The Veterinary Surgery (Vaccination of Badgers Against Tuberculosis) Order 2010

Made	1st March 2010
Laid before Parliament	5th March 2010
Coming into force	6th April 2010

The Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, the Secretary of State for Scotland, the Secretary of State for Wales and the Minister of Agriculture and Rural Development for Northern Ireland acting jointly, in exercise of the powers conferred by section 19(4)(e) of the Veterinary Surgeons Act 1966(1), and now vested in them(2) and after consultation with the Council of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons, make the following Order:

Title, commencement and extent

- 1. This Order—
 - (a) may be cited as the Veterinary Surgery (Vaccination of Badgers Against Tuberculosis) Order 2010 and comes into force on 6 April 2010; and
 - (b) extends to Great Britain.

By virtue of section 95(5) of, and paragraph 10 of Schedule 12 to, the Northern Ireland Act 1998 (c. 47) the reference in the Veterinary Surgeons Act 1966 to the Minister of Agriculture for Northern Ireland is to be construed as a reference to the Northern Ireland Minister in charge of that department. The Department of Agriculture for Northern Ireland was renamed the Department of Agriculture and Rural Development by Article 3(4) of the Departments (Northern Ireland) Order 1999 (S.I. 1999/283(N.I. 1)).

Exemption from prohibition on the practice of veterinary surgery

2.—(1) Section 19(1) of the Veterinary Surgeons Act 1966 does not prohibit the vaccination by injection of badgers against tuberculosis if the conditions in paragraph (2) are complied with.

(2) The conditions are that the person administering the vaccine—

- (a) is 18 years old or over and—
 - (i) has successfully completed an approved course;
 - (ii) holds a valid certificate of competence in the vaccination of badgers by injection, granted by the course provider; and
 - (iii) acts under the direction of a veterinary surgeon; or
- (b) is 18 years old or over and carries out the vaccination as part of an approved course.

(3) In this article "approved course" means a course relating to the vaccination of badgers by injection, approved for the time being by the Secretary of State after consultation with the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons.
