An Act for uniting the Medieties of the Rectory of Liverpool in the County Palatine of Lancaster, and for the better Endowment thereof, and of certain Churches in the said Town.

[10th August 1838.]

THEREAS by an Act passed in the Tenth and Eleventh Years of the Reign of His Majesty King William the Third, intituled An Act to enable the Town of Liverpool in 10 & 11 W. 3. the County Palatine of Lancaster to build a Church and endow the same, c. 36. and for making the said Town and Liberties, thereof a Parish of itself distinct from Walton, the said Town of Liverpool was separated from the Parish of Walton, and became a distinct Parish of itself by the Name of the Parish of Liverpool; and by the said Act Two Rectors, were appointed to have Care of the Souls of the Inhabitants of the said Town; and it was directed that the said Rectory should be called and esteemed a Mediety, that is, equal between the said Two Rectors, and that such a yearly Rate or Assessment should be made and raised within the said Town and Liberties for the Use of the said Rectors as should, with the Tithes due to them, amount to the Sum of Two hundred Pounds yearly at the least: And whereas by an Act passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of His Majesty King George [Local.] the

26 G.3.c. 15. the Third, intituled An Act for augmenting and ascertaining the Income of the Rectors of the Parish Church and Parochial Chapel of Liverpool, a clear additional Sum of Two hundred Pounds a Year was directed to be assessed, raised, and paid by and upon the Occupiers of all Houses and Buildings in the said Town and Liberties of Liverpool, for the Use of the Rectors of the same Parish, as an Augmentation of their respective Salaries: And whereas the Parishioners of Liverpool have been accustomed to provide an additional Stipend of One hundred and sixty Pounds for each of the said Rectors, and also to vote the Sum of One hundred and eighty Pounds per Annum to each of the Four Curates of the said Parish: And whereas the Reverend Jonathan Brooks is the Rector of the First Mediety of the said Rectory, and the Reverend Augustus Campbell is the Rector 1 G. 1. c. 21. of the Second Mediety of the said Rectory: And whereas, by virtue and in pursuance of an Act made in the First Year of the Reign of His Majesty King George the First, another Church or Chapel was erected and built within the Limits of the said Parish of Liverpool, and on the Site of the Castle of Liverpool, at the proper Charge of the Mayor, Bailiffs, and Burgesses of the said Town of Liverpool, and which is called or known by the Name of Saint George's Church or Chapel; and by the said Act it was provided that the Stipend or Salary of the Curate or Chaplain of the said Church or Chapel should not be less than the Sum of Fifty Pounds per Annum, but more, at the Discretion of the Mayor, Bailiffs, and Common Council of the said Town, and should be charged upon their Common Stock: And whereas the Reverend John Boughey Monk is the present Chaplain of the said Church, and the Reverend Thomas Gerard Leigh is the 21 G. 2. c. 24. Assistant Minister of the said Church: And whereas, by virtue and in pursuance of another Act made in the Twenty-first Year of the Reign of His Majesty King George the Second, another Church was erected and built within the Limits of the said Parish at the Charge and by the Subscription of several of the Inhabitants of the said Town of Liverpool, which is called or known by the Name of Saint Thomas's Church; and by the said Act it was provided that every Minister of the said Church succeeding the Minister appointed by the said Act should receive out of the Pew Rents such Salary, not less than Eighty Pounds per Annum, as the Subscribers and Persons claiming under them should appoint: And whereas the Reverend John Charles Prince is the present Chaplain of the said Church, and the Reverend Thomas Lloyd Pain is the Assistant Minister of the said Church: 2 G. 3. c. 68. And whereas, by virtue and in pursuance of Two other Acts 7 G. 3. c. 80 made in the Second and Seventh Years of the Reign of His Majesty King George the Third, another Church or Chapel was erected and built within the Limits of the said Parish of Liverpool, and which is called or known by the Name of Saint Paul's Church; and it was by the said Acts or one of them directed that there should be Two Ministers of the said Church, and that the Head Minister or Chaplain of the said Church should be paid out of the Estate and Stock of the Borough and Corporation of Liverpool the annual or yearly Stipend or Salary of Fifty Pounds, and an additional Salary out of the Rents and Profits of the Seats in the Galleries of the said Church, and the Second Minister should be paid a Salary out of the same Rents and Profits: And whereas the Reverend John

