The Trent River Authority (Ladybower Reservoir)
Order 1973

Made - - - - 7th February 1973
Laid before Parliament 16th February 1973
Coming into Operation 9th March 1973

The Secretary of State for the Environment, in exercise of his powers under section 1 of the Water Resources Act 1971(a) and of all other powers enabling him in that behalf hereby orders as follows:—

1. This order may be cited as the Trent River Authority (Ladybower Reservoir) Order 1973 and shall come into operation on 9th March 1973. Citation and commencement.

2.—(1) In this order unless the context otherwise requires:— Interpretation.
“day” means any period of 24 hours;

“the deposited map” means the map prepared in duplicate signed by an Under Secretary in the Department of the Environment and marked “map referred to in the Trent River Authority (Ladybower Reservoir) Order 1973” one duplicate of which is deposited and is available for inspection at the offices of the Authority and the other at the offices of the Secretary of State for the Environment;

“the Ladybower reservoir” means the reservoir of that name constructed under the Derwent Valley Water Acts 1920 and 1944(b) and owned by the Derwent Valley Water Board.

(2) The Interpretation Act 1889(c) shall apply for the interpretation of this order as it applies for the interpretation of an Act of Parliament.

3. The Trent River Authority are hereby authorised to discharge water from Ladybower reservoir at a rate not exceeding 30,000,000 gallons per day into the river Derwent below the existing dam in the reservoir at a discharge point at National Grid Reference SK 199853 and indicated on the deposited map. Discharge of water from Ladybower Reservoir.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This Note is not part of the Order.)

This Order is made under the Water Resources Act 1971 by the Secretary of State for the Environment, who is "the Minister" by virtue of section 1 of the Water Resources Act 1963 (c. 38) ("the principal Act") and the Secretary of State for the Environment Order 1970 (S.I. 1970/1681).

The order authorises the Trent River Authority to make discharges of water into the river Derwent at a place within the Peak District National Park.
