

CHAPTER cl.

An Act to confirm a Scheme of the Charity Commissioners A.D. 1909.

for the management of the Charity of John Marshall.

[20th October 1909.]

WHEREAS the Charity Commissioners for England and Wales in their report to His Majesty of their proceedings during the year one thousand nine hundred and eight have reported that they have approved and certified a scheme for the management of the charity of John Marshall regulated by Marshall's Charity Act 1855:

And whereas it is expedient that the scheme as the same is fully set out and defined in the schedule to this Act should be confirmed:

Be it therefore enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal and Commons in this present Parliament assembled and by the authority of the same as follows:—

- 1. The said scheme is hereby confirmed Provided always Confirmation that nothing in the Act or in the said scheme shall be held to of scheme. interfere with the ordinary jurisdiction over endowed charities now exerciseable or hereafter to become exerciseable by the High Court of Justice and the Charity Commissioners.
- 2. This Act may be cited as the Marshall's Charity Scheme Short title. Confirmation Act 1909.

SCHEDULE.

Scheme for the Application or Management of the Charity of John Marshall.

The Charity Commissioners may from time to time in the exercise of their ordinary jurisdiction upon the application of the Trustees of the charity or of a majority of them establish schemes for the alteration of any provisions of Marshall's Charity Act 1855 as if those provisions had been made by the founder in the case of a charity having a founder.