Herman Stafford is the First or Head Minister of the said Church of Saint Paul, and the Reverend Roger Hesketh Formby is the Second Minister of the same Church: And whereas, by virtue and in pursuance 12 G. 3.c. 36. of an Act made in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of His Majesty King George the Third, another Church or Chapel was erected and built within the Limits of the said Parish of Liverpool, and which is called or known by the Name of Saint Ann's Church or Chapel; and it was by the said Act provided that there should be paid yearly to the Minister or Chaplain of the said Church or Chapel the Sum of Seventy Pounds out of the Rents of the Pews or Seats therein, and from the Monies to arise from the Burying Ground in the Churchyard: And whereas the Reverend William Blundell is the present Minister or Chaplain of the said Church or Chapel: And whereas, by virtue and in pursuance 7 G.4. c. 51. of an Act of Parliament made in the Seventh Year of the Reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, another Church was erected and built within the Limits of the said Parish of Liverpool, and which is called or known by the Name of Saint David's Church; and it was by the said Act provided that there should be paid yearly to the Minister of the said Church the Sum of Ninety Pounds out of Rents of Pews or Seats therein: And whereas the Reverend Robert Davies is the Minister of the said Church: And whereas the Patronage, Advowson, Donation, or Presentation of and to the Rectory of the said Parish and Parish Church of Liverpool, and the Election and Choice of the Curate or Chaplain of the said Church of Saint George, and the perpetual Advowson, Patronage, and Right of Presentation of, in, and to the same Churches of Saint Thomas, Saint Paul, and Saint Ann, belong to and are now vested in the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of Liverpool: And whereas the Right of Nomination of the Minister of the said Church of Saint David for the Period of Forty Years from the passing of the said recited Act of the Seventh Year of the Reign of King George the Fourth belongs to and is vested in the Trustees acting under or by virtue of the said Act, and from and after the Expiration of the said Term of Forty Years belongs to and is vested in the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses: And whereas the Endowment of the said Rectory and the Provisions made by Law for the officiating Ministers of the said other Churches hereinbefore mentioned having been found insufficient for the due Support of the Rectors of the said Rectory and of the other Ministers respectively, the Mayor, Bailiffs, and Burgesses of Liverpool have been accustomed from and out of the Income of the Estates, Property, and Effects of the said Corporation to increase the Endowment of the said Rectory, and also the Provision for the Ministers of the said other Churches: And whereas the Right of Presentation and the perpetual Advowson of, in, and to the Church of Saint John in the said Parish belongs to and is vested in the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses: And whereas the Patronage and Right of Presentation of the Minister and Assistant Minister of the Church of Saint Martin-in-the-Fields in the said Parish belongs to and is vested in the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses: And whereas the said Mayor, Bailiffs, and Burgesses have been accustomed to appoint and provide for the Assistant Minister of each of the said Churches of Saint George and Saint Thomas, and an Assistant Minister to officiate in the said Church of Saint John: And whereas by an Act passed in the Fifth -and

