

- (b) if he is detained for more than seven days in any place under any enactment in force in any part of the United Kingdom relating to persons of unsound mind; or
- (c) if he is adjudged bankrupt or goes into a composition with his creditors; or
- (d) if the Board by resolution declare that he has been absent from three consecutive meetings of the Board without reasonable excuse.

Paragraphs (a), (b), and (c) of this regulation shall apply to members of the Board appointed by the Minister of Agriculture.

4.—These Regulations may be cited as the Agricultural Wages Board (Term and Conditions of Office of Members) Regulations (Northern Ireland), 1940.

Certificates of Interment.

ORDER, DATED THE 15TH MAY, 1940, MADE BY THE MINISTER OF HOME AFFAIRS UNDER SECTION 2 OF THE ANATOMY ACT, 1871.

1940. No. 43.

WHEREAS by Section 2 of The Anatomy Act, 1871, it is provided that the Chief Secretary for Ireland may from time to time, by order, vary the period within which certificates of interment should be transmitted to the inspectors of districts under the provisions of the Anatomy Act, 1832.

AND WHEREAS by virtue of the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, and the orders thereunder, all the powers of the Chief Secretary under the Anatomy Acts, 1832 and 1871, are now vested in the Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, the Right Hon. Sir Richard Dawson Bates, Bart., the Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland, in pursuance of the provisions of Section 2 of the Anatomy Act, 1871, hereby order and declare as follows, that is to say:—

1.—The period limited by Section 13 of the Anatomy Act, 1832, as the time within which the certificate of interment of any body

which has been subjected to anatomical examination shall be transmitted to the inspector of the district shall be extended to a period of two years after the day on which such body shall have been received.

2.—The Order made by the Chief Secretary on the 16th day of April, 1890, is hereby revoked.

3.—This order may be cited as the Anatomy Order (Northern Ireland), 1940.

Diseases of Animals: Sheep Dipping.

ORDER, DATED 27TH DAY OF JUNE, 1940, MADE BY THE MINISTRY OF AGRICULTURE UNDER THE DISEASES OF ANIMALS ACTS, 1894 TO 1935.

1940. No. 56.

The Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in it under the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894, as amended and adapted by any subsequent enactments and by every other power enabling it in that behalf, orders and it is hereby ordered as follows :—

Prescribed Dippings.

1.—All sheep within Northern Ireland during the period from 7th October to 9th November, 1940, shall, with the exceptions as specified in Article 4 of the Sheep Dipping (Northern Ireland) Order of 1932, hereinafter referred to as the principal Order, be dipped on two occasions separated by an interval of not less than seven days or more than fourteen days during that period :

Provided that the foregoing requirements shall not apply to sheep imported into Northern Ireland during the period from 7th October to 9th November, 1940, to which the provisions of Article 8 of the principal Order apply.
