An Act for better repairing and improving several Roads leading to and from the Town of *Frome* in the County of *Somerset*. [23d August 1831.]

HEREAS an Act was passed in the Thirtieth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled An Act for repairing and widening several Roads 30 G.2. c.39. leading to, through, and from the Town of Frome in the County of Somerset; and for giving further Powers to the Trustees in an Act passed in the Twenty-fifth Year of His present Majesty, for repairing the Roads from the Town of Warminster in the County of Wilts to the City of Bath in the County of Somerset, and other Roads therein mentioned: And whereas another Act was passed in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled An 12 G. 3. c. 94. Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of an Act made in the Thirtieth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, for repairing and widening several Roads leading to, through, and from the Town of Frome in the County of Somerset, and several other Roads in the Counties of Somerset and Wilts: And whereas another Act was passed in the Thirtyseventh Year of the Reign of His said late Majesty King George the Third, intituled An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of Two 37G.3. c.175. Acts passed in the Thirtieth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty and the Twelfth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing and widening several Roads leading to, through, and from the Town of Frome $\lceil Local. \rceil$

in the County of Somerset, and for paving the Footways and lighting the Streets within the said Town: And whereas another Act was passed in the Fiftieth Year of the Reign of His said late Majesty King 50 G. 3. c.62. George the Third, intituled An Act to amend several Acts for repairing Roads leading to and through the Town of Frome in the County of Somerset, and for paving the Footways and lighting the Streets within the said Town; and for removing Part of the present Market Place in the said Town: And whereas the Trustees for executing the said recited Acts have proceeded to put the same into execution, and have made considerable Progress in repairing, widening, and otherwise improving the several Roads thereby directed to be repaired and improved, and have borrowed several large Sums of Money on the Credit of the Tolls thereby authorized to be taken; and the Debt thus incurred cannot be paid off, nor can the said several Roads be effectually amended, widened, improved, and kept in repair, unless the Term granted by the said last herein-before recited Act be further continued, and the Powers of the said Acts altered and amended: And whereas it will be highly advantageous to the Public if various new Lines and Improvements of the said Road are effected: And whereas, for the Purposes aforesaid, it is expedient that the said recited Acts should be repealed: May it therefore please Your Majesty that it may be enacted; and be it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That from and after the Third Friday next after the passing of this Act the said several Acts shall be and the same are hereby repealed.

Recited Acts repealed.

This Act to take effect instead thereof.

"II. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall from thenceforth commence and take effect and be put into execution, for and during the Term herein-after mentioned, for the Purpose of repairing, amending, widening, altering, and improving the several Roads hereinafter described; (that is to say,) the Road leading from the Factory belonging to John Bleek of Bugley within the Parish of Warminster in the County of Wilts, through Whitbourn and over Corsley Heath, through a Part of Frome Selwood aforesaid, and the Turnpike Gate called Cottles Oak Turnpike Gate, through Egg ford, Whatley, and Little Elm, to a Public House on Mendip called Tattle House, and from thence to the Beacon on Mendip Hills in the Parish of Doulling, in the Road leading to the City of Wells; also the Road leading from the last-mentioned Road, at or near Egg ford aforesaid, to the Water in Murdercombe Bottom, and from thence, through the Village of Mells in the said County of Somerset, to Stanbrook Ash in the Parish of Mells aforesaid; also the Roads leading from the Bridge in the said Town of Frome, and from the Seven Dials near the Ship Inn in the said Parish of Frome, to Murtery Bridge, and from thence to the Bridge at Buckland; also the Road leading from the Turnpike Gate called Wallbridge Gate, in the Parish of Rodden in the said County of Somerset, through the Road called Lamb's Gate, through the Village of Chapmanslade in the County of Wilts, to the Boundary Stone at Penleigh Gate in the Parish of Westbury, in the Road to the Town of Westbury; also the Road leading from the Seven Dialsaforesaid to Nunney Church in the Village of Nunney; also the Road