and Sixth Years of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the 5 % 6 W. 4. Fourth, intituled An Act to provide for the Regulation of Municipal Corporations in England and Wales, it was enacted, that all Stipends and Allowances which during Seven Years next before the Fifth Day of June in the Year One thousand eight hundred and thirty-five had been usually paid and granted to the Minister or late Minister of any Church or Chapel by the Corporate Body named in the Schedules A. and B. to the said Act annexed, in conjunction with any Borough, should be secured as soon as conveniently might be after the passing of the said Act to every Person entitled or accustomed to receive the same, in the Manner in the said Act mentioned: And whereas the Allowances so made by the said Mayor, Bailiffs, and Burgesses to the said Rectors and other Ministers in augmentation of their respective Stipends, as herein before is mentioned, having been materially increased since the Fifth Day of June One thousand eight hundred and twenty-eight, such increased Allowances are not within the Provisions of the said, recited Act of the Fifth and Sixth Years of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth: And whereas the Lord Bishop of Chester is the Ordinary of the Diocese in which the said Parish of Liverpool is situated: And whereas the Mayor, Bailiffs, and Burgesses of the said Town of Liverpool, on or about the Twenty-first Day of December One thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, placed the Sum of One hundred and five thousand Pounds in the Hands of James Aspinall Esquire, John Bourne Esquire, Sir Thomas Brancker Knight, James Cockshott Esquire, Robertson Gladstone Esquire, Richard Houghton Esquire, the Right Reverend Father in God John Bird Lord Bishop of Chester, Charles Lawrence Esquire, James Pownall Esquire, Thomas Shaw Esquire, and John Wright Esquire, as Trustees, to be held by them upon certain Trusts for the Endowment of the Rectory and several of the Churches herein-before mentioned: And whereas the said Sum was invested by the said Trustees on certain Securities bearing Interest, and the Interest thereof with Accumulations thereon amounts to the Sum of Ten thousand eight hundred Pounds or thereabouts: And whereas Differences have existed concerning the Validity of the said Payment and the Trusts thereof, and a Suit on the Information of Her Majesty's Attorney General on the Relation of certain Burgesses of the said Borough is now depending, and considerable Costs and Expences have been paid or incurred by the said Relators, the said Trustees, and the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses in respect to the said Suit, and otherwise relating to the said Differences, and further Expences will be incurred in terminating the said Suit: And whereas it hath been agreed that the said Suit shall be forthwith put an end to, and that the Securities upon which the said Sum of One hundred and five thousand Pounds hath been invested shall be transferred, and the Interest thereof, with the Accumulations, paid over by the said Trustees, to the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses, and that the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses shall pay to the several Ministers mentioned in the Schedule hereunder written Five half-yearly Payments of the several annual Sums set opposite to their respective Names, with Interest thereon after the Rate of Three per Centum per Annum, and shall also pay the Costs which have been already incurred in prosecuting the said Suit, and those which may hereafter

be incurred in terminating and winding up the same: And whereas the Division of the said Rectory into Medieties hath been found inconvenient, and it is desirable that the same should be united, and that there should be for the future One Minister only of the several Churches of Saint George, Saint Thomas, and Saint Martin, and that some Provision should be made for the Payment of the increased Allowances heretofore made by the said Mayor, Bailiffs, and Burgesses of Liverpool to the said Rectors, and to the Ministers of the said Churches of Saint George, Saint Thomas, Saint Paul, Saint Ann, and Saint David, which are not within the Provisions of the said recited Act of the Fifth and Sixth Years of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, and also for the better Endowment of all the said several Churches herein-before mentioned; but inasmuch as the same cannot be effected without the Aid and Authority of Parliament: May it therefore please Your Majesty that it may be enacted; and be it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That from and immediately after the Uniting the next Avoidance of either of the said Medieties of the said Rectory Medieties of the said Parish of Liverpool the said Rectory shall be no longer in of the Rec-Medieties, but shall be one entire Rectory, and shall from thence tory after the next Avoidforth so remain and continue for ever.

And be it enacted, That upon and from and immediately after The survivthe next Avoidance of either of the said Medieties the Survivor or continuing Incumbent of the other of the same Medieties shall ipso become sole facto be and become and shall until his Death or Avoidance continue Rector. the sole Rector of the said Parish of Liverpool; and he and his Successors shall and may have, exercise, and enjoy all such and the same Powers and Authorities as are now vested in the said Rectors jointly or in either of them separately; and that upon the Death or other Mayor, &c. Avoidance of such surviving or continuing Rector the said Mayor, to have the Aldermen, and Burgesses, and their Assigns, shall for ever thereafter Patronage of the united have and be entitled to the Patronage, Advowson, Donation, and Rectory. Presentation of and to the said united Rectory, in the same Manner to all Intents and Purposes as they would have been entitled to the Patronage, Advowson, Donation, or Presentation to the Medieties of the same Rectory, or either of them, in case this Act had not been passed.

And be it enacted, That from and after such next Avoidance Surviving of either of the said Medieties the Incumbent of the other of the Incumbent said Medieties, and his Successors, shall be entitled to the whole of the whole Fees, Surplice Fees and other Ecclesiastical Emoluments and Parish Dues &c. which have heretofore been accustomed to be paid to and received by the said Two Rectors jointly or either of them separately, and shall bear, pay, and discharge all Dues, Fees, Payments of every Description, and Sums of Money payable in respect of either of the said Medieties or by either of the said Rectors.

