**The A487 Trunk Road
(Pembrokeshire/Ceredigion County
Boundary, Near Cardigan to
Aberaeron, Ceredigion) (Temporary
Speed Restrictions and No
Overtaking) Order 2017**

Made 24 July 2017

Coming into force 1 August 2017

The Welsh Ministers, being the traffic authority for the A487 Fishguard to Bangor Trunk Road, are satisfied that traffic in a specified length of the trunk road should be restricted and prohibited because of works proposed on or near the road.

The Welsh Ministers, therefore, in exercise of the powers conferred upon them by section 14(1), (4) and (7) of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984(1), make this Order.

Title, Interpretation and Commencement

1. This Order comes into force on 1 August 2017 and its title is The A487 Trunk Road (Pembrokeshire/Ceredigion County Boundary, Near Cardigan to Aberaeron, Ceredigion) (Temporary Speed Restrictions and No Overtaking) Order 2017.

2. In this Order:

“exempted vehicle” (“*cerbyd esempt*”) means:

(1) 1984 c.27; Section 14 was substituted by the Road Traffic (Temporary Restrictions) Act 1991 (c.26), section 1(1) and Schedule 1. By virtue of S.I. 1999/672, article 2 and Schedule 1, and paragraph 30 of Schedule 11 to the Government of Wales Act 2006 (c.32), these powers are now exercisable by the Welsh Ministers in relation to Wales.

- (a) any vehicle being used by the emergency services; and
- (b) any vehicle being used for naval, military or air force purposes and being driven by a person for the time being subject to the orders of a member of the armed forces of the Crown, who is a member of the special forces—
 - (i) in response, or for practice in responding, to a national security emergency by a person who has been trained in driving at high speeds; or
 - (ii) for the purpose of training a person in driving vehicles at high speeds;

“special forces” (*“lluoedd arbennig”*) means those units of the armed forces the maintenance of whose capabilities is the responsibility of the Director of Special Forces or which are for the time being subject to the operational command of that Director;

“the trunk road” (*“y gefnffordd”*) means the A487 Fishguard to Bangor Trunk Road in the County of Ceredigion which extends from the Pembrokeshire/Ceredigion County boundary, adjacent to the dwelling known as Gamallt, south of Cardigan in a north-easterly direction to the centre-point of its junction with the A482 at Aberaeron;

“works period” (*“cyfnod y gwaith”*) means intermittent periods commencing at 08:00 hours on 1 August 2017 and ending when the temporary traffic signs are permanently removed.

Restrictions & Prohibition

3. No person shall, during the works period, drive or cause or permit any vehicle to proceed at a speed exceeding 40 miles per hour in the length of the trunk road.

4. No person shall, during the works period, drive or cause or permit any vehicle to proceed at a speed exceeding 30 miles per hour in the length of the trunk road.

5. No person shall, during the works period, drive or cause or permit any vehicle to proceed at a speed exceeding 10 miles per hour in the length of the trunk road.

6. No person shall, during the works period, use or permit the use of a vehicle, other than an exempted vehicle, in such a way that it overtakes any other

vehicle in the length of the trunk road during such times as the restriction referred to in article 5 is in operation.

Suspension

7. Any statutory provisions restricting the speed of vehicles on the relevant length of the trunk road are suspended during such times as the restrictions specified in articles 3, 4 and 5 are in operation.

Application

8. (1) The restrictions and prohibition in articles 3, 4, 5 and 6 apply only during such times and to such extent as indicated by traffic signs.

(2) No speed limit imposed by this Order applies to an exempted vehicle.

Duration of this Order

9. The maximum duration for this Order shall be 18 months.
