THE NATIONAL HEALTH INSURANCE (OUTWORKERS) AMENDMENT ORDER (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1932.\* SPECIAL ORDER, DATED 20th JUNE, 1932, MADE BY THE NATIONAL HEALTH INSURANCE JOINT COMMITTEE AND THE MINISTRY OF LABOUR FOR NORTHERN IRELAND, ACTING JOINTLY, UNDER PARAGRAPH (c) OF PART I OF THE FIRST SCHEDULE TO THE NATIONAL HEALTH INSURANCE ACT, 1924 (14 & 15 GEO. 5, c. 38).

The National Health Insurance Joint Committee and the Ministry of Labour for Northern Ireland, acting jointly, in exercise of the powers conferred on them by paragraph (c) of Part I of the First Schedule to the National Health Insurance Act, 1924 (14 & 15 Geo. 5, c. 38), and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, hereby make the following Order:—

1.—(1) This Order may be cited as the National Health Insurance (Outworkers) Amendment Order (Northern Ireland), 1932.

(2) This Order shall have effect as from the fourth day of July, 1932.

(3) The Interpretation Act, 1921, applies to the interpretation of this Order as it applies to the interpretation of an Act of Parliament.

2. Paragraph (2) of the First Schedule to the National Health Insurance (Outworkers) Order (Northern Ireland), 1924, is hereby revoked, but without prejudice to any right, privilege, obligation or liability acquired, accrued, or incurred thereunder.
