**The Newham Healthcare National Health Service Trust
(Change of Name) (Establishment) Amendment Order 2004**

Made - - - - 24th June 2004

Coming into force - - 5th July 2004

The Secretary of State for Health, in exercise of the powers conferred upon him by section 126(3) and 126(4) of the National Health Service Act 1977(1), and by section 5(1) of, and paragraph 3(1) (a) and (b) of Schedule 2 to, the National Health Service and Community Care Act 1990(2), and of all other powers enabling him in that behalf, hereby makes the following Order:

Citation, commencement and interpretation

1.—(1) This Order may be cited as the Newham Healthcare National Health Service Trust (Change of Name) (Establishment) Amendment Order 2004 and shall come into force on 5th July 2004.

(2) In this Order—

- (a) “the Order” means the Newham Healthcare National Health Service Trust (Establishment) Order 1994(3);
- (b) “the trust” means the National Health Service trust established by the Order.

Change of name of NHS trust and transitional provision

2.—(1) The trust shall be called the Newham University Hospital National Health Service Trust instead of the Newham Healthcare National Health Service Trust, and accordingly in article 1(2) of the Order in the definition of “the trust”, and in article 2 of the Order, for “Newham Healthcare” there shall be substituted “Newham University Hospital”.

- (2) The change of name effected by paragraph (1) shall not—
- (a) affect any right or obligation of any person; or
 - (b) be taken as invalidating any instrument (whether made before or on or after the day on which this Order comes into force) which refers to the trust by its previous name,
- and all instruments and other documents which refer to the trust under its previous name shall be construed as referring to it under its new name.

Amendment of nature and functions of the trust

- 3.—**(1) In article 3(1) of the Order (nature and functions of the trust) “(a)” shall be deleted.
- (2) Article 3(2) of the Order (nature and functions of the trust) shall be replaced by the following—
- “(2) The trust’s functions shall be to provide goods and services, namely hospital accommodation and services, and community health services, for the purposes of the health service.”.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This note is not part of the Order)

This Order amends the Newham Healthcare National Health Service Trust (Establishment) Order 1994.

Article 2 of the Order changes the name of the trust from the Newham Healthcare National Health Service Trust to the Newham University Hospital National Health Service Trust, and makes consequential amendments to the Establishment Order. Article 3 of the Order removes the references to the establishments from which the trust carries out its functions.
