- Registered means registered under the Roads Act, 1920.
- 2.—Save as provided in paragraph 3 hereof no person shall dispose of a goods or passenger vehicle registered in Northern Ireland except under the authority of a licence granted by the Ministry of Home Affairs.
- 3.—Paragraph 2 hereof shall not apply to :-
- (1) Government Departments; or
- (2) Persons disposing of:
- (i) vehicles which by reason of their construction and the manner in which they are used are chargeable with excise duty under sub-paragraphs (1), (2), (3), or (4) of paragraph 3 of the Schedule substituted by Section 1 of the Finance Act (Northern Ireland), 1937, for the second schedule to the Finance Act, 1920.
 - (ii) vehicles which are for use solely in Northern Ireland.
- 4.—This Order may be cited as "The Emergency Powers (Defence) Disposal of Motor Vehicles (Northern Ireland) Order, 1941.

PUBLIC SERVICE VEHICLES.

LET BERTHAU DE LA STEEL CONTRACTOR OF THE Standing Passengers.

Order, dated 28th November, 1941, made by the Ministry of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland under Regulation 70 of The Defence (General) Regulations, 1939.

1941. No. 194.

The Ministry of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland by virtue of the powers conferred on it by Regulation 70 of the Defence (General) Regulations, 1939, and of all other powers enabling it in that behalf hereby makes the following order:—

- 1.—Notwithstanding anything contained in any enactment or in any order or regulation made thereunder—
- (1) A public service vehicle may carry subject to the conditions specified in article 2 hereof a number of standing passengers

- not exceeding one-third of the number of passengers for which the vehicle, or in the case of a double-decked vehicle the lower deck, has seating capacity, or 8, whichever number is the less;
- (2) The Ministry of Home Affairs may permit single-decked public service vehicles specially constructed or adapted for the purpose, to carry, subject to such conditions as the Ministry thinks fit, on specified routes or on specified services a number of standing passengers not exceeding the number of passengers for which the vehicle has seating capacity, provided that the maximum number of persons carried on the vehicle at any one time shall not exceed 60, in addition to the driver and conductor thereof
- 2.—The conditions aforesaid are that, except in the case of a single-decked public service vehicle specially constructed or adapted for the purpose of carrying standing passengers, no standing passengers shall be carried by virtue of the provisions of this Order—
 - (a) on the upper deck of a double-decked vehicle;
 - (b) if there is any vacant seat in the vehicle.
- 3.—The expression "public service vehicle" means a mechanically propelled vehicle (other than a tramcar or trolley vehicle) used in standing or plying for hire or used to carry passengers for hire and seating more than 8 persons in addition to the driver thereof.
- 4.—This Order may be cited as "The Standing Passengers (Northern Ireland) Order, 1941," and shall come into force forthwith.
