The Summer Time Order 1980

Laid before Parliament in draft

Made - - - 28th July 1980

Coming into Operation 28th July 1980

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 28th day of July 1980 Present,

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council

Whereas a draft of this Order was laid before Parliament in accordance with the provisions of section 2 of the Summer Time Act 1972(a) (hereinafter referred to as "the Act") and an Address has been presented to Her Majesty by each House of Parliament praying that an Order be made in the terms of this Order:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred upon Her by the said section 2, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

- 1.—(1) This Order may be cited as the Summer Time Order 1980, and shall come into operation forthwith.
- (2) This Order shall have effect in the United Kingdom and the Bailiwick of Guernsey.
- 2. In relation to the year 1981, the period of summer time for the purposes of the Act shall be the period beginning at one o'clock, Greenwich mean time, in the morning of 29th March 1981 and ending at one o'clock, Greenwich mean time, in the morning of 25th October 1981 instead of the period specified in section 1 of the Act.
- 3. In relation to the year 1982, the period of summer time for the purposes of the Act shall be the period beginning at one o'clock, Greenwich mean time,

in the morning of 28th March 1982 and ending at one o'clock, Greenwich mean time, in the morning of 24th October 1982 instead of the period specified in section 1 of the Act.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This Note is not part of the Order.)

This Order provides for the periods of summer time in 1981 and 1982 during which the time for general purposes in the United Kingdom will be one hour in advance of Greenwich mean time. The Order also applies to the Bailiwick of Guernsey but not to the Bailiwick of Jersey or the Isle of Man which have their own legislation on the subject.
