WAGES COUNCILS

**The Wages Regulation (Boot and Shoe Repairing)
Order 1973***Made* - - - 14th December 1973*Coming into Operation* 6th February 1974

Whereas the Secretary of State has received from the Boot and Shoe Repairing Wages Council (Great Britain) the wages regulation proposals set out in the Schedule hereto;

Now, therefore, the Secretary of State in exercise of powers conferred by section 11 of the Wages Councils Act 1959(a), as modified by Article 2 of the Counter-Inflation (Modification of Wages Councils Act 1959) Order 1973(b), and now vested in him(c), and of all other powers enabling him in that behalf, hereby makes the following Order:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Wages Regulation (Boot and Shoe Repairing) Order 1973.

2.—(1) In this Order the expression “the specified date” means the 6th February 1974, provided that where, as respects any worker who is paid wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, that date does not correspond with the beginning of the period for which the wages are paid, the expression “the specified date” means, as respects that worker, the beginning of the next such period following that date.

(2) The Interpretation Act 1889(d) shall apply to the interpretation of this Order as it applies to the interpretation of an Act of Parliament and as if this Order and the Orders hereby revoked were Acts of Parliament.

3. The wages regulation proposals set out in the Schedule hereto shall have effect as from the specified date and as from that date the Wages Regulation (Boot and Shoe Repairing) Order 1972(e) shall cease to have effect.

ARRANGEMENT OF SCHEDULE

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Article 3

SCHEDULE

The following minimum remuneration shall be substituted for the statutory minimum remuneration fixed by the Wages Regulation (Boot and Shoe Repairing) Order 1972 (Order D. (161)).

STATUTORY MINIMUM REMUNERATION

PART I

APPLICATION

1.—(1) Subject to the provisions of this Schedule, the minimum remuneration payable to a worker to whom this Schedule applies for all work except work to which a minimum overtime rate applies under Part VI of this Schedule is:—

- (a) in the case of a time worker, the hourly general minimum time rate applicable to the worker under the provisions of this Schedule;
- (b) in the case of a worker employed on piece work, $2\frac{1}{2}p$ per hour, and in addition
 - (i) where a general minimum piece rate applies under Part VIII of this Schedule, that piece rate;
 - (ii) where no general minimum piece rate applies, piece rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker at least the same amount of money as the hourly general minimum time rate which would be applicable if the worker were a time worker:

Provided that where a guaranteed time rate is applicable to the worker under paragraph 3 or 5 and the worker's minimum remuneration calculated on a time work basis at the hourly guaranteed time rate exceeds the minimum remuneration calculated under the provisions of (b) of this sub-paragraph, the worker shall be paid at not less than the hourly guaranteed time rate.

(2) In this Schedule, the expressions "hourly general minimum time rate" and "hourly guaranteed time rate" mean respectively the general minimum time rate and the guaranteed time rate applicable to the worker under Part II, Part III or Part IV of this Schedule divided by 40.

2.—(1) Subject to the provisions of sub-paragraph (2) of this paragraph, this Schedule applies to workers in relation to whom the Boot and Shoe Repairing Wages Council (Great Britain) operates, that is to say, workers employed in Great Britain in the circumstances specified in the Schedule to the Boot and Shoe Repairing Wages Council (Great Britain) (Variation) Order 1948(a), namely:—

- (i) all workers employed in Great Britain in a boot and shoe repairing undertaking as defined in sub-paragraph (3) of this paragraph on any of the following work:—
 - (a) the repairing, altering or dyeing of boots, shoes, slippers and all other similar kinds of footwear;
 - (b) the making of bespoke footwear;
 - (c) work incidental or ancillary to any of the above-mentioned operations;
 - (d) shop duties in connection with the above operations, including attending to customers and sale by retail of boot and shoe laces and materials and articles used in connection with the cleaning or repair of boots or shoes;
 - (e) collection or despatch in connection with the operations in (a) and (b) above, and work ancillary thereto;
 - (f) canvassing for boot or shoe repairs and the collection of accounts in connection with the undertaking;
 - (g) clerical or other office work in connection with the undertaking, including costing and the work of a cashier;
- (ii) all outworkers employed by way of trade in Great Britain on any of the operations specified in (a), (b) or (c) of (i) above.

