**The Extradition (Internationally Protected Persons)
(Amendment) Order 1986**

Made - - - - - 25th November 1986

Laid before Parliament 3rd December 1986

Coming into Operation 1st January 1987

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 25th day of November 1986

Present,

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council

Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred upon Her by sections 2, 17 and 21 of the Extradition Act 1870(a) and sections 3(2) and 4(1) of the Internationally Protected Persons Act 1978(b), or otherwise in Her Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Extradition (Internationally Protected Persons) (Amendment) Order 1986 and shall come into operation on 1st January 1987.

2. The Extradition (Internationally Protected Persons) Order 1979(c) shall be amended by adding to Schedule 2 (which names the foreign States with which the United Kingdom has extradition treaties in force and which are parties to the Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of Crimes against Internationally Protected Persons, including Diplomatic Agents, signed at New York on 14th December 1973(d)) the following entry:—
