An Act for enabling the Master, Warden, Fellows, Brethren, Sisters and Scholars of the College of God's Gift in Dulwich, in the County of Surrey, to grant a Lease or Leases of certain Estates belonging to the same College in the said County, pursuant to an Agreement entered into for that Purpose; and also to grant Building Leases of other Parts of the same Estates; and for other Purposes therein mentioned. 18th June 1808.

THEREAS His Majesty King James the First, by Letters Patent Letters Padated the Twenty-sirst Day of June in the Seventeenth Year of June, 17 His Reign, did grant and give Licence to Edward Alleyne James I. Esquire to erect and found a College in Dulwich in the County of Surrey, which should endure for ever, aud consist of One Master, One Warden, wich, Four Fellows, Six poor Brethren, Six poor Sisters, and Twelve poor Scholars, to be maintained, educated and governed, according to fuch Ordinances and Statutes as should be made and ordained by the said Edward Alleyne; and it was ordered that the said College should be called "The College of God's Gift in Dulwich in the County of Surrey," and that the said Master, Warden, Four Fellows, Six poor Brethren, Six poor Sisters, and Twelve poor Scholars, and their Successors, should be One Body Corporate, and have perpetual Succession for ever, and have a [Loc. & Per.] Common. 25 L

Common Seal; and His said Majesty did further grant and give Licence unto the faid Master, Warden, Fellows, Brethren, Sisters and Scholars, to purchase and take to them and their Successors for ever for their Maintenance and Relief from the said Edward Alleyne the Manor or Lordship of Dulwich, with the Rights, Royalties, Members, and Appurtenances in the Parish of Camberwell in the Counties of Surrey and Kent, or in either of them, and divers Messuages, Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments in the said Letters Patent more particularly described, situate and being in Dulwich aforesaid and in the Parish of Lambeth in the said County of Surrey; and also all those Messuages, Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments in the Parish of Saint Botolph without Bishopgate London, which descended and came to the said Edward Alleyne from his Father Edward Alleyne deceased; and also all those Messuages, Lands, Tenements, Garden, Hereditaments, and Building of the said Edward Alleyne, then called by the Name of the Fortune in White Cross Street and Golden Lane, in that Part of Saint Giles Cripplegate London which is in Middlesex (now Saint Luke Old Street); and his said Majesty did give Licence to the said Edward Alleyne to grant and affure unto the said Master, Warden, Fellows, Brethren, Sisters and Scholars, and their Successors, for the Uses, Intents, and Purposes aforefaid, all that the said Manor and other the Hereditaments with the Appurtenances (the Statute of Mortmain or any other Act to the contrary thereof notwithstanding) and also Licence and Authority to the said Edward Alleyne to make and constitute Statutes and Rules for the Maintenance, Education and Government, as well of the faid College as of all and every the faid Manor and other Hereditaments; and His said Majesty did appoint the Archbishop of Canterbury for the Time being to be the Visitor of the said College: And whereas the faid Edward Alleyne did some Time in the Year One thousand six hundred and nineteen, pursuant to the said Letters Patent, found and establish a College in Dulwich aforesaid, by the Name of "The College of God's Gift in Dulwich in the County of Surrey;" and did also establish the first Members of the same, and the Master, Warden, Four Fellows, Six poor Brethren, Six poor Sisters, and Twelve poor Scholars, to be a Body Corporate; and the said Edward Alleyne afterwards levied a Fine of the said Manor, and other Herediraments comprized in the faid Letters Patent, the Uses whereof were declared to enure to the Use of himself for Life, with Remainder to the sole and only Use of the then Master, Warden, Four Fellows, Six poor Brethren, Six poor Sisters, and Twelve poor Scholars of the said College, and their Successors for ever: And whereas the said Edward Alleyne, hath by Two several Statutes made pursuant to the said Letters Patent, ordained that no Lease or Demise should be made of any of the Lands given by him to the said College, but at One of the Publick Audit Days, by the Consent and Approbation of the Master, Warden, Assistants, Senior and Junior Fellows of the said College, or the most Part of them there present, under their Hands and Common Seal of the said College, and that such Leases should be granted for no longer Term than One and Twenty Years, with a valuable Rent reserved thereon, and without Fine, and that no Part of Two hundred Acres of Coppices or Wood Lands, nor so much of the Arable and Pasture Land belonging to the said College, which should be used as a Demesne for Provision, thereunto should be demised in Lease to any Person whatsoever, but that the same should remain in the Occupation of the College, and be husbanded by the Master and Warden with the Consent of most Part of the Senior and Junior Fellows thereof, to the best Benefit and Advantage

