Screening

Policy Aim

1. The Scottish Government has been working to improve parking legislation in Scotland in order to tackle the impact of inconsiderate and obstructive parking and ensure that our roads and pavements are accessible for all.
2. As part of this work, The Transport (Scotland) Act 2019 introduced prohibitions on pavement parking, double parking and parking at dropped kerbs, and gives local authorities the relevant powers to enforce these new provisions. The Act also gives local authorities the power to exempt footways from the pavement parking prohibition in certain circumstances and in accordance with Ministerial directions. The Regulations are required for Scottish Ministers to make provision in connection with the making, amendment and revocation of exemption orders.

Who will it affect?

3. Local authorities, motorists and pavement users will be directly affected by the Regulations (Exemption Orders Process). Local authorities will be responsible for undertaking road assessments on their streets to identify if and where an exemption order is needed, subject to qualifying criteria set by Scottish Ministers.
4. Pavement users (e.g. pedestrians) are expected to benefit from the pavement parking ban as a whole however the Regulations will give local authorities a procedure to follow to allow pavement parking on a section of footway if they deem it necessary and if it falls in with the criteria as laid out in Ministerial Directions.

What might prevent the desired outcomes being achieved?

5. The main aim of the parking provisions is to improve the safety and accessibility for all road users through more effective management and enforcement of parking restrictions. Scottish Ministers acknowledge that a ‘one size fits all’ approach is not appropriate given the different layouts of towns and cities across Scotland.

6. As such, the existing legislation provides powers for local authorities to exempt sections of footway from the national ban. These new Regulations provide a procedure to follow to exempt such areas.

Stage 1: Framing

Results of framing exercise

7. An equality impact assessment was undertaken due to the regulations giving local authorities a procedure to follow to exempt appropriate areas of footway from the national pavement parking ban. However as mentioned above the parking prohibitions as a whole aim to tackle the impact of inconsiderate and obstructive parking and ensure that our roads and pavements are accessible for all.

8. During the formulation of the policy, we continued to engage with our Parking Standards Group which has a range of stakeholders, including representatives from Living Streets Scotland, COSLA, Parking industry, Guide Dogs Scotland, local authorities, Regional Transport Partnership, Cycling Scotland and Federation of Small Businesses. In addition, we carried out a 12 week public consultation which ran from 17 December 2021 to 11 March 2022. Feedback from the consultation helped inform the content of these regulations.

9. It may be worthwhile noting at this point that the power to make Exemption Orders is already in the primary legislation (Transport (Scotland) Act 2019). This consultation and the subsequent Regulations relate to the process for making an Exemption Order.

Extent/Level of EQIA required

10. Any impacts from the introduction of these regulations will arise from decisions made by local authorities following the assessments of their roads and potential for Exemption Orders. While these decisions are outside the scope of Scottish Ministers powers, this EQIA sets out some of the evidence that local authorities may wish to consider should they wish to promote an Exemption Order. In addition, information will be included in the Parking Standards Guidance document detailing that local authorities should undertake an EQIA of their own before making an Exemption Order.

11. In developing this EQIA the Scottish Government is mindful throughout of the three needs of the Public Sector Equality Duty (PSED) – to eliminate

unlawful discrimination, harassment and victimisation; to advance equality of opportunity between people who share a protected characteristic and those who do not; and to foster good relations between people who share a protected characteristic and those who do not. Where any negative impacts have been identified, we have sought to mitigate/eliminate these. We are also mindful that the equality duty is not just about negating or mitigating negative impacts, as we also have a positive duty to promote equality.

² In respect of this protected characteristic, a body subject to the Public Sector Equality Duty (which includes Scottish Government) only needs to comply with the first need of the duty (to eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation and any other conduct that is prohibited by or under the Equality Act 2010) and only in relation to work. This is because the parts of the Act covering services and public functions, premises, education etc. do not apply to that protected characteristic. Equality impact assessment within the Scottish Government does not require assessment against the protected characteristic of Marriage and Civil Partnership unless the policy or practice relates to work, for example HR policies and practices.

The Regulations have received some negative views from disability organisations however we have reassured them that if a local authority exempts part of a footway, they will need to leave 1.5 metres of clear pavement for the safe passage of all pavement users. Even with the possibility of exemptions being promoted by local authorities, the overall impact of the parking prohibitions will help to ensure our roads and pavements are accessible to all, including the elderly, children, disabled, pregnant road users and people with prams.

Monitoring and Review

Local authorities will have the powers to enforce the parking prohibitions contained in the Transport (Scotland) Act 2019 which includes the national pavement parking ban. However the Regulations supporting enforcement for these prohibitions are not likely to be in force until 2023. Transport Scotland will be progressing Regulations supporting enforcement at the same time as local authorities will be undertaking their road assessments and promoting any required Exemption Orders.
