

"33. The Civil Authority may by order prohibit, restrict or regulate in any area the use of vehicles or any class of vehicles on highways or the use by vehicles of specified roads or classes of roads, either generally or in such circumstances as may be specified.

34. The Civil Authority, and any person duly authorised by him, shall have right of access to any land or buildings or other property whatsoever.

34A. It shall be lawful for the Civil Authority and any person duly authorised by him:—

- (a) to take possession of any land and to construct works, including roads, thereon, and to remove any trees, hedges, and fences therefrom;
- (b) to take possession of any buildings or other property;
- (c) to take such steps as may be necessary for placing any buildings or structures in a state of defence;
- (d) to cause any buildings or structures to be destroyed or any property to be moved from one place to another, or to be destroyed;
- (e) to do any other act involving interference with private rights of property."

2. These Regulations may be cited as the Civil Authorities (Special Powers) Acts (Amending) Regulations (Northern Ireland), 1957.

REGULATIONS, DATED 28TH JANUARY, 1957, MADE BY THE MINISTER OF HOME AFFAIRS UNDER SUB-SECTION (3) OF SECTION ONE OF THE CIVIL AUTHORITIES (SPECIAL POWERS) ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1922.

Whereas by virtue of the Civil Authorities (Special Powers) Act (Northern Ireland), 1922, there are in force certain Regulations for peace and order in Northern Ireland being—

- (a) Regulations contained in the Schedule to that Act, and
- (b) Regulations made by the Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland pursuant to powers conferred by sub-section (3) of Section One of the said Act

(which Regulations where contained in the Schedule or made as aforesaid are hereinafter referred to as the "principal Regulations"):

And whereas the said Minister is empowered by the said sub-section (3) to make Regulations for making further provision for the preservation of the peace and maintenance of order and any Regulations so made shall, subject to the provisions of the said Act have effect and be in force in like manner as Regulations contained in the Schedule to that Act:

And whereas it is expedient that further provision for the preservation of the peace and maintenance of order should be made:

Now, therefore, I, the Right Honourable W. W. B. Topping, Q.C., Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland, in exercise of the powers conferred on me by the said sub-section, do hereby make the following Regulations:—

1. At the end of Regulation 36 of the principal Regulations there shall be inserted the following Regulations:—

“ 37.—(1) The civil authority, where it considers it necessary for the protection of life and property and the preservation of the peace and maintenance of order, may by Order require that no person entering any port in Northern Ireland specified in the Order on board any ship to which the Order applies shall, except with the written permission of the civil authority or any officer of the Royal Ulster Constabulary not below the rank of County Inspector, quit such ship in Northern Ireland. and it shall be lawful for the civil authority or any person authorised by him or any police constable or member of any of Her Majesty's Forces on duty to compel, by any kind of necessary force, any person so quitting or attempting to quit such ship to return on board. An Order made under this Regulation shall not apply to the Master of the ship.

(2) It shall be the duty of the Master of any ship to take such steps as are reasonably necessary to secure that persons on board the ship are made aware of any prohibition imposed on them by any Order made under this Regulation.”

2. These Regulations may be cited as the Civil Authorities (Special Powers) Act (Amending) (No. 2) Regulations (Northern Ireland), 1957.