of the College, and for the better and more easy Provision of Bread and, Beer and other Victuals, as also for Fuel for the said College: And whereas since the Introduction of Coal, the said Coppices of Wood Lands have not been used for the Purpose designed by the said Edward Alleyne: And Parts of the whereas many Parts of the said Estate and Lands of the said College, in-bly situate oluding the said Coppice or Wood Lands, as also Part of the Lands lying for building. near to the same College, are very eligibly situated for building thereon, which Building would greatly increase the Value of the College Estates, and further the bnevolent Design of the Founder; but by reason of the said Statutes the College are restrained from managing, their Estate to the best Advantage, and the Estates of the said College have not improved in, the same Proportion as the Estates of Individuals, notwithstanding they are subject to the progressive encreasing and necessary Burthens, and to the encreased Price of every Article of Life, and in many Instances (as being a, corporate Body supporting a large Establishment) to more than an equal-Share: And whereas notwithstanding the said College are restrained from Persons have granting Leases for a longer Term than Twenty-one Years, yet many, built on the Persons have been induced to build valuable Houses on the Estate thereto Estate. belonging, and to rebuild others, trusting to the Honour of the said College and their good Faith not to take any undue Advantage; and other Persons might be induced so to do, but such Tenure is precarious and unpleasant to both Landlord and Tenant, and may be the Source of Litigation and Dissention, and more especially as Land so let will not produce to the said College the Rental that it otherwise would, and that a private Individual might fairly expect: And whereas by Articles of Agreement indented Recital of bearing Date on or about the Twenty-ninth Day of September, in the Year Articles of One thousand eight hundred and seven, and made between the Master, to apply to Warden, Four Fellows, Six poor Brethren, Six poor Sisters, and Twelve Parliament, poor Scholars of the said College of God's Gift of the One Part, and John September Advock of Dulwich in the Parish of Saint Giles Camberwell in the said County 1807. of Surrey Esquire, Edward Browne of Dulwich aforesaid Esquire, James Bartlett of Dulwich aforesaid Farmer, John Bowles of Dulwich aforesaid Esquire, Richard Henry Clarke of Dulwich aforesaid Esquire, John Druce of Fulham in the County of Middlesex Esquire, Nathaniel Bogle French of Dulwich aforesaid Esquire, David Gordon of Dulwich aforesaid Esquire, Thomas Griffith of Dulwich aforesaid Esquire, Sarah Hucks of Dulwich atoresaid Widow, Charles Frederick Hennings of Dulwich aforesaid Esquire, George Harris of Dulwich aforesaid Esquire, David Lyon of Dulwich aforelaid Esquire, Henrietta Lawrence of the Parish of Saint Giles Camberwell aforesaid Widow, Peter Martineau of Dulwich aforesaid Esquire, Richard Shawe of Dulwich aforesaid Esquire, Anthony Sterry of Dulwich aforesaid Gentleman, George Sharpe of Dulwich aforesaid Esquire, John Willes of Dulwich aforesaid Esquire, and William Wood Watson of the Parish of Saint Mary Lambeth in the said County of Surry Esquire, of the other Part; after reciting that the said several Persons above named had applied to and requested the said Master, Warden, Fellows, Brethren, Sisters, and Scholars, (in Consideration of the great Costs and Charges which the said several Persons or those from whom they had respectively purchased the same) had been respectively put to, in erecting and building on those Parts of the Estates of the said College of God's Gift, mentioned and specified in the Schedule thereunder written, and in the First Schedule to this Act annexed, the several capital Messuages or Tenements, and other Buildings in the