Road leading from Portway Terrace or Garston, through Locks Lane, Keyford, and Water Lane, into the Turnpike Road from Frome aforesaid to Bruton, comprising the whole of the Roads or Lanes called Locks Lane and Water Lane; also the Road leading from the Boundary Stone near the North Parade in Frome, through Frome, and Keyford in the Parish of Frome, over Blatch Bridge, by the George Inn in the West Woodlands in the said Parish, through the Village of Maiden Bradley in the County of Wilts, to the Gate called Gallows Gate, adjoining to the Parish of Norton Ferris; also the Road leading from Blatch Bridge aforesaid to the Horse and Jockey Public House in the Road from Frome aforesaid to Longleat in the said County of Wilts; also the Road from the Turnpike Gate called Goose Marsh Gate, near the said George Inn in West Woodlands aforesaid, to Bull's Quarries in the Parish of Frome aforesaid, adjoining to the said Turnpike Road leading from Frome to Bruton; also the Road leading from the first Cross Road on the West Side of the Village of Little Elm to the Lane in Coleford leading to the House and Mills claimed by Henry Flower.

III. And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Power to Trustees, and they are hereby authorized and empowered, to make, make new improve, maintain, and keep in repair, according to the Maps or Roads. Plans herein-after mentioned, the Roads following; (that is to say), a new Line of Road from the before-mentioned present Turnpike Road at Mells aforesaid, commencing near the West End of the Rectory Garden there, and joining the present Road near a House claimed by William Greenland; also a new Line of Road commencing near the Pound in the before-mentioned Road from the Seven Dials to Murtery Bridge, through Robin's Lane near the Ring of Bells, across the Wells Road across Nunney Lane, and to join the present Road near the Packhorse Inn; also a new Line of Road commencing near a Pond in the before-mentioned Road from Frome aforesaid to Maiden Bradley aforesaid, deviating to the West across an old Road, and joining the present Road near Maiden Bradley Cross; also a new Line of Road commencing at a Turnpike Gate called North Hill Turnpike Gate, in the Parish of Frome aforesaid, through the Hamlet of Clink, and joining the before-mentioned Road from Wallbridge to Penleigh Gate near Lamb's Gate; also a new Line of Road from near the First Mile Stone on the Road from Frome to Buckland, across Vallis, across the Valley, then skirting the North Side of Portway Hill, to Murdercombe; also a new Line of Road from the Brewery at Welsh Mill in the before-mentioned Road from Frome Bridge to Murtery Bridge, through Coffin Spring Lane, across the Bath Road near a House in the Occupation of Miss Clark, into the Lane from Frome Field to Clink Cross Roads; also a new Line of Road commencing from the South-west End of a Lane near a House late in the Occupation of William Ashman Esquire, deceased, at the Bottom of Portway Hill, into the present Turnpike Road between Eggford and Whatley; and the said Trustees are hereby authorized, on the Completion of the before-mentioned several new Lines of Road or any of them, to abandon the present Turnpike Roads to be thereby avoided, or any of them; and also to widen and otherwise improve the before-mentioned Road from Frome Bridge to Murtery Bridge,

near the House late in the Occupation of Thomas Clement deceased. in Frome aforesaid, and also near the aforesaid Brewery at Welsh Mill, and also near the aforesaid House at Spring Gardens in the Occupation of John Wilkins; and also to widen and otherwise improve the before-mentioned Road from Murtery Bridge to Buckland Bridge, near the Top of Buckland Hill, and adjoining Lands of Judith Emblen and William Phippen, and also the before-mentioned present Turnpike Road near the George Inn in West Woodlands aforesaid, and also the before-mentioned present Turnpike Road near Bugley Turnpike Gate in the said Parish of Warminster, also the beforementioned present Turnpike Road near the said House late belonging. to or in the Occupation of the said William Ashman deceased, at Eggford aforesaid, and also the said Lane near the Bottom of Portway Hill aforesaid to Great Elm in the said County of Somerset, and to make and take the same Lane as Turnpike Road; such several new Lines of Road being within and passing through the several Parishes of Frome Selwood, Mells, Whatley, Great Elm, Rodden, Berkley, and Maiden Bradley, in the said Counties of Somerset and Wilts.

