An Act to continue for Twenty-one Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament, the Term and Powers of an Act, passed in the Seventeenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for amending, widening, and keeping in Repair, the Road leading from the Turnpike Road, in the Parish of Asthall, in the County of Oxford, to the Turnpike Road at or near Buckland, in the County of Berks.

[12th July 1799.]

HEREAS an Act was passed in the Seventeenth Year of the Preamble.
Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for amending, in Geo. III, widening, and keeping in Repair the Road leading from the Turnpike Road, in the Parish of Asthall, in the County of Oxford, to the Turnpike Road at or near Buckland, in the County of Berks: And whereas the
Trustees appointed in or by virtue of the said Act have proceeded to put the
same in Execution, for which Purpose they have borrowed several consideraple Sums of Money on the Credit thereof, which still remain due, and

cannot be repaid, nor can the said Road be properly amended, improved, and kept in Repair, unless the Term and Powers of the said Act be continued: May it therefore please Your Majesty that it may be enacted; and be it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That the kaid recited Act, passed in the Seventeenth Year of the Reign of His said present Majesty, and all and every the Authorities, Powers, Privileges, Provisions, Penalties, Clauses, Matters, and Things therein contained, (except such as relate to Exemptions from Stamp Duties), shall be and continue in full Force, and be executed for and during the Term herein-after mentioned, as fully and effectually, to all Intents and Purposes, as if the same were herein particularly repeated and re-enacted, and this Act, and the additional Term hereby granted, shall be and are hereby made subject and liable to the Payment of all Money now due and owing upon the Credit or on Account of the said former Act, or · hereafter to be borrowed or become due on the Credit of the said former Act and this Act, and of all Interest due and to grow due for the same respectively.

For disposing of Furchase

II. And be it further enacted, That if any Money or Recompence shall be paid for any Lands, Tenements, or Hereditaments, which shall be purchased, taken, or used, by virtue of the Powers of the said Act and this Act, for the Purposes thereof, to any Corporation, Peme Covert, Infant, Lunatick, or Person under any other Disability or Incapacity as in the said recited Act particularly mentioned, such Money shall, in case the same be not less than the Sum of One hundred Pounds, with all convenient Speed be invested in the Purchase of other Lands, Tenements, or Hereditaments, which shall be conveyed and settled upon and subject to the like Uses, Trusts, and Limitations, as the faid Lands, Tenements, or Hereditaments belonging to such Corporation or other Person as aforesaid, so to be purchased, taken, or used, were settled, limited, or assured; and in the mean Time, and until such Purchase can be made, such Money shall be paid into the Bank of England, in the Name and with the Privity of the Accountant General of the High Court of Chancery, to be placed to his Account there, ex parte the Trustees for executing the said Act and this Act, pursuant to the Method prescribed by the Ast of the Twelfth Year of King George the First, Chapter the Thirty-second, and the General Orders of the faid Court, and without Fee or Reward, according to the Act of the Twelfth Year of King George the Second, Chapter the Twenty-fourth, and shall, when so paid in, be laid out in the Purchase of Navy or Victualling Bills, or Exchequer Bills, and the Interest arising from the Money laid out in such Bills, and the Money received for the same, as they shall respectively be paid off by Government, shall be laid out, in the Name of the said Accountant General, in the Purchase of other Navy or Victualling Bills, or Exchequer Bills; all which said Navy and Victualling Bills, and Exchequer Bills, shall be deposited in the Bank in the Name of the said Accountant General, and shall there remain until a proper Purchase or Purchases shall be found and approved of by the said Trustees, or any Five or more of them, and until the same shall, upon a Petition setting forth such Approbation, (to be preferred to

the

the Court of Chancery in a summary Way, by the Person or Persons who would be entitled to the Rents and Profits of any of the Lands. Tenements, or Hereditaments to be purchased therewith, if the same were purchased and settled), be ordered to be sold by the said Accountant General, for the completing such Purchase, in such Manner as the said Court shall think just and direct; and it shall and may be lawful for the faid Court to make fuch Order or Orders, in a summary Way, touching the Payment or Application of the Monies so to be paid into the Bank, and touching fuch Navy, Victualling, or Exchequer Bills, and the Interest thereof, in pursuance of the Directions of this Act, as the said Court shall think fit; but in case any such Money shall be less than the Sum of One hundred Pounds, and not less than the Sum of Twenty Pounds, then such Money shall be paid to such Person or Persons as the Party or Parties entitled thereto shall respectively nominate to receive the same, in Trust with all convenient Speed to be reinvested in the Purchase of other Lands, Tenements, or Hereditaments, which shall be conveyed and settled to, upon, and subject to the like Uses, Trusts, Limitations, Remainders, and Contingencies, as the Lands, Tenements, Hereditaments, and Premises, which shall be purchased from them respectively by the faid Trustees, were respectively settled, limited, or assured to, upon, or subject to at the Time of purchasing the same, or such of them as at the Time of making such Conveyances and Settlements shall be existing and capable of taking Effect; and in the mean Time, and until such Purchase or Purchases shall be made, the said Money shall be placed out by such Bodies Politick, Corporate, or Collegiate, Corporations Aggregate or Sole, or other Person or Persons as aforesaid, in some of the Publick Funds, or on Government or Real Securities, in the Names of Two or more Persons, to be nominated by the Party or Parties interested therein, and to be approved of by the Trustees, or any Five or more of them, and the Dividends or Interest arising or to be produced from fuch Funds or Securities, shall be paid to such Person or Persons respectively, as would for the Time being be entitled to the Rents and Profits of such Lands, Tenements, or Hereditaments, so to be purchased, conveyed, and settled by virtue of this Act; and in case any such Money shall be less than the Sum of Twenty Pounds, then the same shall be paid to the Person or Persons, Party or Parties, respectively entitled thereto.

III. And be it further enacted, That all Charges and Expences of Paying Exobtaining and passing this Act shall be defrayed out of any Money already pences of the collected or received by virtue of the said former Act, or out of the sirst Act. Monies to arise by virtue of the said former Act and this Act, in preference to all other Payments whatsoever.

IV. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall be adjudged, deemed, Publick Act. and taken to be a Publick Act, and as such, be judicially taken Notice of by all Judges, Justices, and other Persons whomsoever, without specially pleading the fame.

V. And be it further enacted, That the Term of the said recited Act Term of the shall, from and after the passing of this Act, cease and determine, and Act. that

that the said Act (subject as herein-before mentioned) and this Act shall from thenceforth continue and be in Force, and be executed for and during the Term of Twenty-one Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament,
