Cap. I.

An Act for extending the Term, and altering the Powers, of an Act made in the Forty-fifth Year of His present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to enable Robert Bowyer of Pall Mall, in the City of Westminster, Esquire, to dispose of his Collection of Paintings, Drawings, and Engravings, together with several Copies of certain Books therein mentioned, by way of Chance.* [19th February 1807.]

WHEREAS by an Act made in the Forty fifth Year of His present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to enable Robert Bowyer, of Pall-Mall, in the City of Westminster, Esquire, to dispose of his Collection of Paintings, Drawings, and Engravings, together with several Copies of certain Books therein mentioned, by way of Chance,* the said Robert Bowyer, his Executors, Administrators, or Assigns, were enabled to sell and dispose of the said Collection of Paintings, Drawings, and Engravings, and the several Pieces composing the same, together with certain Copies of *Hume's History of England* then unsold, by way of Chance, without being liable to any Penalty or Forfeiture imposed by any Act or Acts of Parliament, [Loc. & Per.] 45 G.3. c. 24

subject to the Terms, Provisoos, and Restrictions therein mentioned: And whereas it is by the said Act declared, That the Money to be raised by way of such Lottery should not exceed Sixty-nine thousand Three hundred Pounds; and that the Number of Tickets should not exceed Twenty-two thousand, to be numbered from One to Twenty-two thousand respectively both inclusive, and that the said Collection of Paintings, Drawings, and Engravings, together with the said Copies of *Hume's History of England* then unfold, should be divided and allotted according to the Schedule to the said Act annexed: And that the One thousand four hundred and Fifty-one Prizes therein mentioned should be determined by the Drawing of any State Lottery that should consist of Twenty-two thousand Tickets or upwards, which should be drawn in *London*, between the First Day of *August* One thousand eight hundred and five and the First Day of *December* One thousand eight hundred and six, in pursuance of any Act or Acts of Parliament which might thereafter be passed for that Purpose, if any such should be passed; and that if more than One such Lottery should be so appointed to be drawn within such Period, then by such of the said Lotteries as should be chosen by the said *Robert Bowyer*, and notified in the *London Gazette* Forty-two days, before the Drawing of such Lottery; and that the first One thousand four hundred and fifty-one Numbers that should be drawn in such State Lottery, were they either Blank or Prize, the Numbers whereof should respectively correspond with any Numbers of the Tickets of the Lottery authorized by that Act, should respectively be the Prizes in the Order in which the said Collection of Paintings, Drawings, and Engravings, and the said several Pieces composing the same, and the said Copies of *Hume's History of England* then unfold, were divided and allotted in the Schedule to that Act, and the several Holders of the Twenty thousand five hundred and forty-nine unsuccessful Tickets should be intitled to and receive Engravings aggregately of the estimated Value of Three Guineas for each and every Ticket in the said then intended Lottery remaining after the Drawing of the said One thousand four hundred and fifty-one Tickets, according to and in the Manner prescribed in, and by the said Schedule: And whereas Four State Lotteries were drawn between the said First Day of *August* One thousand eight hundred and five, and the First Day of *December* One thousand eight hundred and six: And whereas it was the Intention of the said *Robert Bowyer* to have determined the Prizes in the said Act mentioned, by the last of the said State Lotteries, which began drawing on the Thirteenth Day of *October* One thousand eight hundred and six; but it became impossible for him so to do, as such State Lottery consisted only of Twenty thousand Tickets, and it is therefore expedient that further Time should be allowed for carrying into Execution the Powers contained in the said Act: May it therefore please Your Majesty that it may be enacted; and be it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That the said recited Act, and all and every the Clauses, Powers, Provisions, Matters, and Things therein contained, (save and except such Parts thereof as have been already carried into Execution and complied with, or as are hereby varied, altered, or repealed) shall be as good, valid, and effectual, for carrying this Act into Execution, as if the same had been repeated and re-enacted in the Body of this present Act.

Powers of former Act continued.