Appointment of Trustees.

IV. And be it further enacted, That all His Majesty's Justices of the Peace acting for the said respective Counties of Somerset and Wilts for the Time being, together with the Reverend Joseph Algar, Francis Allen, James Bayly, John Buckler, Burroughs, Joseph Bayly, Rowland Bayly, Thomas Bunn, Wentworth Baily, Francis Bush, Otto Bayer, John Bleek, Lord Cartaret, Henry Chichester, Ebenezer Coombs, James B Coles, Thomas Charles William Dommett, Thomas Davis, Matthew Davies, Joseph Everett, James Fussell senior, James Fussell junior, Henry Austin Fussell, Isaac Fussell, John Fussell, the Reverend Jacob Fussell, William Foskett, Michael John Festing, George George, George Mawhood George, the Reverend Robert Clavey Griffith, William Giles, the Reverend D' Griffith, Robert Haynes, John Hughes, George Hillyard, the Reverend Robert Herbert, the Reverend Henry Hinzman, the Reverend John Ireland, Samuel Kelson, William Francis Knatchbull, Thomas Whitaker Ledyard, Walter Long, Charles Marr, the Reverend Richard John Meade, Robert Meares, Edward Newport, Benjamin Overbury, Edward Olive, John Olive, Stephen Francis Phelps, the Reverend Charles Phillott, John Moore Paget, Thomas Rogers, William Rossiter, John Ravenhill, Henry Sheppard, George Sheppard, the Reverend Francis Skurray, Thomas Seagram, Thomas Harmer Sheppard, John Sheppard, William Hulbert Sheppard, John Wingfield Shawe, Francis Hutchinson Synge, Thomas Byard Sheppard, John Tivitoe Thring, the Reverend Thomas Whalley Wickham, the Reverend J Williams, George Wansey, Alfred Whitaker, the Reverend Hamilton John Williams, William Everett Waldron, and John Charlton Yeatman, and their Successors, being duly qualified to act as Trustees for Turnpike Roads in England, shall be, and they, and their Successors, to be duly elected in manner directed by the Laws in force respecting Turnpike Roads in England, are hereby appointed Trustees for making, repairing, amending, widening, altering, and otherwise improving the said several Roads, and for otherwise carrying into full and complete Effect and Execution the several

Powers and Provisions of this Act and of the said General Turnpike Acts.

V. And be it further enacted, That it shall and may be lawful Power to for the Trustees appointed by this Act, and they are hereby autho- appoint rized and empowered, at any Meeting to be held for that Purpose, additional to elect, nominate, and appoint any additional Number of Trustees. (not exceeding Five in the whole); and such Trustees so elected and appointed, being qualified as aforesaid, shall be Trustees for the Purposes of this Act, and shall have the same Powers and Authorities for executing this Act as if they had been herein named and appointed Trustees.

VI. And be it further enacted, That the said Trustees shall hold First Meeting their First Meeting at the George Inn in Frome aforesaid, or some of Trustees. other convenient Place in Frome, on the Third Friday next after the passing of this Act, or as soon after as conveniently may be, and shall and may then and from Time to Time after, adjourn to and meet at such Times, and at such Place or Places within the said Town of Frome, or in the Neighbourhood of the said Roads, as they shall think proper.

VII. And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful for the said Power to Trustees, or any Person or Persons appointed or continued or to be take Tolls. appointed Collector or Collectors of the Tolls to be taken by virtue of this Act, and they are hereby authorized, to demand, receive, and take, at each and every of the several and respective Toll Gates or Turnpikes or Toll Houses, or Side Gates, Side Bars, or Chains, which are or shall be standing and being or continued or erected by virtue of this Act on the said Roads, or on the Side or Sides of any Part or Parts thereof, before the Horse or other Animal, Carriage or Vehicle, in respect of which the same shall be payable, shall be allowed to pass through any such Toll Gate or Turnpike, or Side Gate, Side Bar, or Chain, a Sum or Sums not exceeding the several Tolls herein-after mentioned; (that is to say,)