(2) Notwithstanding the provisions of sub-paragraph (1) of this paragraph, this Schedule does not apply:—

- (i) to workers employed in any shop or in any department in a shop, being a shop or department which is wholly or mainly engaged in the sale by retail of footwear (including operations in connection with such sale), in respect of their employment:—
 - (a) on retail sales at such shop and operations incidental thereto; or
 - (b) on transport or clerical work relating to such sales; or
- (ii) to workers employed in or in connection with a factory which is wholly or mainly engaged on the manufacture of leather footwear on a large scale, in respect of their employment:—
 - (a) on the making of bespoke footwear and work incidental or ancillary thereto; or
 - (b) on transport or clerical work relating to bespoke footwear; or
- (iii) to workers who are persons registered as handicapped by disablement in pursuance of the Disabled Persons (Employment) Acts 1944 and 1958(b), in respect of their employment by Remploy Limited.

(3) For the purpose of this Schedule a “boot and shoe repairing undertaking” means any undertaking or any part of an undertaking which is wholly or mainly engaged by way of trade on any of the following operations, including operations incidental or ancillary thereto, that is to say—

- (i) the repairing of leather footwear;
- (ii) the making of bespoke footwear;

Provided that as regards trainees who, under the Government Vocational Training Scheme for resettlement training, have been placed by the Department of Employment with, and are being trained by, an employer for a period of approved training, this Schedule shall not (subject to the condition that the requirements of the Training Scheme are complied with) apply during the period in respect of which the trainees are in receipt of allowances as provided under the Scheme.

PART III

MALE OR FEMALE WORKERS AGED UNDER 21 YEARS
GENERAL MINIMUM TIME RATES AND GUARANTEED
TIME RATE

5.—(1) The general minimum time rates applicable to all male or female workers aged under 21 years, being—

- (a) foremen or managers as defined in paragraph 3(3),
- (b) press cutters responsible for cutting and costing, or
- (c) workers who have worked at least five years in the trade under a contract of apprenticeship,

are the general minimum time rates which would be applicable to those workers under paragraph 3 or 4 if they were aged 21 years or over.

PART IV

GENERAL MINIMUM TIME RATES FOR LEARNERS
AND APPRENTICES

7.—(1) The following general minimum time rates are applicable to male or female learners employed in accordance with the conditions set out in paragraph 8; and to male or female apprentices—

- (a) who are employed under contracts of apprenticeship in writing to be taught one or more of the following sections of the trade—
 - (i) bespoke hand sewn making including hand finishing,
 - (ii) boot and shoe repairing in all its operations as performed in the establishment, including benching by hand and by such benching machines as are used in the establishment, hand sewing, re-stitching, re-welting, finishing by hand, by any finishing machine used in the establishment, by hand and such machine, patching by hand, by machine and by solution, and all other upper repairing,
 - (iii) clicking (including pattern cutting) and closing (including fitting and machining) of uppers for bespoke work or either of such operations, and
- (b) in whose case the conditions specified in paragraph 9 are fulfilled.

(2) The general minimum time rate applicable to a learner to bespoke hand sewn making who is aged 21 years or over and who has not completed a period of five years in such learnership shall, until he attains the age of 22 years or until he completes the said period of learnership (whichever period is the less), be the rate applicable to a learner aged 20 and under 21 years, increased by £1.00 weekly.

PART V

CONDITIONS AS TO LEARNERS AND APPRENTICES
LEARNERS

8.—(1) The general minimum time rates specified in paragraph 7 apply only to a male or female learner in whose case the conditions following are fulfilled—

- (a) if he is a learner to bespoke hand sewn making, he shall be employed for not less than two-thirds of his time in learning the bespoke hand sewn making branch of the trade and shall, during the whole or a substantial part of such time, receive adequate instruction in either (i) bespoke hand sewn making, (ii) clicking, or (iii) clicking and closing of uppers for bespoke work;
- (b) if he is a learner employed in a factory in which machinery driven by mechanical power is used for benching or finishing operations, he shall be employed, during the whole or a substantial part of his time, as a learner in the trade and shall receive, during such time, adequate instruction in a progressive manner in either—
 - (i) benching by hand and all operations of benching by machine which are carried out in the factory, or

