



CHAPTER cxxxviii.

An Act to confer further powers on the Newry Navigation Company and for other purposes. [14th July 1884.] A.D. 1884.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the tenth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George IV. intituled "An Act for the improvement and extension of the Newry Navigation" (herein-after called the Act of 1829) it was enacted that from and after a day to be mentioned in an order of the Lord Lieutenant or other Chief Governor of Ireland to be made as in the said Act mentioned the Newry Canal and Navigation extending from the town of Warrenpoint to Lough Neagh should be vested in a company incorporated under the powers of the said Act called the Newry Navigation Company (herein-after called the Company) and the Company were empowered to deepen widen and improve the tidal channel between Newry and Warrenpoint or to make and maintain certain cuts in the said Act mentioned and to deepen the Newry River to the depth of six feet below low-water spring tides as far as the town of Newry as well as to execute other works in connexion with the Newry River for the purpose of improving the navigation between the port and harbour of Newry and the sea: 10 Geo. 4. c. 126.

And whereas by virtue of an order duly made by the Duke of Northumberland the then Lord Lieutenant of Ireland on the twelfth day of July one thousand eight hundred and thirty the Newry Canal and Navigation became vested in the Company as from the twenty-sixth day of July one thousand eight hundred and thirty:

And whereas under the powers of the Act of 1829 and of two Acts passed respectively in the sixth year of the reign of His late Majesty King William IV. (cap. 71 local and personal) and in the fourth and fifth years of the reign of Her present Majesty (cap. 56 local and personal) for the purpose of extending the time limited by and otherwise amending the Act of 1829 a certain canal was made and other works executed by the Company but the works authorised by the recited Acts were not all completed: 6 Wm. 4. c. 71. 4 & 5 Vict. c. 56.

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And whereas it would be of public and local advantage that the navigation of the Newry River and the upper portion of Carlingford Lough should be improved and that the works by this Act authorised should be constructed and that the other powers in this Act specified should be conferred on the Company :

And whereas the existing share capital of the Company is eighty thousand pounds and they owe on mortgage thirty-one thousand eight hundred and seventeen pounds fifteen shillings and tenpence :

And whereas it is expedient that the Company should be enabled to borrow money for the purposes of this Act and that the tolls rates and duties now leviable by the Company should be varied and altered and that additional powers of levying tolls rates and duties should be conferred on the Company :

And whereas plans and sections showing the lines and levels of the works authorised by this Act and also a book of reference containing the names of the owners and lessees or reputed owners and lessees and of the occupiers of the lands required or which may be taken for the purposes or under the powers of this Act were duly deposited with the clerks of the peace for the counties of Armagh Louth and Down and are in this Act respectively referred to as the deposited plans sections and book of reference :

And whereas the purposes of this Act cannot be effected without the authority of Parliament :

May it therefore please Your Majesty that it may be enacted and be it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal and Commons in this present Parliament assembled and by the authority of the same as follows :—

Short title.

1. This Act may be cited as the Newry Navigation Act 1884.

Interpretation.

2. In this Act the several words and expressions to which meanings are assigned by the Acts wholly or partially incorporated herewith have the same respective meanings unless there be something in the subject or context repugnant to such construction :—

The expressions “port and harbour” and “harbour” mean and include the Newry River with the docks canal quays wharves and other works from time to time connected therewith and with the undertaking of the Company :

The expression “the Carlingford Lough Commissioners” means the harbour of Carlingford Lough Improvement Commissioners :

The expression “the undertaking” means the undertaking of the Company :

In the incorporated Acts the expression “the special Act” means this Act the expressions “the promoters” “the promoters of

the undertaking" "the undertakers" and "the company" A.D. 1884.
mean respectively the Company.

3. The provisions of the Acts herein-after specified are (except where expressly varied by this Act) incorporated with and form part of this Act that is to say :— Incorporation of Acts.

