Cap. 53.

An Act for continuing for the Term of Twenty-one Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament, the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers of an Act, passed in the Seventeenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing and widening the Road leading from the Maypole in the Town of Henfield, over Poynings Common, to the Town of Brighthelmfione, and from Poynings Common aforesaid to High · Cross, in the Parish of Albourne, and from thence for the Distance of Two Furlongs of the Road or Lane leading towards Twineham, and from the Marle Pit near the Bottom of Saddlescombe Hill, in the Parish of Newtimber, to the Marle Pit fronting Newtimber Broad Lane, in the same Parish, in the County of Suffex; and also for repairing and widening the Road from the End of the Two Furlongs of the Road or Lane leading towards Twineham, unto Herring's Clappers, in the Parish of Twineham, in the faid County. [1st June 1798.]

Preamble.

THEREAS by an Act, made in the Seventeenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for repairing and swidening the Road from the Maypole in the Town of Henfield, over Poynings Common, to the Town of Brighthelmstone, and from Poynings Common aforesaid to High Cross, in the Parish of Albourne, and from thence for the Distance of Two Furlongs of the Road or Lane towards Twineham, and from the Marle Pit near the Bostom of Saddlescomb Hill, in the Parish of Newtimber, to the Marle Pit fronting Newtimber Broad Lane, in the fame Parish, in the County of Sussex, several Tolls and Powers were granted to certain Trustees therein mentioned, which were to continue for and during the Term of Twenty-one Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Seilion of Parliament: And whereas the Trustees have proceeded in the Execution of the faid recited Act, and have borrowed a confiderable Sum of Money upon the Credit of the Tolls thereby granted; which Money cannot be repaid, nor the faid Road kept in Repair, unless the Term granted by the faid recited Act be further continued, and the Powers thereof altered and enlarged: And whereas it would be not only of confiderable Advantage and Convenience to the Neighbourhood but of Publick Utility, if the Read were extended from the End of the Two Furlengs of the Road or Lane leading towards Treineham, unto Herring's Chappers, in the Parish of Twineham, in the faid County of Suffex, being about One Mile and Eight Rods in Length, and made Part of the Road to be amended and kept in Repair by the faid recited Act, and this Act: But, as the faid Purpoles cannot be offected without the Aid and Authority of Parliament: May it therefore pleafe Your Majofly that it may be enacted; and be it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this prefent Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That the said recited Act, and all and every the Tolls or Duties, Claufes, Powers, Exemptions, Penalties, Forfeitures, Rules, Remedies, Directions, Payments, Provisions, Articles, Matters, and Things whatfoever, therein contained, (lave and except fuch Parts of the fame as relate to Exemptions from Stamp Duties, and fuch as are hereby varied, altered, or repealed, and also this present Act, shall be, and are hereby declared to be in full Force and Effect for the Term herein-after mentioned; and shall extend and have relation to the repairing, amending, and widening, the faid Roads, tegether with the faid additional Road from the End of the Two Furlongs of the Road or Lane leading towards Twineham unto Harring's Chapters, and to all Matters and Things in the faid recited Act mentioned, in as full, ample, and beneficial Manner, to all Intents and Purposes, as if the same were repeated and re-cnacked in the Body of this present Act, and the faid additional Road had been included in the faid recited Act; which Term hereby granted shall and is hereby declared to be subject and liable to the Payment of all Monies now due and owing, or which shall or may hereafter be borrowed and become due on the Credit of the fail recited Act, and of this prefent Act, and all Interest due and to become due for the same respectively.

D., John Wood of Chestham, John Wood of Hicksted, John Wood of Park, and John Wood of Wapses, shall be, and are hereby declared to be added to and joined with the Trustees appointed by or in pursuance of the said recited Act, for putting the fame and this prefent Act in Execution; and the Trustees herein nominated, and their Succeffors, being qualified according to the Directions of the faid recited Act, are hereby authorized and empowered to act in the Execution of the faid recited Act, and this Act, as fully and effectually, to all Intents and Purpoles, as if they had been appointed by or under the Directions of the faid recited Act.

III. And be it further enacted, That no Toll shall be demanded or Exemptions taken for any Carriage, or any Horfe, Cattle, or Beast, laden only with, from Tolks. or going unladen for, or returning unladen, having been laden only with, on the fame Day, Stone, Brick, Lime, Timber, Wood, Gravel, or other Materials, for repairing of the faid Roads, or any of the Roads in the Townships or Parishes in which such Roads do lie; or Hay, Straw, or Corn in the Straw only, not fold or disposed of, but pailing to be laid up or placed in the Outhouses or on the Lands of the Owners thereof; or for any Ploughs, Harrows, or Implements of Hufbandry; or Mould, Dung, Compost, or Manure, (Chalk excepted), employed in Husbandry for manuring or improving of Lands, or for any other Thing employed in the Management of any Farm or Lands; or from any Person or Persons residing in any Township or Parish in which the faid Roads do lie, for any Horses or Cattle going to or returning from Pasture or Watering Places; or from any Person or Persons going to or from their proper Parochial Church, Chapel, or other Place of religious Worship, tolerated by Law, on the Sabbath Day or Sunday, or on any other Day on which Divine Service is ordered by Authority to be celebrated, or attending the Funeral of any Person that shall die and be buried in any of the faid Parishes; or from any Clergyman going to or returning from vifiting any Sick Person, or upon other his Parochial or Ministerial Duty, on a Sunday, or on any other Day on which Divine Service is ordered by Authority to be celebrated; or for any Horses, Cattle, or Carriages, of whatever Description, employed or to be employed in conveying the Mails of Letters and Expresses under the Authority of His Majelly's Postmaster General, either when employed in conveying, fetching, or guarding, fuch Mails or Expresses, or in returning back from conveying the same; or for the Horses of any Soldiers upon their March, or on Duty, or Carriages attending them with their Baggage; or for any Cattle or Carriages employed in the Conveyance of Vagrants fent by legal Passes; or for any Coach, Landau, Berlin, Chariot, Calash, Chair, or Passenger on Horseback, going to or returning

from any Election of a Knight or Knights of the Shire to ferve in Parliament for the County of Suffex, or for the Borough of New Shoreham, during the Time of fuch Election or Elections: And if any Person or Persons shall claim and take the Benesit of any of the Exemptions by this Act granted, not being entitled to the same, such Person and Persons shall forfeit and pay, for every such Ossence, any Sum not exceeding Forty Shillings.

Expenses of obtaining the Act.

IV. And be it further enacted, That the Costs, Charges, and Expences incident to or attending the obtaining and passing of this Act, shall be paid out of the Monies already arisen or to arise by virtue of the faid recited Act, or this present Act, in presence to any other Payment whatsoever.

Publick Act.

V. And be it further enacted by the Authority aforefaid, That this Act shall be adjudged, deemed, and taken to be a Publick Act; and shall be judicially taken Notice of as such, by all Judges, Justices, and other Persons whomsoever, without specially pleading the same.

Commencement and Continuance of the Act. VI. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall commence and take place from and immediately after the passing thereof, and shall, together with so much of the said recited Act as is not by this Act varied, altered, or repealed, continue and be in Force for and during the Term of Twenty-one Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament.