- (ii) benching by hand or machine and finishing by hand or machine, not less than one-third of the learner's time being spent in benching:

Provided that where the learner has been so employed for not less than three years he may be employed thereafter, in conjunction with a journeyworker finisher, as a learner to finishing by machine, and in such case the learner shall be employed for at least one-third of his time in learning the operations of edge trimming, edge setting and heel scouring;

- (c) any other learner shall be employed during the whole or a substantial part of his time, as a learner in the trade and shall receive during such time adequate instruction in a progressive manner in either—

- (i) benching by hand, throughout the whole period of his employment, or
- (ii) benching by hand and finishing by hand or machine, not less than one-third of the learner's time being spent in benching;

- (d) in the establishment in which the learner is employed the proportion of learners to journeyworkers shall not exceed that of one learner to two journeyworkers:

Provided that one learner of each of the classes specified at (a), (b) or (c) of this sub-paragraph may be employed in an establishment in which only one journeyworker is employed on the operation or group of operations in which the learner is receiving instruction.

- (2) For the purposes of sub-paragraph (1) of this paragraph,

- (a) the “bespoke hand sewn making branch of the trade” shall mean that branch in which workers are employed for not less than two-thirds of their time on bespoke hand sewn making, clicking or closing of uppers or on one or more of such operations for bespoke work;
- (b) the expression “journeyworker” shall, save as is hereinafter provided in this sub-paragraph, have the same meaning as in paragraph 3(3);
- (c) a worker aged under 21 years to whom a general minimum time rate specified in paragraph 6 applies shall not be reckoned as a learner, apprentice or journeyworker;
- (d) where an employer is wholly or mainly performing the work of a journeyworker he shall be reckoned as a journeyworker.

- (3) For the purposes of determining the proportion of learners to journeyworkers in accordance with condition (d) of sub-paragraph (1) of this paragraph,

- (a) a casual absence of a journeyworker or a casual vacancy for a short period in the number of journeyworkers employed shall not be treated as a failure to comply with the said condition;
- (b) an apprentice shall be reckoned as a learner.

APPRENTICES

9.—(1) The general minimum time rates specified in paragraph 7 apply only to a male or female apprentice employed under a contract of apprenticeship in writing in whose case the conditions following are fulfilled:—

- (a) The apprentice shall be employed under a written contract of apprenticeship which has been duly executed and which contains the following provisions (which the Wages Council considers necessary for the effective instruction of the apprentice) or provisions substantially to the like effect and no provisions contrary thereto:—
 - (i) A description of the section or sections of work in the trade to which the worker is apprenticed;

