### CHAPTER CCXV.

An Act to confer further powers on the Magistrates and Council of the Royal Burgh of Burntisland with reference to the Harbour of Burntisland ; and for other purposes. A.D. 1875.

[13th August 1875.]

**W**HEREAS by "The Burntisland Harbour Order, 1870," (herein-  
after called "the order of 1870,") confirmed by "The Pier and  
Harbour Orders Confirmation Act, 1870 (No. 3)," the magistrates  
and council of the royal burgh of Burntisland (herein-after called "the  
town council ") were authorised to construct a wet dock and other  
works, and to maintain and improve the harbour of Burntisland,  
and for such purposes, in addition to the sum of ten thousand pounds  
borrowed by them on the security of the revenues of the harbour, to  
borrow on mortgage such money as might be required, not exceed-  
ing the sum of sixty thousand pounds, on the security of the  
harbour and existing works, and the works authorised by the order  
of 1870, and the lands and property connected therewith respec-  
tively, and of the rates, duties, and customs then leviabie by the  
town council, or the rates authorised by the order of 1870, and any  
other property of the town council :

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And whereas by the order of 1870 the town council and the  
North British Railway Company (herein-after called "the com-  
pany ") were authorised from time to time to enter into agreements  
with respect to the construction of the said wet dock, and the  
deepening, enlargement, and improvement of the harbour, the tolls,  
rates, and charges on traffic passing over the North British Railway,  
or any part thereof, to or from the harbour, the rates chargeable at  
the harbour, or in respect of burgh or other dues and customs, or  
payments to be made by the company in lieu of such rates, dues,  
and customs, and the accommodation to be given to the company at  
the harbour, and any other matters relating to the purposes of the  
order of 1870 :

And whereas, in pursuance of such last-mentioned authority, an  
agreement, dated the sixteenth and eighteenth days of September

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And whereas by "The North British Railway Act, 1873," (herein-after called "the Act of 1873,") the agreement of 1872 was confirmed, and the company were empowered to advance to the town council the sum of fifty thousand pounds, or any less sum, in the manner and for the purposes and upon the terms and security in the agreement of 1872 mentioned, and with respect thereto to raise, by the issue of shares or stock, additional capital not exceeding fifty thousand pounds, or (section 65) instead thereof, if the company thought fit, to raise the said sum by mortgage of the harbour and dock revenues payable to them under the agreement of 1872 :

And whereas the town council have proceeded with the execution of the works authorised by the order of 1870, and in exercise of the powers thereby conferred upon them have borrowed a portion of the money by the order of 1870 authorised to be raised by them, and have expended the same in the execution of the said works and in otherwise carrying the order of 1870 and the agreement of 1872 into effect :

And whereas the wet dock and other works authorised by the order of 1870 are not yet completed, and additional money is required for the purpose of completing the same, and for maintaining and improving the harbour :

And whereas the money borrowed by the town council as aforesaid has been advanced and lent or agreed to be advanced and lent to them by the company, and the same or part thereof has been raised by the company on mortgage of the harbour and dock revenues payable to them under the agreement of 1872 ; and it is expedient that the town council should be authorised to borrow a further sum of money for the completion of the works authorised by the order of 1870 :

And whereas it is expedient that the town council and the company should be authorised to enter into further agreements with respect to the construction, maintenance, and management of the said wet dock and other works, and to the purposes of the order of 1870 and of this Act :

And whereas it is expedient that the town council should be authorised to acquire additional lands for harbour purposes, and that the time limited for the completion of the wet dock and works authorised by the order of 1870 should be extended :

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And whereas it is expedient that the rates which the town council are authorised to demand and levy should, in some respects, be altered and revised, and that the order of 1870 should be amended :

And whereas the purposes of this Act cannot be effected without the authority of Parliament :

May it therefore please Your Majesty that it may be enacted ; and be it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :

1. This Act may be cited as "The Burntisland Harbour Act, 1875." Short title.

2. "The Lands Clauses Consolidation (Scotland) Act, 1845," and "The Lands Clauses Consolidation Acts Amendment Act, 1860," except so much thereof respectively as relates to the purchase and taking of lands otherwise than by agreement, and with respect to entry upon lands by the promoters of the undertaking, are incorporated with and form part of this Act. Certain provisions of Lands Clauses Acts incorporated.

3. The clauses of "The Harbours, Docks, and Piers Clauses Act, 1847," with respect to the construction of warehouses, wharfs, and other conveniences, and the clauses and provisions of "The Commissioners Clauses Act, 1847," so far as incorporated with the order of 1870, shall be incorporated with this Act, and shall apply respectively to the additional lands to be acquired, and to the money to be borrowed and the mortgages or assignments in security to be granted by the town council under the authority of this Act ; and in construing the said clauses as incorporated with this Act, the words "undertakers" and "commissioners" shall respectively mean the town council. Certain provisions of Harbours Clauses and Commissioners Clauses Acts incorporated.

4. In this Act the word "harbour" shall have the meaning assigned to it in the order of 1870, and shall include the additional lands by this Act authorised to be purchased and acquired. Interpretation.

5. In addition to the lands acquired and held by the town council under the powers of the order of 1870, the town council may by agreement purchase, for the purposes of the harbour, any quantity of land adjoining or near to the harbour not exceeding thirty acres, and may erect thereon warehouses, stores, offices, and Additional lands, warehouses, &c.

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Extension of time for completion of works.

6. The time limited by "The General Pier and Harbour Act, 1861, Amendment Act," for the completion of the wet dock and works authorised by the order of 1870, shall be extended to two years from and after the passing of this Act.