The Lands Clauses Consolidation Act 1845 (save so far as any provisions thereof are inconsistent with the Railways Act (Ireland) 1851) the Railways Act (Ireland) 1851 the Lands Clauses Consolidation Acts Amendment Act 1860 the Railways Act (Ireland) 1860 the Railways Act (Ireland) 1864 and the Railways Traverse Act respectively ; the clauses and provisions of the Railways Clauses Consolidation Act 1845 with respect to the temporary occupation of lands near the railway during the construction thereof :

The clauses and provisions of the Companies Clauses Consolidation Act 1845 with respect to the following matters (that is to say) :

The remedies of creditors of the Company against the shareholders :

The borrowing of money by the Company on mortgage or bond :

The conversion of borrowed money into capital :

The Harbours Docks and Piers Clauses Act 1847 (except sections 25 and 26) provided that sections 16 to 19 both inclusive of the last-mentioned Act shall not be in force unless and until the Board of Trade in writing so require.

4. Subject to the provisions of this Act the Company may make and maintain in the lines and according to the levels shown on the deposited plans and sections the works herein-after described with all proper subsidiary works and conveniences connected therewith and may enter upon take and use such of the lands and waters delineated on the said plans and described in the deposited book of reference as may be required for that purpose. Power to make and maintain works.

5. The works herein-after referred to and authorised by this Act are :— Description of works.

The excavation of a navigable channel in the Newry River and Carlingford Lough commencing in the bed of the Newry River at a point twenty-two yards or thereabouts measuring in an easterly direction from the point shown on the ordnance map of the county of Down where the boundary between the parishes of Clonallan and Warrenpoint intersects the boundary between the counties of Down and Armagh thence proceeding in an easterly direction for a distance of three miles three furlongs and eight chains or thereabouts and terminating in the bed of Carlingford Lough at a point seven furlongs and seventy-

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four yards or thereabouts measuring in a south-easterly direction from the beacon known as the Gonnaway Beacon situate on the Gonnaway Rock in Carlingford Lough.

Together with all necessary entrances cuts locks basins gates dams weirs moorings landing places staiths machinery quays wharves warehouses roads approaches and other works appliances and conveniences in connexion therewith.

Limits of lateral and vertical deviation.

6. Except as by this Act otherwise provided in constructing the works authorised by this Act the Company may deviate laterally to any extent within the limits of lateral deviation shown on the deposited plans and may deviate vertically from the levels shown on the deposited sections to any extent not exceeding five feet above or below the levels so shown. Provided always that the Company shall not make in over under through or across any tidal or navigable water any work by this Act authorised (nor deviate from the line of any such work as shown on the deposited plans) in such manner as to diminish the navigable space without the previous consent of the Board of Trade signified in writing under the hand of the secretary or an assistant secretary of the Board of Trade (and such secretary or assistant secretary is hereby empowered to give such consent) and then only according to such plan and under such restrictions and regulations as the Board of Trade approves and where any such deviation or work is made with such approval the Company shall not at any time alter or extend the same without first obtaining the like approval.

For the protection of Curran Obins Woodhouse Esquire.

7. Whereas Curran Obins Woodhouse of Omeath Park in the county of Louth is or claims to be the owner of certain oyster beds or layings and protective works connected therewith in Carlingford Lough the limits of which oyster beds are defined by a certain license dated the fourth day of June one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six granted under the statutes in that behalf to John Obins Woodhouse deceased which oyster beds and works are in this section referred to as the Omeath oyster beds Therefore the following provisions shall have effect viz. :—

(1) Before the Company commence to exercise any of the powers for the execution of the works by this Act authorised they shall pay to the said Curran Obins Woodhouse or his sequels in estate or title or deposit as herein-after in this section provided full compensation for any damage injury or loss to be occasioned to the Omeath oyster beds by and for any depreciation in the value thereof which may result from the exercise of the aforesaid powers.