For every Horse or other Beast drawing any Coach, Barouche, Sociable, Berlin, Landau, Phaeton, Chariot, Chaise, Curricle, Hearse, Calash, Gig, Caravan, Cart upon Springs, or other such like Carriage, any Sum not exceeding Sixpence:

For every Horse, Mule, Ox, Ass, or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Wain, Cart, or other such like Carriage, having the Fellies of the Wheels of the Breadth of Six Inches or upwards at the Bottoms or Soles thereof, any Sum not exceeding Sixpence:

For every Horse, Mule, Ox, Ass, or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Wain, Cart, or other such like Carriage, having the Fellies of the Wheels of the Breadth of Four Inches and a Half and less than Six Inches at the Bottoms or Soles thereof, any Sum not exceeding Seven-pence:

For every Horse, Mule, Ox, Ass, or other Beast drawing any Waggon, Wain, Cart, or other such like Carriage, having the Fellies of the Wheels of less Breadth than Four Inches and a Half at the Bottoms or Soles thereof, any Sum not exceeding Eightpence:

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For every Horse, Mule, or Ass, loaden or unloaden, and not drawing, any Sum not exceeding Two-pence:

For every Drove of Oxen, Cows, or Neat Cattle, any Sum not exceeding Ten-pence per Score, and so in proportion for any greater or less Number:

For every Drove of Calves, Swine, Sheep, or Lambs, any Sum not exceeding Five-pence per Score, and so in proportion for any greater or less Number:

For every Carriage impelled or drawn by Machinery or Steam, and not by any Animal or Animals, any Sum not exceeding Two Shillings; and for every Carriage attached to and drawn by a Machinery or Steam Carriage, any Sum not exceeding One Shilling:

Fractional Part of a Halfpenny in Tolls.

And in all Cases where there shall be a fractional Part of a Halfpenny in the Calculation or Amount of the Tolls hereby granted or authorized to be taken, or in the Apportionment of such Tolls or any of them, the Sum of One Halfpenny shall be demanded and taken in lieu of such fractional Part; and all the Tolls and Money to be collected or levied by virtue of this Act or the said recited Acts shall be and are hereby vested in the said Trustees, and shall be paid, applied, and disposed of to and for the several Uses, Intents, and Purposes, and in such Manner, as herein-after mentioned.

Tolls to be paid but once a Day.

VIII. And be it further enacted, That in case the full Toll hereby authorized to be taken shall have been paid for the passing of any Horse, Beast, or Cattle through any One of such Toll Gates or Turnpikes or Side Gates, such Horse, Beast, or Cattle shall, upon a Ticket being produced denoting the Payment thereof on the same Day, (each Day to be computed from Twelve of the Clock in one Night to Twelve of the Clock in the next succeeding Night,) be permitted to pass Toll-free through the same Toll Gate, Turnpike, or Side Gate, and also through such second or other Gate or Gates (if any) as the Ticket for such Payment shall free, at any Time or Times during the same Day, to be computed as aforesaid.

Stage to pay every Time of passing;

IX. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That the Tolls Coaches, &c. hereby made payable shall be paid for and in respect of Horses and other Beasts drawing any Stage Coach, Diligence, Van, Caravan, Stage Waggon, Cart, or other Stage Carriage conveying Passengers or Goods for Pay, Hire, or Reward, and also for and in respect of any Carriage impelled or drawn by Machinery or Steam conveying Passengers or Goods for Pay, Hire, or Reward, every Time of such Stage Coach, Diligence, Van, Caravan, Stage Waggon, Cart, or Taxed Cart, or other Stage Carriage, Machinery or Steam Carriage, passing or repassing along the said Roads: Provided also, that no further or additional Toll shall be payable in respect of any Horses drawing any Stage Coach, Diligence, Van, Caravan, or Stage Waggon, or other Stage Carriage, on account only of the Horses drawing the same having been changed.

Hiring.

Post Chaises X. Provided also, and be it further enacted, That the Tolls on every new hereby made payable shall be paid for and in respect of Horses or Beasts let out to Hire, and drawing any Post Chaise or other such Carriage, every Time of passing along the said Roads, whenever any new Hiring thereof shall take place.

