**The National Health Service (Charges to Overseas Visitors) (Amendment) (No.2) (Wales) Regulations 2009**

The Welsh Ministers make the following Regulations in exercise of the powers conferred by section 124 of the National Health Service (Wales) Act 2006<sup>(1)</sup>.

**Title, application, commencement and interpretation**

1.—(1) These Regulations are called the National Health Service (Charges to Overseas Visitors) (Amendment) (No.2) (Wales) Regulations 2009 and come into force on 7 December 2009.

(2) These Regulations apply in relation to Wales.

(3) In these Regulations, “the principal Regulations” (“*y prif Reoliadau*”) means the National Health Service (Charges to Overseas Visitors) Regulations 1989<sup>(2)</sup>.

**Amendment to the principal Regulations**

2. In Schedule 2 to the principal Regulations delete the words—  
“Guernsey and its bailiwick”, and  
“Jersey”.

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## **EXPLANATORY NOTE**

*(This note is not part of the Regulations)*

These Regulations amend the National Health Service (Charges to Overseas Visitors) Regulations 1989 (S.I. 1989/306) (“the 1989 Regulations”). The Regulations remove Guernsey and its bailiwick and Jersey from Schedule 2 to the 1989 Regulations. Visitors from these territories to Wales will no longer be exempt under regulations 4 and 5 of the 1989 Regulations from charges for healthcare provided within the NHS.