the same Schedule also specified (to grant them respectively Leases thereof for a long Term of Years), upon the Terms and Conditions therein and hereinafter mentioned; but that inasmuch as the said Master, Warden, Fellows, Brethren, Sisters, and Scholars were restricted by the Statutes of the said College from granting Leases for any longer Term than Twenty-one Years, it was thereby mutually covenanted, declared, and agreed, by and between the said Parties thereto, and the said Master, Warden, Fellows, Brethren, Sisters and Scholars, did thereby covenant with the said several abovenamed Persons, and their respective Executors, Administrators, and Assigns, that they the said Master, Warden, Fellows, Brethren, Sisters, and Scholars would apply for an Act of Parliament to authorize and empower them to make, grant, and execute a Lease or Leases, to such several Persons respectively and their respective Executors, Administrators and Assigns, of the several Pieces or Parcels of Land and Hereditaments in the Schedule thereunder written, and also in the said First Schedule to this Act annexed particularly mentioned and expressed and set against the Names of fuch Persons respectively, situate, lying and being in the said Parishes of Saint Giles Camberwell and Saint Mary Lambeth, in the County of Survey, with the capital Mansions, Messuages, or Tenements, Offices, and other Erections and Buildings thereon erected and built by the faid several Persons, or those from whom-such Persons had respectively purchased the same with their and every of their Appurtenances; to hold the same unto fuch Persons respectively, and their respective Executors, Administrators, and Assigns, for the Term of Sixty-three-Years, to commence from the Periods, and at, under and subject to the several Yearly Rents mentioned and expressed in the same Schiedules, and it was thereby mutually covenanted, declared and agreed by and between the said Parties thereto, that the said feveral Leases when made and executed should contain a Covenant on the Part of the said several Persons respectively and their respective Executors, Administrators, and Assigns, for the Payment of the Rents thereby to be reserved, by Four equal Quarterly Payments during every Year of the said Term so to be granted, clear of all Taxes and Deductions whatsoever (except any Income or Property Tax in respect of the said Rents) and also Covenants from the said several Persons and their respective Executors, Administrators, and Assigns, to repair and keep in Repair the Messuages, Erections, and Buildings, erected and built and to be erected and built on the same Premises, and to surrender and leave in Repair the same Messuages, Erections, and Buildings at the End of the Term in such Leases granted, and also a Power for the Master, Warden, Fellows, Brethren, Sisters, and Scholars, and their Successors, and their Surveyors and Agents, to enter upon the Premises and to inspect the State and Condition thereof, and also all such other usual and proper Covenants, Provisoes, and Conditions, on the Parts of the said several Persons respectively, and their respective Executors, Administrators, and Assigns, as are usually inserted in the Leases from the said College and in Leases of the same or the like Nature; and further, that the faid several Leases when made and executed should contain Conditions of Re-entry for Non-payment of the Rents to be thereby reserved, or Non-performance of the Covenants, Provisoes, or Conditions, on the Part of the said several Persons respectively and their respective Executors, Administrators, and Assigns, and that they should severally execute Counterparts of their respective Leases; and lastly, the said several Persons therein before and in the said Schedule named did respectively agree to accept and take such Leases respectively of the Premises mentioned