- (ii) The date of the commencement of the apprenticeship and a provision for its continuance until the date on which the apprentice shall have completed five years' apprenticeship or reached his 21st birthday whichever is the earlier;
 - (iii) A term that during the period of apprenticeship the employer will pay to the apprentice not less than the appropriate statutory minimum remuneration from time to time;
 - (iv) A covenant or agreement by the employer that, throughout the period of apprenticeship, he will keep the apprentice under his supervision and instruct the apprentice himself, or place him in the hands of one or more competent journeyworkers for instruction, so that in either case the apprentice shall receive throughout the period of apprenticeship and in a progressive manner effective instruction in the section or sections of work in the trade to which he is apprenticed;
 - (v) A covenant or agreement by the apprentice whereby, throughout the period of apprenticeship, he binds himself to the employer to learn the section or sections of work in the trade to which he is apprenticed;
 - (vi) A term, in the case of an apprentice who is apprenticed to the boot and shoe repairing section of work in the trade, that the employment of the apprentice on benching shall alternate regularly with his employment on finishing, so that not more than one-third of his time is spent on finishing operations;
 - (vii) A provision that, during the apprenticeship, the apprentice shall not be put on piece work and shall not be employed on any work to which any minimum overtime rate applies under Part VI of this Schedule.
- (b) In the establishment in which the apprentice is employed the proportion of apprentices to journeyworkers in either branch of the trade shall not at any time exceed that of one apprentice to two journeyworkers:
- Provided that—
- (i) one apprentice may be employed in each branch of the trade if only one journeyworker is employed in the same branch;
 - (ii) where an employer who works personally at the trade and does not employ a journeyworker has one apprentice who has completed at least four years' apprenticeship, he may employ a second apprentice during the last year of the apprenticeship of the first apprentice, and for the purpose of calculating the proportion of apprentices to journeyworkers the first apprentice shall not be taken into account.
- (c) The apprentice shall be the holder of a certificate of registration as an apprentice issued by, or on behalf of, the Wages Council or shall have made application for such a certificate which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration:
- Provided that the certification of an apprentice may be cancelled by the Wages Council if the other conditions of apprenticeship are not complied with.
- (2) For the purpose of determining the proportion of apprentices to journeyworkers in accordance with condition (b) of the last preceding sub-paragraph,
- (a) one of the said branches of the trade shall be that branch in which workers are employed for not less than two-thirds of their time on one or more of the operations of (i) bespoke hand sewn making, (ii) hand sewn repairing, (iii) clicking (cutting), and (iv) the closing of uppers for bespoke work, and the other branch shall be any other section of the trade;
 - (b) a casual absence of a journeyworker or a casual vacancy for a short period in the number of journeyworkers employed shall not be treated as a failure to comply with the said condition;
 - (c) where an employer is wholly or mainly performing the work of a journeyworker he shall be reckoned as a journeyworker;

- (d) a learner shall be reckoned as an apprentice;
- (e) a worker aged under 21 years to whom a general minimum time rate specified in paragraph 6 applies shall not be reckoned as a learner, apprentice or journey-worker;
- (f) save as aforesaid, the expression "journeyworker" shall have the same meaning as in paragraph 3(3).

(3) Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Schedule, where an employer employs a worker as a prospective apprentice for a probationary period not exceeding three months and the conditions of apprenticeship set out in sub-paragraph (1) of this paragraph, other than employment under a written contract of apprenticeship and certification by the Wages Council are fulfilled, the minimum remuneration payable to that worker during the said period shall be that applicable to an apprentice employed in accordance with the condition specified in sub-paragraph (1) of this paragraph, and, in the event of the worker being continued thereafter at his employment as an apprentice, the said probationary period shall, for the purposes of this Schedule, be treated as part of the period of apprenticeship, whether or not it is included therein:

Provided that where the employer does not, on or before the last day of the said probationary period, enter into with the worker such a contract of apprenticeship as is mentioned in sub-paragraph (1) of this paragraph, the employer shall pay to the worker a sum equal to the difference between the minimum remuneration payable to him as a prospective apprentice and the amount that would have been payable to him had the provisions of this sub-paragraph not applied.

PART VI

OVERTIME AND WAITING TIME

MINIMUM OVERTIME RATES

10. Minimum overtime rates are payable to a worker to whom this Schedule applies as follows:—

- (1) on any day other than a Sunday or customary holiday or a day on which a rest period occurs,
 - (a) for the first 2 hours worked in excess of 10 hours time-and-a-quarter
 - (b) thereafter time-and-a-half
- (2) in any week for all time worked during rest periods,
 - (a) for the first 2 hours worked time-and-a-quarter
 - (b) thereafter time-and-a-half
- (3) on a Sunday or customary holiday, for all time worked double time
- (4) in any week, for all time worked in excess of 40 hours, exclusive of any time for which a minimum rate is payable under the foregoing provisions of this paragraph,
 - (a) for the first 3 hours so worked time-and-a-quarter
 - (b) thereafter time-and-a-half

11. In this Schedule

- (1) the expressions "time-and-a-quarter", "time-and-a-half" and "double time" mean respectively—
 - (a) in the case of a time worker, one and a quarter times, one and a half times and twice the hourly general minimum time rate otherwise applicable to the worker,