IV. And be it enacted, That in the meantime and until the Provision next Avoidance of either of the said Medieties there shall be paid to for the pre-[Local.] 27 P

each of them the said Jonathan Brooks and Augustus Campbell, yearly and every Year, together with a proportionate Part up to the Time of such Avoidance, the several Sums following; that is to say, the Two several Sums or Parochial Stipends of One hundred Pounds each payable under or by virtue of the said recited Acts of the Eleventh and Twelfth Years of the Reign of King William the Third, and the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of King George the Third; the Sum of One hundred and sixty Pounds heretofore annually voted by the Parishioners of Liverpool, but which it shall hereafter be obligatory upon the said Parishioners to pay; the Sum of Two hundred Pounds, which, having been usually paid by the said Mayor, Bailiffs, and Burgesses previously to the Fifth Day of June One thousand eight hundred and twenty-eight, has since, by the Provisions of the said recited Act of the Fifth and Sixth Years of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, become a legal Charge on the Borough Fund of the said Borough; and the Sum of One hundred and fifty Pounds, which, not having been usually paid for the Period of Seven Years before the Fifth Day of June One thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, is not within the Provisions of the said Act; which said Sums, amounting together to the Sum of Seven hundred and ten Pounds, shall be over and above and in addition to his Share of the Monies arising from Seat Rents, and of the Surplice Fees and other Ecclesiastical Emoluments and Parish Dues.

For enforcing Payment of the Sums heretofore annually voted by the Parish.

V. And be it enacted, That the annual Sum of One hundred and sixty Pounds heretofore annually voted to each of them the said Jonathan Brooks and Augustus Campbell by the Parishioners of the said Parish, and the Payment of which is now made obligatory upon the said Parishioners to pay, shall be paid to each of them the said Jonathan Brooks and Augustus Campbell by the Churchwardens of the said Parish; and if such Payments or any of them shall at any Time be in arrear for the Space of Twenty-one Days after the Day on which the same ought to be paid, it shall be lawful for the said Jonathan Brooks and Augustus Campbell, or such of them to whom such Payments shall be so in arrear as aforesaid, his Executors or Administrators, to sue the Churchwardens of the said Parish of Liverpool for the Recovery thereof in the same Manner in all respects as the Rectors of the said Parish or either of them may sue the said Churchwardens for the Recovery of the said several Sums or Parochial Stipends of One hundred Pounds each under or by virtue of the said recited Acts of the Eleventh and Twelfth Years of the Reign of King William the Third and the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of King George the Third, or either of them; and the said Churchwardens shall and they are hereby authorized to raise the same at the same Times with the said several Sums or Parochial Stipends of One hundred Pounds each, and in the same Manner and by the same Means as the said Parochial Stipends are by the said recited Acts or either of them directed to be raised.

Provision for the surviving Incumbent.

VI. And be it enacted, That from and after the next Avoidance of either of the said Medieties the surviving or continuing Incumbent of the other of the said Medieties, and who by virtue of the Provisions herein-before contained will become the sole Rector, shall,

shall, during his Incumbency and until his Death or Avoidance, be entitled to receive, and there shall be paid to him, yearly and every Year, together with a proportionable Part up to the Time of such Death or Avoidance, the several Sums following; that is to say, the Two several Sums or Parochial Stipends of One hundred Pounds each payable in respect of One Mediety of the said Rectory, and the Two several Sums of Two hundred Pounds and One hundred and fifty Pounds formerly payable by the Mayor, Bailiffs, and Burgesses, but now payable out of the Borough Fund of the said Borough, making together the annual Sum of Five hundred and fifty Pounds, and also the whole of the Monies arising from Seat Rents, and the whole of the Surplice Fees and other Ecclesiastical Emoluments and Parish Dues; and during the Period of such Incumbency, but not longer, the Parishioners of the said Parish of Liverpool shall be exonerated from all Liability to pay to such surviving or continuing Rector the Two several Sums or Parochial Stipends of One hundred Pounds each payable in respect of the other Mediety of the said Rectory.

VII. And be it enacted, That from and after the Decease, Provision Resignation, Removal, or other Avoidance of both the present for the future Rectors the annual Income and Empluments of the thon immediately. Rectors the annual Income and Emoluments of the then immediately succeeding and every future Rector shall consist of the Four several Sums or Parochial Stipends of One hundred Pounds each payable under or by virtue of the Provisions of the said recited Acts of the Tenth and Eleventh Years of the Reign of His Majesty King William the Third and of the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of His Majesty King George the Third, the whole of the Monies arising from Seat Rents, and the whole of the Surplice Fees and other Ecclesiastical Emoluments and Parish Dues; and such Rector shall have the same Power of suing the Churchwardens of the said Parish of Liverpool for the said Four several Sums or Parochial Stipends of One hundred Pounds each as each of the present Rectors now has of suing for and recovering the Two several Sums or Parochial Stipends of One hundred Pounds each payable in respect of his Mediety of the said Rectory.

