

SCHEDULE.

So much of the County Borough of Belfast, not already specified by the Civil Defence (Compulsory Area) Order (Northern Ireland), 1939, as lies within a line drawn from the intersection of the County Borough Boundary and the Holywood Road in a south westerly direction along the centre of Holywood Road and Newtownards Road to the junction of the Newtownards Road and Albert Bridge Road; thence along the centre of Albert Bridge Road and East Bridge Street to Cromac Square; thence along the centre of Cromac Street to the intersection of May Street; thence along the centre of May Street, Donegall Square South and Howard Street to the intersection of Howard Street and College Square East; thence along the centre of College Square East and King Street to the intersection of King Street and Mill Street; thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Mill Street to the intersection of Millfield; thence along the centre of Millfield, Upper Library Street and North Queen Street to the junction of North Queen Street and York Road; thence in a northerly direction along the centre of York Road and Shore Road to the intersection of Shore Road and St. Vincent Street; thence along the centre of St. Vincent Street to the London, Midland and Scottish Railway; thence in a straight line eastward to the Inner Lighthouse at the north end of East Twin Island.

SECTION TEN OF THE CIVIL DEFENCE ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND),

WHEREAS by sub-section one of Section ten of the Civil Defence Act (Northern Ireland), 1939, it is provided that subject to the provisions thereof relating to the training of employed persons, shall apply only in relation to areas specified in that behalf in an Order made by the Ministry of Home Affairs (in the said Act referred to as "compulsory areas");

AND WHEREAS the Governor of Northern Ireland has, in pursuance of powers vested in him by sub-section three of Section one of the Ministries Act (Northern Ireland), 1940, made an Order transferring to the Ministry of Public Security the powers and duties of the Ministry of Home Affairs under the Civil Defence Acts (Northern Ireland), 1938 and 1939;

Now, THEREFORE, the Ministry of Public Security, in pursuance of all the powers enabling it in that behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

1.—The area specified in the Schedule hereto shall be a compulsory area within the meaning of Part II of the Civil Defence Act (Northern Ireland), 1939.

2.—This Order may be cited as the Civil Defence (Compulsory Area) (No. 2) Order (Northern Ireland), 1940.

Schemes.

THE AIR RAID PRECAUTIONS (SCHEMES) REGULATIONS (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1940, DATED 30TH DECEMBER, 1940, MADE BY THE MINISTRY OF PUBLIC SECURITY, WITH THE CONCURRENCE OF THE MINISTRY OF FINANCE, UNDER SECTION 10 (1) (c) OF THE AIR RAID PRECAUTIONS ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1938.

The Ministry of Public Security, in exercise of the powers vested in it by the Air Raid Precautions Act (Northern Ireland), 1938, and the Ministries Act (Northern Ireland), 1940, and of all other powers enabling it in that behalf, hereby makes the following Regulations:—

1.—The Air Raid Precautions (Schemes) Regulations, 1938, shall have effect as if for paragraph 16 of the Schedule thereto there were substituted the following paragraph:—

“ **16.**—Arrangements for dealing with persons who leave their homes or who are deprived of supplies or public utilities as a result of enemy action including arrangements for the transfer of persons to other areas in accordance with any directions given by the Ministry of Public Security.”

2.—These Regulations may be cited as the Air Raid Precautions (Schemes) Regulations (Northern Ireland), 1940; and the Air Raid Precautions (Schemes) Regulations, 1938, and these Regulations may be cited together as the Air Raid Precautions (Schemes) Regulations (Northern Ireland), 1938 and 1940.
