

**EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM TO
THE EDUCATION (DESIGNATED INSTITUTIONS) (ENGLAND) ORDER 2015**

2015 No. 1703

1. This explanatory memorandum has been prepared by the Department for Business, Innovation and Skills and is laid before Parliament by Command of Her Majesty.
2. **Purpose of the instrument**
 - 2.1 This Order designates The British School of Osteopathy as eligible to receive funding administered by the Higher Education Funding Council for England.
3. **Matters of special interest to the Joint Committee on Statutory Instruments**
 - 3.1 None
4. **Legislative Context**
 - 4.1 Section 129 of the Education Reform Act, as amended by the Further and Higher Education Act 1992, makes provision for the Secretary of State to designate institutions that are not universities or institutions conducted by higher education corporations to be eligible for funding from a higher education funding council.
 - 4.2 The Higher Education Funding Council for England (HEFCE) was established by the Further and Higher Education Act 1992 to provide, in part, funding to higher education institutions. For this purpose 'higher education institutions' means universities, institutions conducted by higher education corporations and institutions designated under section 129(1) of the Education Reform Act 1988.
5. **Territorial Extent and Application**
 - 5.1 This Order applies in relation to England.
6. **European Convention on Human Rights**

As the instrument is subject to negative resolution procedure and does not amend primary legislation, no statement is required.
7. **Policy background**
 - What is being done and why
 - 7.1 The purpose of section 129(1) of the Education Reform Act 1988 is to enable certain additional providers of higher education that meet the legislative criteria to

receive public funding from a higher education funding council. These are providers of higher education that are not either universities or institutions conducted by higher education corporations which are, by virtue of their status, eligible for funding by the higher education funding councils.

- 7.2 In considering an application for designation under s129(1)(a) the Secretary of State has regard to whether the institution appears to him to satisfy the legislative requirement that, to be designated, its full-time equivalent enrolment number for courses of higher education exceeds 55% of its total full-time equivalent enrolment number.
- 7.3 The Secretary of State also requests advice from HEFCE who scrutinise the application against principles and tests agreed with the Department for Business, Innovation and Skills. The Secretary of State also takes such other advice as might be appropriate for the particular application.
- 7.4 The British School of Osteopathy (“BSO”) applied to the Secretary of State for designation as an institution eligible to receive funds administered by HEFCE in November 2014.
- 7.5 BSO is currently treated as a ‘connected institution’ for HEFCE funding purposes and has been receiving its funding indirectly through the University of Bedfordshire since 2004 (which has also been validating its degrees since 2004). While this relationship has worked well, BSO now feels that as the largest osteopathic school in the UK and with an international reputation for delivering high quality courses, independence through designation is the next step in its evolution and will also serve to enhance the UK higher education sector.
- 7.6 The Secretary of State has considered BSO’s application and the detailed advice received on it and is satisfied that it meets the legislative criterion and the principles and tests for designation. In so doing he is satisfied that BSO:
 - has a standing and repute that would enhance the sector overall;
 - can demonstrate strong demand from students and a strong graduate employment record;
 - can demonstrate that its reputation is deserved and can be sustained in the sense that its provision meets appropriate quality standards expected of higher education institutions; and
 - has demonstrated that it is in a satisfactory position with regard to the tests for designation which include financial viability, governance and accountability, quality and quality assurance, corporate planning, estates issues, data issues and management issues.

8. Consultation outcome

- 8.1 It has not been necessary to consult formally on the making of this Order. However, in considering this application, detailed advice was sought from HEFCE who, in turn, sought advice from the Quality Assurance Agency.

9. Guidance

- 9.1 This Order is specific to The British School of Osteopathy and does not therefore require any guidance to be published.

10. Impact

- 10.1 The impact on business, charities or voluntary bodies is nil.
- 10.2 The impact on the public sector is nil.
- 10.3 An Impact Assessment has not been prepared for this Order as no impact on the private or voluntary sector is foreseen.
- 10.4 As a public authority the Department for Business, Innovation and Skills is required to give due regard to the aims of the public sector equality duty when making decisions and when setting policies. As a service provider and employer The British School of Osteopathy is already required to meet the main provisions of the Equality Act 2010 and, as such, to provide protection for its students and staff against discrimination, harassment and victimisation. As an institution designated as eligible to receive support from funds administered by HEFCE BSO will come within the education provisions of the Equality Act 2010, the public sector equality duty and the specific duties. As such BSO will be required to take additional actions under these requirements, which could be beneficial in terms of eliminating discrimination, advancing equality of opportunity, and fostering good relations.

11. Regulating small business

- 11.1 The legislation does not apply to small business as it is specific to The British School of Osteopathy.

12. Monitoring & review

- 12.1 The outcome of this Order will be that The British School of Osteopathy can receive funding directly from HEFCE.
- 12.2 HEFCE has a regulatory duty to ensure that institutions in receipt of public funds provide value for money and are responsible in their use of these funds. HEFCE is also responsible for ensuring that the quality of learning and teaching is assessed

in each institution and for assessing the quality of research and to fund research selectively by supporting excellence. Consequently, as a designated institution, BSO will be required to agree a Financial Memorandum with HEFCE which will set out the terms and conditions for the payment of HEFCE grants as well as conditions specific to the institution, the funds available to the institution and the educational provision the institution has agreed in return for those funds.