VIII. And be it enacted, That the Sum of One hundred and Provision eighty Pounds heretofore annually voted by the Parishioners of for the Four the Parish of Liverpool to each of the Four Curates of the said Parish Parish appointed by the Rectors shall henceforth and for ever be a legal Charge upon the said Parish, and shall be paid by the Churchwardens of the said Parish to each of the said Four Curates out of the annual Parochial Rates, Levies, or Taxes, or out of a Rate to be made for that Purpose.

IX. And be it enacted, That from and immediately after the Surviving Decease, Resignation, or Removal of either of them the said John Minister of Boughey Monk and Thomas Gerard Leigh, the present Ministers St. George's to be the sole of the said Church of Saint George, there shall be no longer Two Minister; Ministers to the said Church, but One Minister only, and the surviving or continuing. Minister shall ipso facto be and become, and until his Death, Resignation, or Removal shall continue, the sole Minister

and Mayor, &c. to nominate as heretofore. Minister of the said Church; and he and his Successors, Ministers of the said Church, shall and may have, exercise, and enjoy all such and the same Powers and Authorities as are now vested in the Two Ministers of the said Church jointly or in either of them separately; and that upon the Death, Resignation, or Removal of such surviving or continuing Minister, and of every succeeding Minister, the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses, and their Assigns, shall for ever thereafter be entitled to nominate and appoint the Minister of the said Church, in the same Manner to all Intents and Purposes as they would have been entitled to appoint both the Ministers, or either of them, to the said Church, in case this Act had not been passed.

X. And be it enacted, That from and after the Death, Resignation, or Removal of either of the said present Ministers of the said Church of Saint George the other or surviving or continuing Minister shall be entitled to the whole of the Surplice Fees and other Emoluments which have heretofore been accustomed to be paid to and received by the Minister, and in like Manner shall bear, pay, and discharge all Dues, Fees, Payments of every Description, and Sums of Money which have heretofore been usually paid by the said Minister.

Provision for the Rev. J. B. Monk.

XI. And be it enacted, That in the meantime and until the Death. Resignation, or Removal of either of them the said John Boughey Monk and Thomas Gerard Leigh, and also in case of the Death, Resignation, or Removal of either of them, and the said John Boughey Monk shall happen to be the surviving or continuing Minister, there shall be paid to the said John Boughey Monk out of the Borough Fund of the said Borough, yearly and every Year, together with a proportionate Part up to the Day of his Death, or of his Resignation of or Removal from the Ministry of the said Church, the several Sums following; that is to say, the Stipend or Sum of Fifty Pounds payable under or by virtue of the said recited Act of the First Year of the Reign of His Majesty King George the First; the Sum of Two hundred and sixty-five Pounds, which, having been usually paid by the said Mayor, Bailiffs, and Burgesses previously to the Fifth Day of June One thousand eight hundred and twenty-eight, has now by the Provisions of the said recited Act of the Fifth and Sixth Years of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth become a legal Charge on the Borough Fund of the said Borough; and the Sum of One hundred and five Pounds, which, not having been usually paid for the Period of Seven Years before the Fifth Day of June One thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, is not within the Provisions of the said Act; which said Sums, amounting together to the Sum of Four hundred and twenty Pounds, shall be over and above and in addition to the Fees and other Emoluments heretofore belonging to or usually received by the Minister of the said Church.

XII. And be it enacted, That in the meantime and until the Death, Resignation, or Removal of either of them the said John Boughey Monk and Thomas Gerard Leigh, there shall be paid to him the said Thomas Gerard Leigh out of the Borough Fund of the said Borough, yearly and every Year, together with a proportionate Part

up to the Day of such Death, Resignation, or Removal, the Sum of Three hundred and fifteen Pounds; and in case of the Death, Resignation, or Removal of either of them the said John Boughey Monk and Thomas Gerard Leigh, and the said Thomas Gerard Leigh shall happen to be the surviving or continuing Minister, there shall be paid to him the said Thomas Gerard Leigh out of the Borough Fund of the said Borough, yearly and every Year, together with a proportionate Part up to the Day of his Death, or of his Resignation of or Removal from the Ministry of the said Church, the several Sums following; that is to say, the Stipend or Sum of Fifty Pounds payable under or by virtue of the said recited Act of the First Year of the Reign of His Majesty King George the First, and also the said Sum of Three hundred and fifteen Pounds, which said Sums, amounting together to the Sum of Three hundred and sixty-five Pounds, shall be over and above and in addition to the Surplice Fees and other Ecclesiastical Emoluments belonging to or usually received by the Minister of the said Church.