XI. Provided also, and be it further enacted, That when One full Toll shall have been paid for and in respect of any Horses or other Beasts drawing any Waggon, Wain, Cart, or other such Carriage laden with Stone, at all or any of the Toll Gates, Turnpikes, or Third Time Side Gates erected or to be erected on the said Roads, such Horses of passing. or other Beasts drawing such Waggon, Wain, Cart, or other such Carriage, shall be permitted to pass through the said Toll Gates, Turnpikes, or Side Gates, in respect of such Payment, twice only during the same Day (to be computed as aforesaid); and before any such Horses or other Beasts drawing such Waggon, Wain, Cart, or other such Carriage laden with Stone as aforesaid shall be permitted to pass through any One or more of such Toll Gates, Turnpikes, or Side Gates a Third Time on the same Day (to be computed as aforesaid), such Horses or other Beasts drawing such Waggon, Wain, Cart, or other such Carriage shall be subject and liable to the Payment of One Half of the original full Toll payable in respect thereof, over and besides such original full Toll; any thing in this Act contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding.

XII. And be it further enacted, That no more than the Number Limiting of full Tolls herein-after mentioned shall be demanded or taken on the same Day for or in respect of the same Horses, Cattle, Beasts, or taken in One Carriages for once passing and repassing through all or any of the Day. Turnpikes or Toll Gates erected or to be erected across or upon the Sides of the said Roads; (that is to say,) between the Commencement of the said Road at or near Warminster aforesaid and the Town of Frome, One full Toll; between the said Town of Frome and the Termination of the said Road at the Beacon on Mendip Hills aforesaid, Two full Tolls; between the Commencement of the said Road at Eggford aforesaid and the Termination of the said Road at Stanbrook Ash in the said Parish of Mells, One full Toll; between the Commencement of the said Road near the Seven Dials aforesaid. whether along the present Road towards Buckland, or the said proposed new Road from near the Packhorse Inn to near the Pound, and the Termination of the said Road at the Bridge at Buckland, One full Toll; between the Commencement of the said Road near the Bridge in Frome aforesaid and the Junction thereof with the last-mentioned Road, One full Toll; between the Commencement of the said Road at Wallbridge in the said Parish of Rodden and the Termination of the said Road at Penleigh Gate aforesaid, One full Toll; between the said Town of Frome and the Termination of the said Road near Nunney Church aforesaid, One full Toll; between the Commencement of the said Road near Garston aforesaid and the Termination of the said Road at the Bruton Turnpike Road, One full Toll; between the Commencement of the said Road near the North Parade aforesaid and Gallows Gate aforesaid, One full Toll; between the Commencement of the said Road at Blatchbridge and the Termination of the said Road near the Horse and Jockey Public House, One full Toll; between the Commencement of the said Road at Goose Marsh Gate and the Termination of the said Road at Bull's Quarries

Number of Tolls to be Quarries aforesaid, One full Toll; between the Commencement of the said Road at the Cross Road on the West Side of Little Elm aforesaid and the Termination thereof in Coleford aforesaid, One full Toll; between the Commencement of the said Road near North Hill Turnpike Gate and the Termination of the said Road near Lamb's Gate, One full Toll; between the Commencement of the said Road near the First Mile Stone on the Road from Frome to Buckland and the Termination of the said Road at Murdercombe, One full Toll; between the Commencement of the said Road at the Brewery at Welsh Mill aforesaid and the Termination of the said Road in the Lane leading to Clink Cross Roads, One full Toll; between the Commencement of the said Road near Great Elm and the Termination of the same in the Eggford and Whatley Road, One full Toll.

One-horse Carts may be weighed. XIII. And whereas it frequently happens that Carts drawn by One Horse passing along the said Roads carry a greater Weight than is allowed by Law for Carts drawn by Two or more Horses; be it therefore further enacted, That all Carts passing along the said Roads drawn by One Horse only shall and may be weighed at any Weighing Machine now erected or to be erected on the said Roads, and the like additional Toll demanded, received, and recovered for the Overweight thereof as is by Law payable in respect of the Overweight of Carts drawn by Two or more Horses; and all the Powers, Regulations, and Penalties now in force relating to the weighing of Waggons, Carts, and other such Carriages drawn by more than One Horse shall be applicable to Carts passing on the said Roads drawn by One Horse only, and to the Drivers, Masters, and Owners thereof.

