**The Air Navigation (Restriction of Flying) (Silverstone and
Turweston) Regulations 2018**

Made - - - - - *19th March 2018*

Coming into force - - - - - *6th July 2018*

The Secretary of State has decided that it is necessary in the public interest to restrict flying in the vicinity of Silverstone motor-racing circuit and Heliport and Turweston Aerodrome by reason of the gathering of a large number of persons at the British Grand Prix.

The Secretary of State makes the following Regulations in exercise of the powers conferred by article 239 of the Air Navigation Order 2016^(a).

Citation and commencement

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Air Navigation (Restriction of Flying) (Silverstone and Turweston) Regulations 2018 and come into force on 6th July 2018.

Interpretation

2. In regulations 3(2) and 4(2) the times referred to are Co-ordinated Universal Time^(b).

Restricted airspace

3.—(1) Subject to paragraph (3), and during the periods specified in paragraph (2), no aircraft is to fly below 2,500 feet above mean sea level within the area bounded by—

- (a) straight lines joining successively the following points—
 - (i) 520323N 0005357W,
 - (ii) 515958N 0010239W,
 - (iii) 520055N 0010339W,
- (b) the anticlockwise arc of a circle having a radius of 2 nautical miles whose centre is at 520227N 0010544W between 520055N 0010339W and 520422N 0010500W,
- (c) straight lines joining successively the following points—
 - (i) 520422N 0010500W,
 - (ii) 520623N 0010520W,
 - (iii) 520815N 0005940W,

(a) S.I. 2016/765, to which there are amendments not relevant to these Regulations.

(b) In these Regulations Co-ordinated Universal Time (UTC) is one hour behind British Summer Time (BST).

- (iv) 520457N 0005357W, and
- (v) 520323N 0005357W.

(2) The periods referred to in paragraph (1) are—

- (a) between 0700 and 1800 hours on 7th July 2018, and
- (b) between 0600 and 1900 hours on 8th July 2018.

(3) Paragraph (1) does not apply to any aircraft flying in accordance with a clearance issued by the air traffic control unit at Silverstone Heliport.

4.—(1) Subject to paragraph (3), and during the periods specified in paragraph (2), no aircraft is to fly below 2,500 feet above mean sea level within the area bounded by a circle having a radius of 2 nautical miles whose centre is at 520227N 0010544W.

(2) The periods referred to in paragraph (1) are—

- (a) between 0800 and 1800 hours on 6th July 2018,
- (b) between 0700 and 1800 hours on 7th July 2018, and
- (c) between 0600 and 1900 hours on 8th July 2018.

(3) Paragraph (1) does not apply to any aircraft flying in accordance with a permission issued by Turweston Aerodrome air-ground service.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This note is not part of the Regulations)

These Regulations impose restrictions on flying in airspace in the vicinity of Silverstone motor-racing circuit and Heliport and Turweston Aerodrome on the occasion of the British Grand Prix international race car meeting that is scheduled to take place on the three days of 6th to 8th July 2018.

A significant number of helicopters will be engaged in the transport of spectators to and from the event in addition to very large crowds that will also be attracted to the event. Accordingly, the Civil Aviation Authority and the Department for Transport agree that flying should be restricted in the vicinity of the event for reasons of public safety.

In relation to regulations 3 and 4 the term ‘aircraft’ includes aircraft as classified by Part 1 of Schedule 4 to the Air Navigation Order 2016. It also includes, by virtue of article 23 of that Order, any small balloon, any kite weighing not more than two kilograms, any small unmanned aircraft and any parachute including a parascending parachute.

The times mentioned in regulation 3(2) and 4(2) are Co-ordinated Universal Time (UTC), which for the purpose of these Regulations is one hour behind British Summer Time (BST).

Full details of the Statutory Instrument will be promulgated by Aeronautical Information Circular (AIC) and Notice to Airmen (NOTAM).
