EXPLANATORY NOTE

*(This note is not part of the Order but is intended to indicate its general purport.)*

This Order provides for the service in the employment of the Queen's University of Belfast of certain laboratory attendants who after 30th April, 1939, and before 31st January, 1940, were taken into the Civil Service to be reckoned on certain conditions as unestablished civil service for the purposes of the Superannuation Acts.

**Marginal Production Seeds and Fertilisers**

SCHEME, DATED 1ST MAY, 1959, MADE BY THE MINISTRY OF AGRICULTURE UNDER SECTION 6 OF THE AGRICULTURE ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1949(a).

The Ministry of Agriculture in exercise of the powers conferred on it by Section Six of the Agriculture Act (Northern Ireland), 1949, and of every other power enabling it in that behalf, and with the approval of the Ministry of Finance, hereby makes the following Scheme:—

1. This Scheme may be cited as the Agricultural (Marginal Production Seeds and Fertilisers) Amendment and Revocation Scheme (Northern Ireland), 1959.

2. The Agricultural (Marginal Production Seeds and Fertilisers) Scheme (Northern Ireland), 1956(b), is hereby amended as follows:—

The following paragraph shall be substituted for the first paragraph of Article 3:

“The Ministry may grant assistance towards the net costs incurred before the first day of July, 1959, by occupiers of not more than 50 statute acres of arable land situated in the districts specified in the Second Schedule in purchasing such kinds and quantities of the goods specified in the First Schedule as the Ministry may approve.”
