RESTRICTIVE TRADE PRACTICES

The Restrictive Practices (Approval of Arrangements) No. 1 Order 1969

Made - - - 24th February 1969

Whereas section 7 of the Restrictive Trade Practices Act 1956(a), as amended by section 4 of the Restrictive Trade Practices Act 1968(b), provides for the approval by the Board of Trade of arrangements as to the provision of information or advice to purchasers, consumers or users:

Now, therefore, the Board of Trade in pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by the said section 7 as so amended hereby make the following Order:—

- 1. This Order may be cited as the Restrictive Practices (Approval of Arrangements) No. 1 Order 1969.
- 2. The arrangements specified in the Schedule hereto are approved by the Board of Trade.

SCHEDULE

1. Arrangements contained in a scheme, concerning safety precautions for veterinary products, drawn up following discussions between the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food, the Ministry of Health and the corresponding Scottish Departments, and the representative professional and commercial organisations.

The Scheme is set out in a booklet issued by the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food entitled "Veterinary Products Safety Precautions Scheme" and dated February 1964.

2. Arrangements contained in a scheme, concerning safety precautions for pesticides, which was drawn up in negotiation between the afore-mentioned Government Departments and the Industrial Associations concerned and came into effect in 1957, and which was subsequently reviewed by them.

The Scheme is set out in a booklet issued by the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food entitled "Pesticides Safety Precautions Scheme agreed between Government Departments and Industry" and dated February 1966.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This Note is not part of the Order.)

Where an agreement contains a term that the parties are to comply with the arrangements mentioned in the Schedule to this Order (which relate to the provision of information and advice about veterinary products and pesticides), no account is to be taken of that term in determining whether the agreement falls within Part I of the Restrictive Trade Practices Act 1956. That Part of the Act provides for the registration and judicial investigation of restrictive trading agreements.