Separate
Accounts to
be kept, and
no Money to
be expended
on a Road
where there
is no Gate.

XIV. And be it further enacted, That a separate and distinct Account shall be kept by the Clerk to the said Trustees, in a Book or Books to be provided for that Purpose, of all Monies laid out and expended on each respective Line of Road by this Act authorized to be diverted, widened, improved, or made, and also separate and distinct Accounts of the Tolls collected or received at the several Gates erected and set up upon or across each of such respective Lines of Road: Provided also, that no Money arising from any of the Tolls mentioned in this Act shall be applied in or towards the Repair of any Branch or distinct Line of Road comprised in this Act, unless some Toll Gate, Toll Bar, or Turnpike shall be erected and continued upon such Branch Road, nor unless the said Tolls shall be demanded and taken thereat pursuant to the Powers and Provisions of this Act: Provided also, that no more Money shall be expended by the said Trustees in or towards the Repair of any such distinct Line of Road or Branch Road than shall be collected thereon, or borrowed on the Credit of the Tolls collected thereon.

Application of Tolls.

XV. And be it further enacted, That out of the Monies already received by virtue of the said several Acts hereby repealed on account of the said Roads, and now in the Treasurer's Hands, or out of the first Money which shall arise or be received from the Tolls by this Act granted or otherwise, the said Trustees shall, in the first place, pay and discharge all the Costs, Charges, and Expences which

have been incurred in or about applying for, preparing, obtaining, and passing of this Act, or otherwise relating thereto; and the Remainder of all such Monies shall (after Payment of the necessary Expences of erecting or repairing Toll Gates, Toll Houses, Milestones or Posts, and Fences, and for Books, Advertisements, Salaries of Officers, and other Expences incidental to the Execution of this Act,) be applied in keeping down the Interest of the Principal Monies advanced or borrowed on the Credit of the Tolls arising on the said Roads by virtue of the said Acts hereby repealed, in preference to the Interest of any Monies to be borrowed on the Credit of this Act; and in the next place in keeping down the Interest of the Principal Monies which may hereafter be borrowed on the Credit of this Act; and afterwards in amending, improving, maintaining, repairing, and keeping in repair the said Roads, and otherwise putting this Act into execution; and then in repaying the Principal Monies already borrowed on the Credit of the Tolls arising on the said Roads by virtue of the said Acts hereby repealed; and lastly in repaying the Principal Monies to be borrowed on the Credit of this Act, and to or for no other Use or Purpose whatsoever.

XVI. And whereas a Map or Plan describing the Lands, Tenements, Plan deposi-Hereditaments, and other Premises in, upon, through, over, or along ted with the which the said several Alterations and Improvements are respectively Clerk of the intended to be made or carried, together with a Book of Reference to such Map or Plan, containing a List of the Names of the Owners Inspection. or reputed Owners and Occupiers of such Lands, Hereditaments, and other Premises, has been deposited at the Office of the Clerk of the Peace of the County of Somerset, and another Map or Plan and Book of Reference with the Clerk of the Peace for the County of Wilts; be it therefore further enacted, That the said Maps or Plans and Books of Reference shall remain in the Custody of the said Clerks of the Peace respectively, to the end that all Persons may at all reasonable Times have Liberty to inspect and peruse the same, and to take Copies or Extracts thereof, at their Will and Pleasure, paying to the said Clerks of the Peace the Sum of One Shilling for every such Inspection, and at the Rate of Sixpence for every One hundred Words of such Copies or Extracts; and the said Trustees, in making such Trustees Alterations and Improvements, shall not deviate more than One not to devihundred Yards from the Lines described in the said Maps or Plans, ate more than without the Concept in Writing of the Person on Description of the Person of without the Consent in Writing of the Person or Persons, Bodies therefrom Politic, Corporate, or Collegiate, in, upon, through, or over whose without Con-Lands and Premises the said several Alterations and Improvements sent. shall respectively be made.