The Tickets already sold to be deemed

II. And be it further enacted, That all and every the Ticket and Tickets authorized to be sold by the said recited Act, which have been sold and disposed

disposed of by the said *Robert Bowyer*, shall be deemed and taken to be Part of the said Twenty-two thousand Tickets in the said Act mentioned; and it shall and may be lawful to and for the said *Robert Bowyer*, his Executors, Administrators, and Assigns, to sell and dispose of such of the Tickets authorized to be sold by that Act as yet remain unsold, to any Person or Persons whomsoever, under the Directions and Provisions in the said Act mentioned and contained.

Part of the 22,000 Tickets in the former Act mentioned

III. And be it further enacted, That the One thousand four hundred and fifty-one Prizes in the said recited Act mentioned and described, shall be determined by the Drawing of the First State-Lottery that shall be drawn in *London* after the passing of this Act in pursuance of any Act or Acts of Parliament for that Purpose, in case such Lottery shall consist of Twenty-two thousand Tickets or upwards; and the first One thousand four hundred and fifty-one Numbers that shall be drawn in such State Lottery, be they either Blank or Prize, the Numbers whereof shall respectively correspond with any Numbers of the Tickets of the Lottery authorized by this Act, shall respectively be, and they are hereby declared to be the Prizes in the Order in which the said Collection of Paintings, Drawings, and Engravings, and the said several Pieces composing the same, and the said Copies of *Hume's History of England* yet unsold, are divided and allotted in the Schedule to the said recited Act annexed; and the several Holders of the Twenty thousand five hundred and forty-nine unsuccessful Tickets shall be entitled to have and receive Engravings aggregately of the estimated Value of Three Guineas, for each and every Ticket in the said intended Lottery remaining after the Drawing of the said One thousand four hundred and fifty-one Tickets, according to and in the Manner prescribed in and by the said Schedule to the said Act.

The Prizes to be determined by the First State Lottery after passing this Act, if it shall consist of 22,000 Tickets, or upwards.

IV. Provided always, and be it enacted, That in case the First State Lottery that shall be appointed to be drawn after the passing of this Act shall not consist of Twenty-two thousand Tickets or upwards, then and in such Case it shall and may be lawful to and for the said *Robert Bowyer*, his Executors or Administrators, and he and they is and are hereby authorized, empowered, and required, at any Time after the Appointment of the Drawing of such Lottery, and before the Fourth Day of *July* following, to determine the said One thousand four hundred and fifty-one Prizes, and the said Engravings for the Holders of the Twenty thousand five hundred and forty-nine unsuccessful Tickets by a separate Lottery; and for that Purpose, the whole Twenty-two thousand Numbers shall be put into a Wheel, in like Manner as is used in State Lotteries; and the same Numbers shall be drawn thereout at such Place, on such Day or Days previous to the said Fourth Day of *July*, and at such Time or Times, and under and subject to such Regulations as the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, or any Three or more of them shall approve and direct, so that such separate Lottery may be drawn and conducted in such and the like Manner as the State Lotteries of this Kingdom are usually drawn and conducted, or as near thereto as existing Circumstances will permit; and the First One thousand four hundred and fifty-one Numbers that shall be drawn out of such Wheel shall respectively be, and they are hereby declared to be the Prizes in the Order in which the said Collection of Paintings, Drawings, and Engravings, and the said several Pieces composing the same. and the said Copies of *Hume's History of England* yet

If such State Lottery shall not consist of 22,000 Tickets or upwards, then by a separate Lottery, under such Regulations as the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury shall approve.

unfold, are divided and allotted in the Schedule to the said recited Act annexed, and the several Holders of the Twenty thousand Five hundred and Forty-nine unsuccessful Tickets shall be entitled to and receive Engravings aggregately of the estimated Value of Three Guineas for each and every such unsuccessful Ticket, according to and in the Manner prescribed by the said Schedule to the said recited Act.

If by a separate Lottery Notice to be given.

V. Provided always, That in case the said Prizes and Engravings are to be determined by a separate Lottery, Notice thereof shall be given by the said *Robert Bowyer*, his Executors or Administrators, in the *London Gazette*, Twenty Days at the least previous to the Drawing of such Lottery.

Publick Act.

VI. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall be deemed and taken to be a Publick Act, and shall be judicially taken Notice of as such, by all Judges, Justices, and others, without being specially pleaded.

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