Borrowing powers.

7. In addition to the money authorised to be borrowed by the order of 1870, the town council may from time to time borrow on mortgage such money as may be required for carrying into effect the purposes of the order of 1870 and the agreement of 1872 and this Act, not exceeding in the whole the sum of thirty thousand pounds, on the security of the harbour revenues and the rates authorised by the order of 1870 and this Act.

Extension of provisions of order of 1870 to money borrowed under this Act.

8. The provisions contained in sections 30, 32, 33, 34, and 35 of the order of 1870 shall extend and apply to the money by this Act authorised to be borrowed, as if such money had formed part of the money by the order of 1870 authorised to be borrowed.

Sinking fund.

9. Section 36 of the order of 1870 shall be and the same is hereby repealed, and the town council shall, on and after the expiration of four years from the passing of this Act, from and out of the rates and revenues now levied and received by them, or to be levied and received by them under the authority of this Act, set apart yearly such sums as they think fit, not being less than one pound per centum per annum on the existing harbour debt, and on the money borrowed under the authority of the order of 1870 and of the Act of 1873 and of this Act; and the sums so to be set apart shall be applied as a sinking fund in paying off the principal money borrowed or to be borrowed by the town council, and shall be invested in Government securities, or deposited in any bank in Scotland incorporated under Act of Parliament or by Royal Charter, and shall be increased by accumulation in the way of compound interest or otherwise, until the same shall be of sufficient amount to pay off the principal money to which such sinking fund shall be applicable, or any part thereof which the town council think ought then to be paid off, at which time the said sums shall be applied in paying off the said principal money or part thereof.

Annual return to Board of Trade with respect to sinking fund.

10. The town clerk of Burntisland shall, within twenty-one days after the expiration of each year during which any sum is required to be set apart for a sinking fund under this Act, transmit to the Board of Trade a return, in such form as may be prescribed by that Board, and verified by statutory declaration if so required by them, showing the amount which has been invested for the purpose of such

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sinking fund during the year preceding the making of such return, and the description of the securities upon which the same has been invested, and also showing the purposes to which any portion of the moneys invested for the sinking fund has been applied during the same period, and the total amount remaining invested at the end of the year; and in the event of any wilful default in making such return, such town clerk shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds. If it appear to the Board of Trade, by such return or otherwise, that the town council have failed to set apart the sum required by this Act for the sinking fund, or have applied any portion of the moneys set apart for that fund to any purposes other than those authorised by this Act, the Board of Trade may by order direct that a sum not exceeding double the amount in respect of which such default shall have been made shall be set apart and invested as part of the sinking fund, and such order shall be enforceable by decree of either division of the Inner House of the Court of Session in Scotland, in a summary application presented for that purpose.

**11.** All money borrowed by the town council under the authority of this Act shall be applied only for the purposes authorised by the order of 1870 and the agreement of 1872 and this Act.

Application of money.

**12.** Nothing in this Act contained shall be held or construed to alter, affect, or diminish any mortgage or assignment or other security granted for money borrowed under the order of 1870, and which shall be subsisting at the passing of this Act; and all such mortgages or assignments or other securities shall remain valid and sufficient in favour of the holders thereof as if this Act had not been passed.

Saving existing securities.

**13.** Except as by this Act expressly provided, nothing contained in this Act shall prejudice or affect the agreement of 1872; and the town council and the company may, subject to the approval of the Board of Trade, from time to time enter into other agreements with respect to the construction, maintenance, and management of the wet dock and other works of the harbour, and to the purposes of the order of 1870 and this Act.

Agreements between town council and company.

**14.** From and after the passing of this Act the schedule of rates annexed to the order of 1870 shall be and is hereby repealed, and the rates authorised by this Act to be levied shall commence and be leviable.

Repeal of existing rates.

**15.** From and after the passing of this Act, and subject to the provisions thereof and of the order of 1870, the town council may, for the use of the harbour and works, demand and receive in respect

Commencement of new rates.

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Rates may  
be leased.

**16.** The town council may from time to time lease the rates authorised by this Act, and specified in the said schedule, for any period not exceeding ten years, and for such rent or consideration and on such terms and conditions as they think fit; and the lessee shall have and may exercise, during the continuance of his lease, the same powers of levying and recovering the said rates as the town council have or might exercise under this Act.

Expenses of  
Act.

**17.** All costs, charges, and expenses of and incident to the preparing for, obtaining, and passing of this Act, or otherwise in relation thereto, shall be paid by the town council out of the harbour and dock revenues.

7. All vessels remaining in the harbour to pay, after one month, one penny per register ton per month in advance, when they are lying in the harbour, and twopence per ton when lying in the dock.		
8. All vessels with fish of any kind for curing, per ton register or admeasurement, twopence each.		
9. All fishing boats entering the tidal harbour with fresh fish, fourpence each.		

*Light Dues.*

On all vessels entering or using the harbour or dock, per register ton, one halfpenny.

*Exemptions from Rates on Vessels.*

1. Vessels on which the rates in respect of the dock have been paid shall not be liable to any additional rates for entering, using, or departing from the tidal harbour.

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- A.D. 1875. 2. All vessels leaving the harbour for the purpose of taking on board ballast in any part of the Firth of Forth, and returning to the harbour with ballast, shall not be liable in rates for such return.
3. All vessels not carrying passengers arriving in the harbour in ballast, and departing again in ballast, shall be subject only in half rates; but if such vessels, after arriving in ballast, shall take in cargoes or parts of cargoes before their departure, they shall be liable in full rates.