Peace to be open to

XVII. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That it shall be New Roads lawful for the Trustees to make the said several new Lines of Road and Improvements through, across, or over the Lands of any Person or Persons who is or are or may be Owner or Owners of Lands, withstanding Errors in Tenements, and Hereditaments through or over which the same are Book of set out and described in the said Maps or Plans or Books of Reference, Reference. although such Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments, or the Name or Names of such Person or Persons, or of the Parish or Parishes in which such Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments are mentioned to $\lceil Local. \rceil$ 15 P be

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be situate, or the Parish or Parishes from, through, or into which the said new Lines of Road, or any or either of them, shall commence, pass, run, or determine, shall or may happen to be erroneously mentioned, described, omitted, or mis-stated in the said Maps or Plans or Books of Reference, in case it shall appear to any Two or more Justices of the Peace of the County wherein such Lands, Tenements, and other Hereditaments shall be situate, and to be certified by Writing under their Hands, that such Omission, Misnomer, or inacrate Description proceeded from Mistake only.

Dwelling | Houses, &c. not to be taken except those mentioned in Schedule.

XVIII. Provided always, and be it further enacted. That the Powers and Authorities given by this Act for making, maintaining, widening, diverting, improving, or altering the said Roads comprised in this Act, and making the said new Lines, shall not extend or be construed to extend to authorize or empower the said. Trustees to take or pull down, injure or damage, any Dwelling House or other Buildings, or to take in or make use of any Curtilage, Orchard, Garden, Yard, Park, Paddock, Lawn, Shrubbery, planted Walk, or Avenue to a House, Plantation; or any Part thereof respectively, without the Consent in Writing of the Owner or Proprietor thereof, or other Person interested therein, first had and obtained, except such as are mentioned and specified in the Schedule to this Act annexed.

Limiting Period for purchasing Property.

XIX. And be it further enacted, That if the said Trustees shall not, within the Space of Three Years from and after the passing of this Act, agree for or cause to be valued the several Houses and Tenements mentioned in the Schedule to this Act annexed, then and from thenceforth the Powers to them granted for such Purpose only shall cease, determine, and be utterly void and of no Effect, save and except with the Consent in Writing of the Owners and Occupiers of such Houses and Tenements; any thing herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding.

Stock already purchased to be sold, and Produce to Mortgage -Debt.

XX. And whereas the said Trustees have, under and by virtue of the Powers and Provisoes contained in the said recited Act passed n the Fiftieth Year of the Reign of His Majesty King George the Third, laid out and invested several Sums of Money in the Purchase of be applied in Three Pounds per Centum Consolidated Annuities, and have also Payment of from Time to Time, as and when the Dividends become payable in respect of the said Sums of Money, laid out and invested such Dividends, and also the Dividends of such Accumulations, in the Purchase of Stock in the said Three Pounds per Centum Consolidated Annuities, and by means of such several Purchases as aforesaid the Sum of Six thousand one hundred and eighty-seven Pounds Nine Shillings and Three pence is now invested in the Three Pounds per Centum Consolidated Annuities, in the Names of the Right Honourable Edmund Earl of Cork and Orrery, Thomas Bunn Esquire, and the Reverend John Frederick Doveton, Trustees of the said Turnpike Roads, as a Fund for the Redemption or Diminution of the Debt due on the Credit of the said Tolls; be it therefore further enacted. That the said Sum of Six thousand one hundred and eighty-seven Pounds Nine Shillings and Three pence Three Pounds per Centum Consolidated Annuities shall, within Three Calendar Months after the passing

of this Act, be sold, and the Money arising therefrom shall be paid and applied towards discharging the Mortgage Debt now due on the Credit of the said Tolls, either rateably amongst all the Creditors in proportion to the several Debts, or to some of them by Lot, in the Manner expressed or directed by an Act passed in the Fourth Year, of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled An Act to explain and amend an Act passed in the Third Year of the 4 G. 4.c. 49. Reign of His present Majesty, to amend the General Laws now in being for regulating Turnpike Roads in that Part of Great Britain called England.