(2) The amount of such compensation shall be ascertained and determined by agreement between the parties and in default

of agreement in the manner provided by the Lands Clauses Acts with reference to the settlement of questions of disputed compensation by arbitration including the provisions thereof with respect to the costs of arbitration and any such costs shall be payable at the time that the said compensation is hereinafter in this section made payable.

- (3) The amount of the said compensation shall either be paid to the said Curran Obins Woodhouse his sequels in estate or title or shall (if any case should arise with respect to which it is provided by the Lands Clauses Consolidation Act 1845 that compensation money when finally ascertained shall be deposited in the Bank of Ireland) be deposited in the Bank of Ireland under and according to the provisions of the said Act.
- (4) In the execution of the works by this Act authorised and notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Act contained the Company shall not without the consent in writing of the said Curran Obins Woodhouse or his sequels in estate or title construct or maintain the channel by this Act authorised or any subsidiary works thereto except within the limits of deviation shown upon the plan signed by the chairman of the Committee of the House of Lords to whom the Bill for this Act was referred and which plan has been deposited in the office of the Clerk of the Parliaments.
- (5) In addition to the foregoing provisions the Company shall during the construction of the said works make and maintain all such works matters and things as may be necessary or proper for effectually protecting from injury hurt or damage all and every part of the Omeath oyster beds not comprised within the limits aforesaid.
- (6) Any difference from time to time arising between the Company and the said Curran Obins Woodhouse or his sequels in estate or title with reference to the works matters and things to be done by the Company under the last preceding sub-section hereof shall be determined by arbitration in the manner herein in this section provided for the settlement of the said compensation and as if it were a question of disputed compensation.
- (7) Nothing in this Act contained shall prejudice diminish alter or take away any of the estate rights privileges powers or authorities vested in or enjoyed or exerciseable by the said Curran Obins Woodhouse or his sequels in estate or title in respect of the Omeath oyster beds otherwise than is by this Act expressly provided.

8. The Company shall on or near the works below high-water mark hereby authorised during the whole time of the constructing

Lights on works.

A.D. 1884. altering or extending exhibit and keep burning at their own expense every night from sunset to sunrise such lights (if any) as the Board of Trade from time to time require or approve. If the Company fail to comply in any respect with the provisions of the present section they shall for each night in which they so fail be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

Company to exhibit lights.

9. The Company shall at the outer extremity of their harbour works exhibit and keep burning from sunset to sunrise such lights (if any) as the Commissioners of Irish Lights shall from time to time direct. If the Company fail to comply in any respect with the provisions of the present section they shall for each night in which they so fail be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

Company to maintain buoys and beacons in new channel.

10. Notwithstanding anything contained in the Carlingford Lough Commissioners Order 1864 the Company may place and maintain such buoys beacons or sea marks as the Commissioners of Irish Lights may approve for the purpose of marking the channel to be formed under this Act.

Period for compulsory purchase of lands and waters.

11. The powers of the Company for the compulsory purchase of lands and waters for the purposes of this Act shall not be exercised after the expiration of three years after the passing of this Act.

Lands may be acquired for deposit of ballast and other purposes.

12. The Company may from time to time by agreement purchase or take on lease for the deposit of ballast and any other purposes of this Act any additional lands which the Company may deem requisite or convenient not exceeding ten acres and may also acquire by agreement any easements rights and interests in over or affecting such lands.

Grants of easements by incapacitated persons.

13. Persons empowered by the Lands Clauses Consolidation Act 1845 to sell and convey or release lands may if they think fit subject to the provisions of that Act and of the Lands Clauses Consolidation Acts Amendment Act 1860 and of this Act grant to the Company any easement right or privilege required for the purposes of this Act in over or affecting any such lands and the provisions of the said Acts with respect to lands and rentcharges so far as the same are applicable in this behalf shall extend and apply to such grants or to such easements rights or privileges as aforesaid respectively.

Period for completion of works.

