PUBLIC HEALTH, SCOTLAND

**The Public Health (Aircraft) (Scotland) Amendment
Regulations 1974**

Made - - - - - 10th June 1974

Laid before Parliament 21st June 1974

Coming into Operation 12th July 1974

In exercise of the powers conferred on me by section 1 of the Public Health (Scotland) Act 1945(a) and by that section as amended by section 69 of, and Schedule 11 to, the Civil Aviation Act 1949(b), by section 13 of the Airports Authority Act 1965(c), and by section 32 of the Civil Aviation Act 1971(d), and of all other powers enabling me in that behalf, I hereby make the following regulations:—

Citation, commencement and interpretation

1.—(1) These regulations may be cited as the Public Health (Aircraft) (Scotland) Amendment Regulations 1974 and shall come into operation on 12th July 1974.

(2) In these regulations, “the principal regulations” means the Public Health (Aircraft) (Scotland) Regulations 1971(e).

(3) The Interpretation Act 1889(f) shall apply for the interpretation of these regulations as it applies for the interpretation of an Act of Parliament.

Amendment of the principal regulations

2. Regulation 2 (definitions) of the principal regulations shall be amended as follows:—

(a) For the definition of “Aircraft Declaration of Health” there shall be substituted—

“ “Aircraft Declaration of Health” means a declaration containing the information specified in Schedule 1, being either a separate document or a part of the Aircraft General Declaration delivered in accordance with Appendix 5 of the International Health Regulations adopted by the 22nd World Health Assembly in 1969 as amended by the 26th World Health Assembly in 1973;”;

(b) between the definition of “day” and the definition of “disease subject to the International Health Regulations” there shall be inserted:—

- “ “designated medical officer” means a medical officer designated by a Health Board under section 21 of the National Health Service (Scotland) Act 1972(a) to exercise such functions on behalf of a local authority as may be assigned to him;”;
- (c) in the definition of “excepted area” there shall be included the territory of Spain;
- (d) between the definition of “excepted airport” and the definition of “immigration officer” there shall be inserted—
 “ “Health Board” means a board constituted under section 13 of the National Health Service (Scotland) Act 1972;”;
- (e) for the definition of “immigration officer” there shall be substituted—
 “ “immigration officer” means any person appointed to act as an immigration officer under the Immigration Act 1971(b);”;
- (f) for the definition of “International Health Regulations” there shall be substituted—
 “ “International Health Regulations” means the International Health Regulations adopted by the 22nd World Health Assembly in 1969 as amended by the 26th World Health Assembly in 1973;”;
- (g) for the definition of “local authority” there shall be substituted—
 “ “local authority” means—
 (i) until 15th May 1975, a county council or the town council of a large burgh;
 (ii) on and after 16th May 1975, an islands or district council;”;
- (h) for the definition of “medical officer” there shall be substituted the following:—
 “ “medical officer” means a designated medical officer or other medical officer of a Health Board to whom a responsible authority have assigned functions under regulation 5;”;
- (i) the definition of “medical practitioner” shall be deleted;
- (j) for the definition of “national airport” there shall be substituted—
 “ “national airport” means an aerodrome for the time being vested in or under the control of the Secretary of State for Trade or owned or managed by the British Airports Authority or by the Civil Aviation Authority;”;
- (k) for the definition of “valid International Vaccination Certificate” there shall be substituted—
 “ “valid International Vaccination Certificate” means a certificate of vaccination or revaccination against smallpox which—
 (a) being issued not later than 11th July 1974, is in the form required by these regulations as in force at that date or in a form substantially to the same effect and conforms with the rules as to validity referred to in these regulations as so in force; or
 (b) being issued on or after 12th July 1974, is in the form specified in Schedule 3 to these regulations, as amended by the Public Health (Aircraft) (Scotland) Amendment Regulations 1974, or in a form substantially to the same effect and conforms with the rules as to validity contained in that Schedule;”.

- 3.** Regulation 4 of the principal regulations shall be amended—
- (a) in paragraph (1)(a), by inserting after the words “Airports Authority Act, 1965” the words “or section 32(2) of the Civil Aviation Act 1971(a)”; and
- (b) in paragraph (3), by deleting the words “and Industry”.
- 4.** For regulation 5(a) and (b) of the principal regulations there shall be substituted—
- “5. For the purposes of these regulations a responsible authority other than the Secretary of State shall—
- (a) with the agreement of the Health Board for their area assign to such medical officers as may be necessary functions relating to the proper enforcement and execution of these regulations;
- (b) give directions from time to time after consultation with the Health Board for their area as to the duties which are to be performed by a medical officer or any other officer authorised to enforce and execute these regulations;”.
- 5.** In regulations 9(1)(b), 25(2), 31(a), (b) and (d) of the principal regulations for the words “the medical officer of health” there shall be substituted the words “a designated medical officer”, and in regulation 25(2) the words “of the responsible authority” shall be deleted.
- 6.** In regulation 32(2) of the principal regulations for the words “one hundred pounds” there shall be substituted the words “two hundred pounds”.
- 7.** For regulation 37 of the principal regulations there shall be substituted the following regulation:—
- “37. Nothing in these regulations shall affect the Immigration Act 1971(b) or Article 76 of the Air Navigation Order 1972(c).”.
- 8.** For Part II of Schedule 2 to the principal regulations there shall be substituted the following:—

PART II—CHOLERA

A. Infected aircraft and suspected aircraft

- (1) The medical officer—
- (a) may place under surveillance any person who disembarks from an aircraft, the period of surveillance being reckoned from the date of disembarkation from the aircraft.
- (b) shall be responsible for the supervision of the removal and safe disposal of any water, food (excluding cargo), human dejecta, waste water, waste matter and any other matter which is considered to be contaminated and shall be responsible for the disinfection of water tanks and food handling equipment.
- (2) Foodstuffs carried as cargo on board aircraft in which a case of cholera has occurred during the journey may not be subject to bacteriological examination except by the health authorities of the country of final destination.”

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This Note is not part of the Regulations.)

These Regulations amend the Public Health (Aircraft) (Scotland) Regulations 1971, which provide for public health control over aircraft arriving in or leaving Scotland.

The amendments are intended to ensure conformity with the current International Health Regulations of the World Health Assembly. The amendments also deal with the changes brought about by the reorganisation of the National Health Service and forthcoming local government changes in Scotland. They also provide for application of the Regulations to aerodromes vested in civil aviation authorities by the Civil Aviation Act 1971.

Other changes include the methods to be used for dealing with cholera and the status of Spain which has become one of the "excepted territories".
