The Rate Support Grant Order 1976

Made - - - - - 2nd December 1976
Laid before the House of Commons 6th December 1976
Coming into Operation - - - 23rd December 1976

The Secretary of State for the Environment, as respects this order (other than articles 3(2) and 4 thereof), and the Secretary of State for Transport (as respects those articles) in exercise of the powers conferred upon them by section 3(1) of the Local Government Act 1974(a) and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, with the consent of the Treasury, and after consultation with the associations of local authorities appearing to them to be concerned and the local authority with whom consultation appeared to them to be desirable, hereby make the following order:—

Title and commencement

1. This order may be cited as the Rate Support Grant Order 1976 and shall come into operation on the day following the day on which it is approved by a resolution of the Commons House of Parliament.

Interpretation

2.—(1) In this order “the Act” means the Local Government Act 1974.

(2) The Interpretation Act 1889(b) shall apply for the interpretation of this order as it applies for the interpretation of an Act of Parliament.

Rate support grants for 1977–8

3. For the purpose of rate support grants for the year 1977–8, this order fixes and prescribes—

Apportionment of transport supplementary grants

4. The provisions of Schedule 2 to this order shall have effect for the purpose of determining the proportion of the aggregate amount of supplementary grants for transport purposes payable for the year to a county council or to the Greater London Council.

Apportionment of supplementary grants (National Parks)

5.—(1) The proportion of the aggregate amount of supplementary grants towards expenditure with respect to National Parks payable for the year to a county council shall be determined by—

- (a) multiplying the aggregate amount of supplementary grants as prescribed by article 3(3) of this order by $\frac{x}{X}$, where—

x is the amount of the estimated expenditure of the county council or councils liable for meeting the expenses incurred with respect to a particular National Park, and

X is the aggregate amount of the estimated expenditure of county councils incurred with respect to all National Parks,

in order to ascertain the proportion of the aggregate amount referable to that particular National Park, and

- (b) allocating that proportion to the county council or councils responsible for meeting the expenses incurred with respect to that National Park and, where there is more than one such council, dividing it between them in the same manner as the liability for meeting those expenses is divided.

(2) In this article any reference to estimated expenditure refers to so much of the estimated expenditure of a council with respect to National Parks as the Secretary of State, in exercise of his powers under section 7(3) of the Act, determines to be appropriate to be taken into account for purposes of that section.

“the area of Greater London” means the areas of the London boroughs, the City of London, the Inner Temple and the Middle Temple;

“the Greater London rateable value ratio”, “the Inner London rateable value ratio” and “the Metropolitan Police District rateable value ratio”, in relation to the council of a London borough or the Common Council of the City of London mean respectively the fraction r/R , where—

r is the aggregate rateable value of the hereditaments in the area of the council or £173 multiplied by the population of their area, whichever is the greater, and

R is the aggregate of the amounts calculated as for r in respect of—

in the case of the Greater London rateable value ratio the area of each Council in Greater London;

in the case of the Inner London rateable value ratio, the area of each Council in Inner London; and

in the case of the Metropolitan Police District rateable value ratio, the area of each council in Greater London which is within the Metropolitan Police District.

“Inner London borough council” means the council of the London Borough of Camden, Greenwich, Hackney, Hammersmith, Islington, Kensington and Chelsea, Lambeth, Lewisham, Southwark, Tower Hamlets, Wandsworth or the City of Westminster; and “the area of Inner London” means the areas of those councils, the City of London, the Inner Temple and the Middle Temple;

“Outer London borough council” means the council of a London borough which is not an Inner London borough council.

For the purpose of this Schedule the aggregate rateable value of the hereditaments in an area shall be the aggregate of the values of hereditaments in the area shown in the valuation list on 1st April 1977.

Article 4

SCHEDULE 2

TRANSPORT SUPPLEMENTARY GRANT

Interpretation

1. In this Schedule—

“accepted estimated expenditure”, in relation to a council, means so much of their estimated expenditure as the Secretary of State determines, pursuant to subsection (5) of section 6 of the Act, to be appropriate to be taken into account for the purposes of that section;

“council” means a county council or the Greater London Council; and any reference to the area of a council, however expressed, shall be construed as a reference to the relevant county or to Greater London, as the case may be;

“threshold level”, in relation to a council, means a level of expenditure determined in relation to that council, in accordance with this Schedule and by reference to the factors prescribed therein, for the purposes of the said section 6.

Threshold level

2. The threshold level in relation to a council shall be the lower of the following amounts—

- (a) the amount obtained by multiplying the population of their area as at 30th June 1975 (as certified by the Registrar General to the Secretary of State for rate support grant purposes) by £9.4686; and
- (b) the amount obtained by subtracting from their accepted estimated expenditure the amounts included therein which appear likely to be expended by them or by any district council within their area during the year ending 31st March 1978 for any purpose referred to in paragraph 3 below.

3. The purposes referred to in paragraph 2(b) above are—

- (a) any purpose described in section 235(1) of the Highways Act 1959(a) (which provides for advances in respect of the construction and improvement of highways, etc.) in relation to which the Secretary of State has before 13th December 1974 given an undertaking to make advances; and
- (b) any purpose described in section 56 of the Transport Act 1968(b) (which provides for assistance towards capital expenditure on public transport facilities), as affected by paragraph 9 of Schedule 1 to the Act, in relation to which the Secretary of State has before 13th December 1974 given an undertaking to make a grant.

4. In the event of any disagreement between a council and the Secretary of State as to the amount likely to be expended during any relevant year for any purpose referred to in this Schedule, the Secretary of State shall determine the issue.

Distribution of transport supplementary grant

5. The proportion of the aggregate amount of supplementary grants for transport purposes payable for the year to a council shall be determined by multiplying that amount by $\frac{x-y}{X-Y}$ where—

x is the accepted estimated expenditure determined in relation to the council for the year;

y is the threshold level determined in relation to the council for the year;

X is the aggregate of the amounts calculated as for x in relation to each council;

Y is the aggregate of the amounts calculated as for y in relation to each council.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This Note is not part of the Order.)

This Order, which came into operation on 23rd December 1976, fixes and prescribes for the year 1977-8:—

- (1) The aggregate amount of the rate support grants payable to local authorities in England and Wales under Part I of the Local Government Act 1974 (namely, £6,157,000,000);
- (2) The division of this amount between the needs element, the resources element and the domestic element;
- (3) The amount of the supplementary grants to county councils and the Greater London Council for transport purposes;
- (4) The amount of the supplementary grants to county council towards expenditure on National Parks;
- (5) The amount by which rates on dwelling-houses are to be reduced in each rating area to take account of the domestic element;
- (6) Various matters which have to be, or may be, prescribed for the purpose of Part I of or Schedule 2 to the Local Government Act 1974 in connection with rate support grants.

The Order is complemented by the Rate Support Grant Regulations 1976 (S.I. 1976/2071) which prescribe how calculations are to be made for various purposes of the Order.
