# (i) Bottled Vegetables

THE AGRICULTURAL PRODUCE (GRADING AND MARKING) (BOTTLED VEGETABLES) REGULATIONS, 1935, DATED AUGUST I, 1935, MADE BY THE MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES AS TO GRADE DESIGNA-TIONS AND GRADE DESIGNATION MARKS FOR BOTTLED VEGETABLES.

# 1935 No. 799

In exercise of the powers conferred on him by the Agricultural Produce 18 & 19 Geo. (Grading and Marking) Acts, 1928 and 1931, the Minister of Agriculture 5. c. 19. and Fisheries hereby makes the following Regulations :-- 21 & 22 Geo.

1. Grade designations to indicate the quality of peas, beans, asparagus, Prescription beetroots, carrots and turnips produced and bottled in England and of grade Wales shall be as follows:— designations.

and the quality indicated by such grade designations shall be deemed to be as described in the First Schedule hereto.

2. A grade designation mark shall be one of the grade designations Prescription specified in regulation 1 above, associated with the words "Empire of grade Buying Begins at Home" and with the following mark, namely, a map designation of England and Wales in silhouette, with the words "Produce of England marks. and Wales" inscribed in a circle placed centrally in the map, within which circle is a design representing the Union Jack, and which is more particularly described in the Second Schedule hereto.

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### AGRICULTURE

Date of coming into operation and revocation. 3. These Regulations shall come into operation on the 1st August, 1935, on which date the Agricultural Produce (Grading and Marketing) (Bottled Vegetables) Regulations 1932,(a) shall be revoked, but without prejudice to anything done thereunder before the date of coming into operation of these Regulations.

Short title.

4. These Regulations may be cited as the Agricultural Produce (Grading and Marking) (Bottled Vegetables) Regulations, 1935.

#### SCHEDULE I

# VEGETABLES PRODUCED AND BOTTLED IN ENGLAND AND WALES

#### PART I.—DEFINITIONS OF QUALITY

#### (a) General Characteristics

(i) Condition of Vegetables before Bottling.—Bottled vegetables or pieces of vegetables forming part of a macedoine or salad shall be produced either from fresh raw or from fresh processed vegetables. All other bottled vegetables shall be produced from fresh raw vegetables.

(ii) Variety.—Each bottle shall contain one variety only of the kind, or of each of the kinds, of vegetables used, such variety to be one of the approved varieties, if any, specified for the kind in Part 2 of this Schedule.

(iii) Condition of Bottled Vegetables.—The bottled vegetables or pieces of vegetables of each kind in any one bottle shall be of generally uniform size, of good and generally uniform colour, tender and of good flavour. The bottled vegetables or pieces of vegetables shall retain the general conformation of the original vegetables or pieces of vegetables. Blemishes (undesirable characteristics of the vegetables due to faulty preparation) and extraneous matter shall not be present to an extent which detracts seriously from the quality of the product.

(iv) *Fill.*—Each bottle shall contain an amount of vegetables such as to show that, at the time of packing, more vegetables could not have been added without injury to the pack, allowance being made for an adequate head space.

(v) Liquid.—The covering liquid shall be clear.

(vi) Preservatives and Colouring Matter.—No preservatives and/or artificial colouring agents prohibited under the Public Health (Preservatives etc. in Food) Regulations in force for the time being shall be present.