14. If the works by this Act authorised are not completed within seven years from the passing of this Act then on the expiration of that period the powers by this Act granted to the Company for making and completing the works or otherwise in relation thereto shall cease to be exercised except as to so much thereof as is then completed.

15. The Company may for the purposes of this Act with the permission and consent of the Lord Lieutenant or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland to be signified by his or their Chief Secretary from time to time borrow on mortgage of the undertaking any sum not exceeding in the whole forty thousand pounds in addition to any moneys they are now authorised to borrow.

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Power to borrow.

16. Every provision of any Act relating to the Company whereby the Company is authorised to raise money by borrowing for the purposes of the undertaking with respect to the appointment of a receiver for enforcing payment by the Company of arrears of principal or interest or principal and interest shall be and the same is hereby repealed but without prejudice to any appointment which has been made or to the continuance of any proceedings which have been commenced prior to the passing of this Act under such provisions. The mortgagees of the undertaking may enforce payment of arrears of interest or principal or principal and interest due on their mortgages by the appointment of a receiver. In order to authorise the appointment of a receiver in respect of arrears of principal the amount owing to the mortgagees by whom the application for a receiver is made shall not be less than four thousand pounds in the whole.

For appointment of a receiver.

17. All mortgages granted by the Company in pursuance of the powers of any Act of Parliament before the passing of this Act and subsisting at the passing hereof shall during the continuance of such mortgages have priority over any mortgages granted by virtue of this Act.

Existing mortgages to have priority.

18. All moneys raised under this Act shall be applied only to the purposes of this Act or to the general purposes of the undertaking to which capital is properly applicable.

Application of additional capital of the Company.

19. From and after the passing of this Act the Company may subject to the provisions of this Act from time to time demand and recover in respect of goods animals and things exported or imported from or into the port and harbour or shipped or unshipped within the port and harbour any sums not exceeding the several tolls rates and duties on goods animals and things specified in the First Schedule to this Act and every such toll rate or duty shall be paid by the owner or consignee of the said goods animals and things.

Rates for goods exported or imported.

20. From and after the passing of this Act the Company may subject to the provisions of this Act from time to time demand and take of and from the owner consignee broker or other person in charge of any timber deals staves lathwood or other wood or timber landed in or exported from the port and harbour as and for storage

Porterage &c. on timber.

A.D. 1884. — rent cranage portorage chaining carrying watching receiving delivering drawing cessing marking and attending any sums not exceeding the sums specified in the Second Schedule to this Act.

For levying proportion of tolls during excavation of channel.

21. Provided nevertheless that until the channel by this Act authorised is certified as herein-after provided to be made of the depth throughout of seven feet below low water of ordinary spring tides and one hundred and twenty feet wide the Company shall demand and recover such proportion only of the tolls rates and duties by this Act authorised as may from time to time be certified by the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland to be reasonably adequate to pay and satisfy interest at a rate not exceeding five pounds per centum per annum on all moneys for the time being borrowed by the Company under the powers of this Act for the purposes of those works including moneys paid for the purchase of lands and waters and compensation for damage.

Certificate of completion of channel.

22. On the completion of the excavation of the channel to the aforesaid depth and width throughout a certificate under the hand of the chairman of quarter sessions for the county of Armagh (who is hereby authorised and required to grant such certificate) shall be *primâ facie* evidence thereof.

Saving existing mortgages.

23. Nothing in this Act contained shall affect or be held to abolish or remit any of the tolls rates or duties chargeable with the mortgages already made or executed by the Company to the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland or lessen any of the securities of such mortgages and it is also hereby declared that any new tolls rates or duties leviable under this Act shall be subject to the said mortgages whereon the principal sum of thirty-one thousand eight hundred and seventeen pounds fifteen shillings and tenpence is now due by the Company to the said commissioners.

Power to Company to erect mooring posts.

