Peripatetic and Supply Teachers

REGULATIONS, DATED 7TH MAY 1974, MADE BY THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCA-TION UNDER THE EDUCATION AND LIBRARIES (NORTHERN IRELAND) ORDER 1972.

The Department of Education (hereinafter referred to as "the Department") in pursuance of the powers vested in it by Articles 56, 57, 58 and 125 of the Education and Libraries (Northern Ireland) Order 1972(a) and of all other powers enabling it in that behalf hereby makes the following Regulations:—

- 1.—(1) These Regulations may be cited as the Peripatetic and Supply Teachers Amending Regulations (Northern Ireland) 1974.
 - (2) These Regulations shall come into operation on the date hereof.
- 2. The existing Regulations hereby amended are the Peripatetic and Supply Teachers Regulations (Northern Ireland) 1973(b).
- 3. For Regulation 5 of the existing Regulations there shall be substituted the following Regulation:-
 - "5.—(1) Subject to the provisions of paragraph (2) a teacher shall not be employed before he attains the age of 20 years or after 31st August next following the date on which he attains the age of 65 years except for a limited period where there are special circumstances and the Department so approves.
 - (2) A teacher born in the month of August for whom the age of compulsory retirement as defined in Regulation 2 of the Teachers Superannuation (Amendment) Regulations No. 2 (Northern Ireland) 1973(c) is 31st July next following the age of 65 years may be employed up to and including that date.".

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This note is not part of the Regulations, but is intended to indicate their general purport.)

These Regulations provide for the change in the date of compulsory retirement for peripatetic or supply teachers from 31st July next following the age of 65 years to 31st August next following the age of 65 years.
