SCHEDULE.

Power presses other than hydraulic presses; Milling machines in use in the metal trades; Guillotine machines; Brick and tile presses driven by mechanical power; Dough mixers and dough brakes; Meat mincing machines driven by mechanical power; Hydro-extractors in use in laundries; Platen printing machines;

Carding machines in use in upholstery works.

Intervals for Women and Young Persons.

REGULATIONS, DATED 10TH DAY OF MAY, 1939, MADE BY THE MINISTRY OF LABOUR UNDER SECTION 89 OF THE FACTORIES ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1938.

1939. No. 71.

The Ministry of Labour for Northern Ireland, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon it by Section 89 of the Factories Act (Northern Ireland), 1938, and of all other powers enabling it in that behalf, hereby makes the following Regulations :—

1.—The classes or descriptions of factory specified in the Schedule to these Regulations shall be excepted from the provisions of Part VI of the Act which require that all the women and young persons employed in a factory shall have the intervals allowed for meals or rest at the same hour of the day.

2.—Where the occupier of a factory avails himself of the special exception contained in Section 89 of the said Act, whether in pursuance of paragraph (a) or (b) of sub-section (1) of the said Section or in pursuance of the foregoing Regulation, the women and young persons to whom the special exception applies shall in all cases be divided into different sets, and the intervals allowed for meals and rest in accordance with the provisons of the Act shall be the same for all the women and young persons in the same set; and if the chief inspector so requires, there shall be kept posted in the factory, in such a position as to be conveniently read by the persons employed, a notice showing the names of the women and young persons in each set.

3.—These Regulations may be cited as the Factories (Intervals for Women and Young Persons) Regulations (Northern Ireland), 1939, and shall come into force on the 1st July, 1939.

FISHERIES

4.—The following Orders as to allowing meal times at different hours of the day and as to remaining in rooms during meal times are hereby revoked so far as they relate to Northern Ireland, namely, the two Orders dated the 20th December, 1882(a), the two Orders dated the 24th February, 1887(b), and the Orders dated the 1st May, 1896(c), 20th July, 1899(d), 6th September, 1899(e), 11th March, 1903(f), 23rd June, 1904(g), and 13th October, 1908(h).
