 at 20° centigrade, and weighing more than 5.0 milligrammes per metre (50 dtex/45 denier)
76.16	Circular aluminium can ends spirally wound for opening with incorporated lift and pull tab and having an overall diameter of not less than 106 millimetres and not more than 110 millimetres
85.15	The following apparatus for use in aircraft: (a) automatic radio direction finding apparatus covering a frequency range of at least 200 KHz to 850 KHz; (b) distance measuring apparatus for determining the slant range from aircraft to ground transponder and operating within the frequency range of 960 MHz to 1,215 MHz; being in each case apparatus of a type approved by the Civil Aviation Authority, at the date of this Order, under Article 14(5) of the Air Navigation Order 1972, for use in aircraft of not more than 5,700 kilogrammes maximum total weight authorised, flying in controlled airspace in accordance with the Instrument Flight Rules as defined in the said Air Navigation Order, but not for use in other aircraft (until 1st September 1972)
90.09	Photo-reduction apparatus employing step and repeat operation in increments of integer multiples of 25 micrometres or less having an intrinsic repeatable positional accuracy in two axial directions of plus or minus 0.25 micrometre or better relative to an alignment datum over an area of not less than 75 millimetres by 75 millimetres and a resolution of 650 lines per millimetre or better over an area of not less than 3.37 millimetres by 3.37 millimetres (until 4th July 1972)
90.10	Automatic photomask copying machines to contact print under vacuum at a production rate of 250 masks per hour using plate sizes varying from 50 millimetres by 50 millimetres to 125 millimetres by 100 millimetres. Exposure of photoplates is by means of a pulsed xenon light source operating through a multi-element optical system 75 millimetres in diameter (until 4th July 1972)
91.03	Electric clocks of the instrument panel type designed to be permanently mounted in a motor vehicle and to be operated only by a current of not less than 12 volts provided by the battery of the vehicle (until 4th July 1972)

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This Note is not part of the Order)

This Order provides that the goods listed in the Schedule shall be temporarily exempt from import duty until 1st January 1973 or, in the case of certain items, until such earlier day as is specified.

As regards the exemption for equipment for use in aircraft under heading 85.15, apparatus of a type approved by the Civil Aviation Authority is listed in Civil Aviation Publication CAP 208, Airborne Radio Apparatus Vol. 2, published by Her Majesty's Stationery Office. This publication is subject to amendment, and confirmation that apparatus is of a type approved at the date of this Order should be obtained from the Civil Aviation Authority, Controllerate of National Air Traffic Services, Tels.N2(c), 19-29 Woburn Place, London, WC1H 0LX.

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
