The Cattle Identification (Amendment) Regulations 2007

The Secretary of State, who is a Minister designated for the purposes of section 2(2) of the European Communities Act 1972^(a) in relation to the common agricultural policy of the European Community^(b) and in relation to measures in the veterinary and phytosanitary fields for the protection of public health^(c), makes the following Regulations.

Title, application and commencement

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Cattle Identification (Amendment) Regulations 2007; they apply in England and come into force on 1st May 2007.

Amendment to the Cattle Identification Regulations 2007

2. The Cattle Identification Regulations 2007^(d) are amended by adding after regulation 3(3) the following paragraph—

“(4) Any person who fails to comply with paragraph (1) or (3) is guilty of an offence.”
