

## **EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM TO**

### **The Coronavirus Act 2020 (Extension of Powers to Act for the Protection of Public Health) Order (Northern Ireland) 2022**

#### **1. Introduction**

1.1 This Explanatory Memorandum has been prepared by the Department of Health and is laid before the Northern Ireland Assembly to accompany the Coronavirus Act 2020 (Extension of Powers to Act for the Protection of Public Health) Order (Northern Ireland) 2022

1.2 The Statutory Rule is laid under section 96(5) of the Coronavirus Act 2020, for approval by resolution of the Assembly using the draft affirmative resolution procedure

#### **2. Purpose of the Order**

2.1 The purpose of the Order is alter the expiry date of Section 48 of, and Schedule 18 to, the Coronavirus Act 2020 from 24 March 2022 to 24 September 2022.

#### **3. Matters of special interest to the Northern Ireland Assembly**

3.1 This order is laid in draft form for approval by the resolution of the Assembly.

3.2 This order comes into operation at the time at which it is made.

#### **4. Legislative Context**

4.1 The Coronavirus Act 2020 received Royal assent on 25 March 2020 and commenced on the same day. It applies to all countries on the UK. Several of the Act's provisions were expired early, in July 2021.

4.2 Section 48 of the Coronavirus Act, along with Schedule 18, inserts powers into the Public Health Act (Northern Ireland) 1967 to make Health Protection Regulations for the purpose of preventing, protecting against, controlling or providing a public health response to the incidence or spread of Coronavirus infection or contamination in Northern Ireland.

4.3 Section 48 of the Coronavirus Act is due to expire on 24 March 2022, along with the majority of the provisions in the Act. Using the powers in section 90(2) of the Coronavirus Act section 48 is to be extended for six months by means of an Order, until 24 September 2022.

#### **5. Policy background**

5.1 Whilst preferable that no further restrictions or requirements will be necessary

after 24 March 2022, it is more likely than not that some element of regulation will be required beyond this point.
