The Consular Fees Order 1989

Made - - - - - *7th February 1989*

Coming into force - - - - - *1st April 1989*

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 7th day of February 1989

Present,

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council

Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred upon Her by section 1(1) of the Consular Fees Act 1980⁽¹⁾ or otherwise enabling Her in that behalf, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. This Order shall come into force on 1st April 1989 and may be cited as the Consular Fees Order 1989.

2 In this Order—

- (a) “consular officer” means any person authorised by the Secretary of State to exercise consular functions, or functions in the United Kingdom which correspond with consular functions, (including persons who are not, as well as persons who are, consular officers);
- (b) “consular employee” means any person employed in the administrative or technical service of the consular post or diplomatic mission;
- (c) “consular premises” means the buildings or parts of buildings used for the purposes of the consular post or diplomatic mission;
- (d) “entry clearance” means a visa, entry certificate, entry permit or other document which, in accordance with the applicable immigration laws or rules, is to be taken as evidence of a person's eligibility for entry into the United Kingdom, a dependency of the United Kingdom, or any other country or territory, as the case may be (but does not include a work permit).
- (e) “replacement passport” means a passport issued in substitution for a valid passport in order to incorporate an addition or amendment thereto.

3. The several fees set forth in the table in the Schedule annexed to this Order are prescribed to be levied by consular officers and by marriage officers under the Foreign Marriage Act 1892⁽²⁾ and

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the Marriage with Foreigners Act 1906⁽³⁾ in the execution of their duties, and the said table shall be construed as part of this Order.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This note is not part of the Order)

This Order revokes and replaces the Consular Fees Order 1987 and subsequent amending Orders. It increases some consular fees by amounts that are intended to reflect, as far as possible, the cost of providing the services. The average increase is approximately 20%. It rationalises and clarifies the description of the services for which fees are charged. In particular, the introduction of the new United Kingdom passport in the European Community common format and the cessation of the issue of standard passports which include the particulars of a spouse, have necessitated a revision of the fees for Passports, Visas and Kindred Matters in Part II. The fees in respect of Shipping, Seamen and Kindred Matters in Part IX have been rationalised and reduced in number.