XXI. And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Trustees to Trustees for the Time being of the said Roads, and they are hereby retain a furauthorized, directed, and required, yearly and every Year during the yearly to-Continuance of this Act, to deduct and retain, from and out of the wards re-Tolls arising or to arise and to be received in pursuance of this Act, deeming the the Sum of Four hundred Pounds, to be applied for the Purpose of Debt. redeeming or reducing the Debt already incurred or hereafter to be incurred on the Credit of the said Tolls, in the Manner herein-before mentioned; and when and as soon as the whole of the Debt due on the Credit of the said Tolls shall be reduced to Four thousand Pounds, the said Expenditure of the yearly Sum of Four hundred Pounds shall cease, unless the said Trustees at any Meeting, of which Twentyone Days Notice shewing the Purpose thereof shall be given by affixing such Notice in Writing on all the Toll Gates or Turnpikes at that Time erected on the said Roads, and by inserting such Notice in One or more Newspaper or Newspapers generally circulated in the Neighbourhood of the said Roads, shall order or direct the said yearly Sum of Four hundred Pounds to be retained, and applied in discharge of the Debt then remaining due on the Credit of the said Tolls or any Part thereof, in which Case the Sum of Money so to be retained shall be applied in the Manner herein-before expressed and directed with respect to the Sums already invested, and to be hereafter retained, until the whole of the Debt due on the Credit of the said Tolls shall be paid off.

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XXII. Provided also, and be it further enacted, That it shall and Power to may be lawful to and for the said Trustees to apply any further Sum or Sums of Money arising from the said Tolls, or from the lawful ther Sums Gift, Grant, Lease, or Subscription of any Person or Persons for ing the that Purpose, in order for the more speedy Discharge of the Debts Debt. due and to become due on the Security of the said Tolls, in manner aforesaid.

XXIII. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That it shall Power to and may be lawful for the said Trustees, or any Seven or more of Money, not them, from Time to Time and at all Times during the Continuance exceeding a of this Act, at any Meeting or Meetings to be held for that Purpose, certain Sum. of which Twenty-one Days Notice shall be given in Two Newspapers to be circulated in the Counties of Wilts and Somerset, and also affixed on all the Turnpike Gates then erected on the said Roads, by any Writing or Writings under their Hands and Seals to borrow and take up at Interest, upon the Credit of the Tolls arising by virtue

of this Act, such further Sum or Sums of Money as they shall think fit, so as the Monies which are now due, and the total Amount of the Monies which may be so borrowed, shall not exceed in the whole the Sum of Twenty-six thousand Pounds; and they may and are hereby empowered, by such Writing or Writings as herein-before specified and set forth, to demise or mortgage the said Tolls or any Part or Parts thereof, and the Turnpikes or Toll Houses for collecting the same, in manner aforesaid, as a Security to any Person or Persons, or their Trustee or Trustees, for each Sum or Sums of Money so to be borrowed and the Interest thereof; but no further Sum of Money is to be or shall be borrowed on the Credit of the Sinking Fund, nor by deducting the Value thereof from the Twenty-six thousand Pounds, or any other Contrivance, but the Sinking Fund is to be faithfully applied to reduce one single Debt of Twenty-six thousand Pounds, or any less Amount to Four thousand Pounds, or as near thereto as Circumstances will permit.

Money not to be laid out in repairing Streets, &c.

XXIV. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That no Part of the Money received or to be received by virtue of the said recited Acts or this Act shall be laid out in paving, cleansing, lighting, or repairing any Street, Road, or Highway within the Town of Frome.

Public Act.

XXV. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall be deemed and taken to be a Public Act, and shall be judicially taken notice of as such by all Judges, Justices, and others, without being specially pleaded.

Commencement and Continuance of this Act.

XXVI. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall commence and take effect upon the Third Friday next after the passing thereof, and shall thenceforth continue and be in force for and during the Term of Thirty-one Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament.