24. The Company may from time to time upon such terms as may be agreed upon with the owner of the land affected on any place north of Warrenpoint erect and maintain such posts pillars and other erections and lay down and fix such mooring buoys as may in their opinion be necessary and proper for securing and mooring any vessels within the said limits without being in any way deemed to be trespassers and the Company may demand for the use of such mooring posts and buoys any rates not exceeding those mentioned in the Third Schedule to this Act.

Provisions as to supply of ballast.

25. So much of section one hundred and thirty-four of the Act of 1829 as requires the Company to throw ballast into or take ballast from ships or vessels and the rates to be paid for ballast specified in the Schedule A to that Act are hereby repealed The Company shall furnish and lay down ballast for the master or owner

of every ship or vessel requiring ballast at their ballast bank in Newry and alongside Victoria Locks upon payment of a sum of one shilling and twopence per ton and alongside vessels in the Doyle Hole upon payment of a sum of one shilling and eightpence per ton within twenty-four hours after notice in writing shall have been given so to do by the master or owner of any such ship or vessel to the person who shall from time to time act as harbour master of the Company so soon as wind or weather shall permit the same to be done and in case wind and weather shall not within such twenty-four hours permit the same to be done then the Company or the proper officer who shall act under the Company for that purpose shall furnish and lay down or cause to be furnished and laid down such ballast for such ships or vessels respectively within twelve hours after wind and weather shall permit them so to do and such payment shall be recoverable by the Company as other rates are by this Act recoverable and no persons other than the Company shall supply ballast within the port and harbour unless with the permission of the Company.

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26. The Company may from time to time build purchase hire provide and use vessels to be worked by steam or otherwise at their discretion for dredging scouring cleansing and deepening the bed of the harbour and the entrance to the harbour,

Company may provide steam dredgers and other machinery.

27. The Company may from time to time build purchase contract for or hire and may maintain use and let steam tugs or other power for the use and accommodation of vessels frequenting the harbour and may also from time to time license such number of steam tugs or other power belonging to any person for such period and on such terms and conditions as they may think fit.

Company may provide and license steam tugs.

28. The Company may from time to time fix such rates or charges as appear to them reasonable for or in respect of the use of such steam tugs or other power maintained used and let or licensed by them and such rates or charges shall be paid by the owner agent master consignee or other person having charge of the vessel obtaining the assistance of such steam tug or other power to the Company or to their lessee or to the person with whom they may contract or to the owner of such steam tug or other power if licensed by the Company as the case may be and such rates and charges shall be due and payable whether such steam tug or other power shall be actually employed or not provided the assistance thereof shall have been required and shall in consequence of such requisition have been tendered by the master or other person having the command of such steam tug or other power.

Charges for steam tugs.

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Penalty for using or employing steam tugs without the license of the Company.

29. Every company or person other than the Carlingford Lough Commissioners who without the license of the Company first applied for and obtained shall use or employ any steam tug or other power for towing vessels within the port and harbour except such steam tugs or other power as shall be provided or employed by the Company or by their lessee contractor or other person having their authority and except also any steam tug or other power towing a vessel from any other harbour to or beyond the port and harbour shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

Powers to Carlingford Lough Commissioners in regard to their steamers.

30. Any steamer or steamers belonging to or in the employ of the Carlingford Lough Commissioners may :—

- (1) Continue to tow or ply as at present free of charge in so much of the port and harbour as lies between the pool and the north pier at Warrenpoint ;
- (2) Enter the locks for the purpose of completing any contract for the towage of any vessel and for every such entry the Company may demand and recover from the Carlingford Lough Commissioners the sum of one shilling and no more But if the steamers of the said commissioners shall enter for any other purpose whatever they shall then be liable to the same rates and charges as any other vessel of the like description and tonnage.

Company may remove ballast.

31. The Company may use or sell or dispose of in such manner as they think proper all ballast removed by them from the port and harbour under this Act.

Byelaws.