- (b) in the case of a worker employed on piece work
 - (i) a time rate equal respectively to one quarter, one half and the whole of the hourly general minimum time rate which would be applicable to the worker if he were a time worker and a minimum overtime rate did not apply, and in addition thereto,
 - (ii) the minimum remuneration otherwise applicable to the worker under paragraph 1(1)(b).
- (2) the expression "customary holiday" means—
 - (a) in England and Wales
 - (i) Christmas Day, 26th December if it be not a Sunday, 27th December in a year when 25th or 26th December is a Sunday, Good Friday, Easter Monday, the last Monday in May, the last Monday in August and any day proclaimed as a public holiday or additional bank holiday, or
 - (ii) in the case of each of the named holidays, such other day (not being a day on which a rest period occurs) as may be substituted therefor by the employer by a notice posted in the factory throughout the three weeks immediately preceding the holiday for which it is substituted;
 - (b) in Scotland
 - (i) New Year's Day, if it be not a Sunday or, if it be a Sunday, 2nd January, Good Friday, the local Spring holiday, the day observed as Victoria Day or Queen's Birthday, the local Autumn holiday, Christmas Day, if it be not a Sunday or, if it be a Sunday, 26th December, and any day, proclaimed as a public holiday or additional bank holiday, or
 - (ii) in the case of each of the named holidays, such other day (not being a day on which a rest period occurs) as may be substituted therefor by the employer by a notice posted in the factory throughout the three weeks immediately preceding the holiday for which it is substituted:

Provided that notification of days of holiday made by the employer for the purpose of section 94 of the Factories Act 1961(a), shall be treated for the purposes of this sub-paragraph as effective notice of substitution.

- (3) the expression "rest period" means—
 - (a) a day (other than a Sunday or customary holiday) in each week of employment (or where one or more customary holidays fall in any such week either in that week or at the employer's option in the next succeeding week), appointed by the employer by giving at least three weeks' notice to the worker as the day upon which the worker will not normally be required to work, or
 - (b) each of the periods during which a worker will not normally be required to work on two days (other than Sundays or customary holidays) in each week of employment (or where one or more customary holidays fall in any such week either in that week or at the employer's option in the next succeeding week) similarly appointed by the employer as days upon which the worker will not normally be required to work for more than five hours, or
 - (c) in default of any such appointment by the employer as is mentioned in the preceding sub-paragraphs (a) and (b) hereof, Saturday or if Saturday is a customary holiday the last working day preceding it.

WAITING TIME

12.—(1) A worker is entitled to payment of the minimum remuneration specified in this Schedule for all time during which he is present on the premises of his employer, unless he is present thereon in any of the following circumstances:—

- (a) without the employer's consent, express or implied,
- (b) for some purpose unconnected with his work and other than that of waiting for work to be given to him to perform,

- (c) by reason only of the fact he is resident thereon,
 - (d) during normal meal times in a room or place in which no work is being done and he is not waiting for work to be given to him to perform.
- (2) The minimum remuneration payable under sub-paragraph (1) of this paragraph to a piece worker when not engaged on piece work is that which would be applicable if he were a time worker.

PART VII

GUARANTEED REMUNERATION

GUARANTEED WEEKLY REMUNERATION

13.—(1) This paragraph applies to a worker (other than a casual worker) who ordinarily works for the employer for at least 36 hours weekly on work to which this Schedule applies.

(2) Notwithstanding anything in this Schedule contained, where in any week:—

(a) no remuneration is payable to the worker under the foregoing provisions of this Schedule or by way of holiday remuneration under any wages regulation order made by the Secretary of State to give effect to the proposals of the Wages Council, or

(b) the total amount of any such remuneration is less than the guaranteed weekly remuneration provided for by this paragraph,

the minimum remuneration payable to that worker for that week in lieu of any amount aforesaid shall, subject to the provisions of this paragraph, be the guaranteed weekly remuneration.

(3) Subject to the provisions of the next following sub-paragraph the amount of the guaranteed weekly remuneration is as follows:—

(a) in the case of a worker who ordinarily works for the employer on work to which this Schedule applies for at least 40 hours weekly, 32 hours' pay calculated at the general minimum time rate ordinarily applicable to the worker, or

(b) in the case of a worker who ordinarily works for the employer for less than 40 but not less than 36 hours weekly on such work, 32/40ths of the amount payable at the said rate for the hours ordinarily worked by the worker in a week for the employer on such work.