tioned and specified in the said Schedule for the said Term of Sixty-three Years from the Periods and at under and subject to the Rents therein also specified and contained, and under and subject to the Covenants, Conditions, and Agreements, contained and expressed in such Leases so to be granted as aforesaid: And whereas the Estates of the said College in White Cross Street, and Golden Lane aforesaid, and Courts adjoining in the Parish of Saint Luke Middlesex, more particularly mentioned and described in the Second Schedule to this Act annexed, have become old and ruinous and require to be pulled down and rebuilt, but the same cannot be done quire to be by reason of the said College being restrained from granting Leases for a rebuiltlonger Term than Twenty-one Years: And whereas it would be of great the College Benefit and Advantage to the said College, if the said recited Contract or to carry the Agreement was carried into Execution, and it would be also of Advantage recited Conto the faid College, if the faid Master, Warden, Fellows, Brethren, Execution Sisters, and Scholars, and their Successors, were enabled to extend the said and extend the Term of Sixty-three years in the Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments, contained in the faid First Schedule for a longer Term by Way of Fine and also to grant Building Leases of the Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments, belonging to the faid College situate in Dulwich aforesaid, and in the faid Parish of Saint Luke Middlesex more particularly mentioned and described in the faid Second Schedule to this Act annexed for a long Term of Years, under and subject to such Terms, Conditions and Agreements, as are herein-after mentioned and contained; but inalmuch as neither the faid recited Contract or Agreement nor any of the several Matters and Things aforesaid, can be specifically performed, and carried into Execution without the Aid and Authority of Parliament; therefore Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, The said Master, Warden, Fellows, Brethren, Sisters and Scholars, do most humbly beseech Your Majesty, that it may be enacted; and be it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That from and after the passing of this Act, it Power to deshall and may be lawful to and for the said Master, Warden, Fellows, Bre-mis-smenthren, Sisters, and Scholars, and their Euccessors, and they are hereby vioned in the fully authorized and empowered by Indenture or Indentures duly executed Contracts and in the First under their common Seal, to grant a Lease or Leases of all and singular the Sch.dule. Messuages, Lands, Tenements, Hereditaments, and Premises comprized in the faid First Schedule to this Act annexed and agreed to be demised to the said several Persons mentioned in the same Schedule by the said recited Contract or Agreement as aforefaid; and also of all Ways, Watercourses, Rights, Easements, Liberties, Privileges, Profits, Commodities, Advantages, and Appurtenances whatfoever thereto belonging, for the Term of Sixty-three Years, to take Effect or be computed from the Periods or Times particularly mentioned and specified in the said Schedule to the faid recited Contract or Agreement, as also in the said First Schedule to this Act annexed, at and under the Yearly Rents specified in the same Schedules, and under and subject to the Covenants, Conditions, and Agreements mentioned or expressed in the same Contract or Agreement and herein-before recited or set forth, according to the true Intent and Meaning thereof, and of this Act.