32. In addition to the byelaws which the Company are authorised to make under the Harbours Docks and Piers Clauses Act 1847 the Company may from time to time subject to the provisions of the said Act make alter and repeal such byelaws as they think proper for regulating the removal and disposal within the port and harbour of all ballast brought by vessels entering the port and harbour and for regulating the supply of ballast to vessels in the port and harbour so as to prevent ballast being thrown or allowed to fall into the port and harbour to obstruct the navigation within the limits of the port and harbour for the protection of the port and harbour and for the regulation and management of the navigation thereof and may impose such reasonable penalties not exceeding five pounds for each breach of such byelaws as they shall think fit Provided that no byelaw nor the repeal or alteration of any byelaw shall be of any effect unless confirmed by the Board of Trade.

Company may take increased

33. Nothing in this Act shall prevent the Company from taking any increased charges over and above the charges by this Act limited

by agreement with the owners or persons in charge of vessels goods animals and things entering or using the port and harbour by reason of any special service performed by the Company in relation thereto. A.D. 1884.

34. All moneys from time to time after the passing of this Act arising from any rents rates tolls dues and charges payable to the Company and from other revenues of the port and harbour not being borrowed moneys moneys provided by the sale of lands or other moneys in the nature of capital shall be applied by the Company to all or some of the purposes and in the order following (that is to say)— Application
of rents
rates &c.

First. In payment of all expenses incurred by the Company in relation to the maintenance and management of their undertaking not properly chargeable to capital account.

Second. In payment of interest upon mortgages or bonds granted by the Company.

Third. In payment of a dividend at a rate not exceeding five pounds per centum per annum among the shareholders of the Company according to the amounts from time to time paid up upon the shares held by them respectively Provided always that if there are not in any year profits available for payment of the full amount of dividend at the rate of five per centum for that year the deficiency may be made good out of the profits of any subsequent year.

Fourth. In the formation of a reserve fund to the amount of five thousand pounds exclusive of the existing reserve fund of the Company.

Fifth. In the further improvement of the port and harbour or in such reduction of rates tolls dues and charges as the Company may from time to time think fit.

Sixth. In making and maintaining such other improvements in the port and harbour and generally in executing and maintaining such works in connexion therewith as to the Company shall seem fit.

35. For the protection and benefit of the Dundalk and Newry Steam Packet Company Limited (herein-after called the Limited Company) the following provisions shall have effect and be binding and obligatory on the Company and the Limited Company respectively that is to say:— For the pro-
tection of the
Dundalk and
Newry Steam
Packet Com-
pany.

1. For a period of ten years from and after the completion of the works authorised by this Act the Limited Company shall pay to the Company the sum of one thousand six hundred pounds per annum and no more in lieu of and in substitution for the several tolls rates and dues now autho-

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rised or hereafter to be authorised which might otherwise be charged in respect of the vessels of the Limited Company and in respect of the cargoes of such vessels.

2. The Limited Company shall be entitled to three hundred and twelve sailings (in and out) with general cargoes in each year without respect to registered or other tonnage such sailings to commence and be reckoned immediately from the passing of this Act.

3. The aforesaid annual payment by the Limited Company shall be subject to the following conditions and privileges:—

(a) The lock gates between the Newry River and the Newry Canal shall be opened three hours before and three hours after high water if required by the Limited Company for the ingress or egress of their vessels whenever this can reasonably be done in the opinion of the engineer of the Company without endangering the safety of the lock gates.

(b) The annual payments by the Limited Company shall not exceed one thousand one hundred pounds per annum until the capital by this Act authorised to be raised for the cutting of the narrow water channel has been actually subscribed and the works of such channel have been actually commenced.

(c) Upon such capital being subscribed and the work of cutting the channel commenced the Limited Company shall pay a further annual sum of two hundred and fifty pounds per annum making up the annual payment to the Company to one thousand three hundred and fifty pounds per annum.

(d) The cutting of the channel shall be completed within two and a half years from the commencement thereof and on the completion thereof the full annual payment of one thousand six hundred pounds shall commence.