XIII. And be it enacted, That from and after the Decease, Provision Resignation, or Removal of both of them the said John Boughey Monk and Thomas Gerard Leigh, the present Ministers of the said Church of Saint George, the then immediately succeeding and every future Minister of the said Church shall be entitled to receive, and there shall be paid to him out of the Borough Fund of the said Borough, yearly and every Year, together with a proportionate Part up to the Day of his Death, Resignation, or Removal, the several Sums following; that is to say, the Stipend or Sum of Fifty Pounds payable under or by virtue of the said recited Act of the First Year of the Reign of His Majesty King George the First, and the Sum of Two hundred Pounds, hereby required to be paid, which said Sums of Fifty Pounds and Two hundred Pounds, making together the Sum of Two hundred and fifty Pounds, shall be payable, and shall be over and above and in addition to the Surplice Fees and other Ecclesiastical Emoluments heretofore belonging to or usually received by the Ministers of the said Church.

And be it enacted, That the several Stipends, Allowances, or yearly Sums by this Act directed to be paid to the Rectors of the said Parish, and to the several Ministers of the before-mentioned Churches, and every of them, out of the Borough Fund of the said Borough, shall be accepted and taken by such Rectors and Ministers respectively and the same are hereby declared to be in lieu and in stead as well of the several Stipends, Allowances, or yearly Sums which during Seven Years next before the Fifth Day of June One thousand eight hundred and thirty-five have been usually paid by the said Mayor, Bailiffs, and Burgesses to the said Rectors and Ministers, as of the said Stipends, Allowances, and yearly Sums which have been paid by the said Mayor, Bailiffs, and Burgesses, or by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses, since the Fifth Day of June One thousand eight hundred and twenty-eight, and of all Bonds and other Securities given or required to be given to such Rectors or Ministers, or any of them, for the Payment of such Stipends, Allowances, or yearly Sums, or any Part or Parts thereof, under the Authority of the said recited Act of the Fifth and Sixth Years of the Reign of His Majesty King William the Fourth, and in satisfaction of all Claims and Demands on the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses by virtue of any Statute, Grant, Vote, or otherwise howsoever.

Conditions of Rectors, &c.

XXXV. Provided always, and be it enacted, That each of the several of Residence Stipends and Allowances by this Act directed to be paid to Rectors, Ministers, and Curates shall only be paid under the Circumstances and during the Periods following; (that is to say,) as to each Rector so long as he shall reside within the Municipal Boundary of the said Borough of Liverpool; and as to each Minister and Curate so long as he shall reside within the Parish of Liverpool aforesaid, or as to each Minister and Curate, except the said Parish Curates, within One Mile of his Church; and as to each Parish Curate within One Mile of either of the Parish Churches; and as to each Rector, Minister, and Curate so long as he respectively shall personally perform his official Duties in and pertaining to the Church in respect whereof such respective yearly Stipend or Allowance is directed to be paid (except in Cases of Sickness or some other Cause, to be approved by the Ordinary for the Time being within whose Diocese Liverpool shall be).

XXXVI. Provided always, and be it enacted, That nothing in this Act contained shall extend or be deemed or construed to extend to interfere with, prejudice, alter, or affect the Provisions contained in the said recited Act of the Fifth and Sixth Years of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth respecting the Sale and Disposition of Advowsons and Rights of Nomination and Presentation to Benefices and Ecclesiastical Preferences vested in Bodies Corporate, but the Advowson or Right of Presentation to the said Rectory, and the Right or Title to nominate the Ministers of the beforementioned Churches, subject to the Provisions of this Act, shall and may be sold under the Authority of and in the Manner directed by

the said recited Act of the Fifth and Sixth Years of the Reign of His Majesty King William the Fourth, any thing herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding.