lows, Brethren, Sisters, and Scholars, and their Successors, and they are hereby fully authorized and empowered by Indenture fealed with their common Seal, to demise, lease, and grant, any Part or Parts of the Messuages, Buildings, and Pieces or Parcels of Ground, Hereditaments and Premises, belonging to the said College, situate, lying and being in Dulwich, and in the Parish of Saint Luke aforesaid, and more particularly mentioned and described in the said Second Schedule to this Act annexed, with the Rights, Easements, and Appurtenances, thereto respectively belonging, unto any Person or Persons who shall be willing to build upon or to rebuild or substantially repair the same in the Manner by the Lease or respective Leases so to be specified for any Term or Number of Years absolute, not exceeding the Term of Eighty-four Years, to take Effect in Possession and not in Reversion or by Way of future Interest, with Liberty for the Lesses to take down all or any Part or Parts of the Buildings, standing upon the Premi es in any fuch Lease or Leases respectively comprized, and to convert and dispose of the Materials thereof to such Uses and Purposes as shall be therein mentioned and agreed upon, and also to lay out and appropriate any Part of the Premises to be comprized in such Lease or Leases as or for a Way or Ways, Passage or Passages, for the Use and Convenience of the Lesse or Lesses, or other Tenants, or Occupiers of the Premises, so as there be referved in and by fuch Leafes, Demises, and Grants respectively, the best and most improved Yearly Rent that can be reasonably had or gotten for the same, to be made payable Quarterly free from all Taxes and Deductions whatloever, (except any Income or Property Tax in respect of the faid Rent) Regard being had to the Value of the Buildings (if any) to be comprized in such Demises or Leases, without taking any Fine, Premium, or Foregift, or any Thing in the Nature thereof for the making of such respective Leases, and so as there be contained in such Demises or Leases' respectively, Covenants from the respective Lessees, to pay the Rent thereby reserved to build and keep in Repair the Messuages, Erections, and Buildings, which may be agreed to be erected and built on the Premises, and also substantially to repair and keep in Repair the Messuages, Erections, and Buildings, agreed or intended to be repaired only, and to furrender and leave in Repair the Messuages, Erections, and Buildings to be erected and built or rebuilt and repaired, upon the Premises thereby respectively to be leased at the End of the Term or Terms in such Leases granted, and so as there be contained in such Demises, or Leases respectively, a Power for the Lessors and their Surveyors and Agents to enter upon the Premises, and to inspect the State and Condition thereof, and all such other usual and proper Covenants, Provisoes, and Conditions, on the Parts of the respective Lessees as are usually contained in Leases granted by the said College, or as are usually contained in Leases of the same or the like Nature, and so as there be also contained in such Demises, or Leases respectively; Conditions of Re-entry for Non-payment of the Rent to be thereby reserved or Non-performance of the Covenants, Provisoes, or Conditions on the Part of the respective Lessees, and so as the respective Lessees do severally execute Counterparts, of their respective Leases.

ditions, and Apreements, as are herein-after mentioned and contained; be it therefore enacted, That it shall and may be lawful to and for the said Master, Warden, Fellows, Brethren, Sisters, and Scholars, and their Successors, from and after the passing of this Act, (in Consideration of a Sum of Money to be paid by Way of Fine or Premium) to extend the said Term of Sixty-three Years unto the said several Persons mentioned in the Schedule to the said recited Agreement, and also in the said First Schedule to this Act annexed, and their respective Executors, Administrators, and Assigns, for any Term or Number of Years, not exceeding in the Whole the Term of Twenty-one Years, to take Effect in Possession immediately after the Expiration of the said Term of Sixty-three Years, under and subject nevertheless to the like Rents, Covenants, Conditions, and Agreements as are in and by the said recited Agreement, expressed and contained, and according to the true Intent and Meaning hereof.

IV. And whereas the faid College is at prefent greatly out of Repair, and The College the West Wing thereof is in great Danger of falling, and must shortly be out of Repair. rebuilt, and a Fund has been for many Years accumulating and faving for that Purpose, now amounting to the Sum of Five thousand six hundred: Pounds, in the Three Pounds per Centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, but the same is totally inadequate thereto; be it therefore enacted, That the Surplus Mo-Monies arising from the said Fines, or Premiums so to be received, shall be nies to be applied in repairing the said College or in rebuilding of the same, either on applied in Repair or the present Scite, or on such other Part of the Estates belonging to the same rebuilding College, as the Visitor thereof for the Time being shall approve.

Successors, and to all and every Person and Persons, Bodies Politic, and Corporate, His and their Heirs, Successors, Executors, and Administrators (other than and except the said Master, Warden, Fellows, Brethren, Sisters, and Scholars, and their Successors, and Assigns), all such Estate, Right, Title, Interest, Claim, and Demand whatsoever, in, to, or out of the said Messuages, Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments, comprized in the faid Schedules to this Act annexed, as they or any of them had or were entitled to, at or before the passing of this Act, or could or might have had in case this Act had not been made.

VI. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall be printed by the Printer to the King's most Excellent Majesty, and a Copy thereof so printed, shall be admitted as Evidence thereof by all Judges, Justices, and others.