(4) Payment of the guaranteed weekly remuneration in any week is subject to the condition that the worker throughout the period of his ordinary employment in that week, excluding any day allowed to him as a holiday, is (a) capable of and available for work and (b) willing to perform such duties outside his normal occupation as the employer may reasonably require if his normal work is not available to him in the establishment in which he is employed:

Provided that guaranteed weekly remuneration shall not cease to be payable to a worker in respect of any week by reason only of the fact that he is absent during any part of that week by reason of proved illness or with the consent of the employer but, in the case of any such absence (other than absence on a holiday with pay allowed under the provisions of a wages regulation order) the amount of the guaranteed weekly remuneration shall be reduced by the amount to which he would have been entitled under this Schedule as a time worker had he worked the number of hours ordinarily worked by him during the period of such absence in that week.

(5) If the employer is unable to provide the worker with work by reason of a strike, failure of supplies or any cause (other than shortage of work) outside the control of the employer, guaranteed weekly remuneration shall not be payable in respect of any week during which, or part of which, the employer is unable to provide work as aforesaid.

(6) The amount of the guaranteed weekly remuneration applicable to a piece worker shall be the sum to which he would be entitled if he were a time worker.

(7) In this paragraph the expression "week" means "pay week".

GUARANTEED DAILY REMUNERATION FOR CASUAL WORKERS

14.—(1) Notwithstanding anything contained in this Schedule, where the time worked by a casual worker on work to which this Schedule applies is less than 5 hours on a weekly short day (not being a customary holiday) or 8 hours on any other day, he shall be treated for the purposes of this Schedule (except Part VI) as if he had worked on such work 5 and 8 hours respectively.

(2) A casual worker who, in accordance with his employer's instructions, reports on any day for work to which this Schedule applies, but does not perform any such work, shall be treated as if the provisions of sub-paragraph (1) of this paragraph applied in respect of that day.

(3) For the purposes of this paragraph:—

- (a) A casual worker is a worker who undertakes short engagements on an hourly or a day to day basis.
- (b) A piece worker shall be treated as though he were a time worker.

PART VIII**GENERAL MINIMUM PIECE RATES FOR MALE OR FEMALE WORKERS**

PART XI

GENERAL

74.—(1) For each try on, or re-try on, outworkers shall be paid 13·333p extra for one boot or shoe or pair of boots or shoes, and indoor workers, 6·667p extra for one boot or shoe or pair of boots or shoes. These rates do not include bracing. Alterations (other than operations to which general minimum piece rates are applicable) are to be paid at the piece rates specified in paragraph 1(1)(b)(ii).

(2) Scape or similar soles, 25p per pair extra to the rates for completed work set out in paragraphs 69, 70 and 71.

(3) The minimum rates of wages specified in this Schedule do not include the cost of grindery.

75. Rates per pair—where a piece rate is specified in this Schedule as a rate per pair one-half of such rate shall be payable where only one boot or shoe is involved.

DEFINITIONS

76. (a) "German seat" is a piece of butt leather sewn round the heel.
- (b) "Inside corks" are extra insoles of cork which are made with the boot.
- (c) "Shaped toe piece" is a toe piece that is larger than the ordinary toe bit and extends along the side up to the joint.
- (d) "Underlays" are inserted and slotted toe bits or side bits.
- (e) "Grindery" is all material apart from tools used by the worker in the making or repairing of leather footwear.
- (f) "Box randed"—a box rand is a rand which is made from a piece of bend, butt, fore-end, shoulder or belly leather.
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EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This Note is not part of the Order.)

This Order, which has effect from 6th February 1974, sets out the increased statutory minimum remuneration payable to workers in relation to whom the Boot and Shoe Repairing Wages Council (Great Britain) operates, in substitution for that fixed by the Wages Regulation (Boot and Shoe Repairing) Order 1972, (Order D.(161)). Order D.(161) is revoked.