(e) The Company within three years from the commencement of the works authorised by this Act shall so far as they can do so within their statutory powers widen and deepen where practicable their canal sufficiently at such of the narrow and shallow parts as shall be indicated by the Limited Company with a view to facilitate the navigation of their steam vessels Provided that the Company shall not be required to expend on such work a larger sum than one thousand five hundred pounds.

(f) The channel from the locks to the Doyle Hole shall be deepened within two years and a half from the com-

mencement of the works of the narrow water channel by this Act authorised in order that the depth of water may be uniform from the pool in Carlingford Lough to the Victoria Locks.

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4. If during ten years after the completion of the works authorised by this Act any reduction in the port charges should at any time be made the Limited Company shall be entitled to the benefit of such reduction and a proportionate allowance shall be made and deducted from the before-mentioned annual payments.
5. Any question of difference between the Company and the Limited Company as to the meaning of or compliance with any provisions in this section shall be determined by an arbitrator to be appointed by the Board of Works in Ireland on the requisition of either party and the decision of such arbitrator shall be final and the costs of such arbitration shall be paid as the arbitrator shall direct.

36. All vessels taking in or discharging cargoes at Warrenpoint Piers or Warrenpoint Dock or Warrenpoint Patent Slip which respective places belong or are reputed to belong to William James Hall of Narrow Water Castle in the county of Down shall be exempt from the tolls and dues leviable under the provisions of this Act and nothing in this Act contained shall be deemed or construed to prejudice or take away any of the rights powers and privileges of the said William James Hall his heirs and successors as to the said Warrenpoint Piers Warrenpoint Dock Warrenpoint Patent Slip or the port of Warrenpoint respectively.

Saving rights and privileges of William James Hall.

37. Nothing in this Act shall take away lessen alter or prejudice any of the rights privileges powers or authorities of the Carlingford Lough Commissioners.

Saving rights of Carlingford Lough Commissioners.

38. Nothing in this Act contained shall be deemed to exempt the harbour or the Company from the provisions of the Merchant Shipping Act 1854 or the Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act 1855 or of any general Act relating to harbours or docks or dues on shipping or on goods carried in ships now in force or which shall be passed during the present or any future session of Parliament or from any future revision and alteration under the authority of Parliament of the rates authorised by this Act.

Application of provisions of Merchant Shipping Acts.

39. If at any time the Board of Trade deems it expedient for the purposes of this Act to order a survey or examination of a work constructed by the Company on in over through or across tidal lands or tidal water or of the intended site of any such work the Company shall defray the expense of the survey and examination

40. If a work constructed by the Company on in over through or across tidal lands or tidal water is abandoned or suffered to fall into decay the Board of Trade may abate and remove the work or any part of it and restore the site thereof to its former condition at the expense of the Company and the amount of such expense shall be a debt due from the Company to the Crown and be recoverable accordingly with costs or the same may be recovered with costs as a penalty is recoverable from the Company.

41. Nothing contained in this Act shall authorise the Company to take use or in any manner interfere with any portion of the shore or bed of the sea or of any river channel creek bay or estuary or any right in respect thereof belonging to the Queen's most Excellent Majesty in right of Her Crown and under the management of the Board of Trade without the previous consent in writing of the Board of Trade on behalf of Her Majesty (which consent the Board of Trade may give) neither shall anything in this Act contained extend to take away prejudice diminish or alter any of the estates rights privileges powers or authorities vested in or enjoyed or exerciseable by the Queen's Majesty Her heirs or successors.

42. Nothing contained in this Act or to be done under the authority thereof shall in any manner affect the title to any of the subjects or any rights powers or authorities mentioned in or reserved by sections twenty and twenty-one of the Crown Lands Act 1866 or shall divest alter or affect any other estate right or interest belonging to the Queen's most Excellent Majesty Her heirs or successors.

43. All costs charges and expenses of and incident to the preparing for obtaining and passing of this Act or otherwise in relation thereto shall be paid and discharged by the Company.
